#### IFC Decision

Inter-Fraternity Council lost a chance this week to regain prestige through making suitable probation recom-mendations to Student-Faculty Social Committee.

The Council turned down a proposed recommendation made by its executive council and sent a less stiff-penalty to the Social Committee. In doing so IFC paved the way for a Committee ruling that disregarded its recommen-

With the rash of probations now infecting the fraterni-ties, it is time for both IFC and individual member groups to take stock of their situation.

Every time the Committee passes a ruling different from one turned in by IFC, the Council's power is di-

In three probationary actions this term, the Social Committee has either ruled without consulting IFC at all or made decisions other than those suggested by-the

Concerning the first case the greeks have a legislative gripe. In the vacation drinking episode, action was taken the Dean of Students Office without consulting either the Social Committee or the Council on the grounds that immediate action was necessary.

In the case of the unregistered term party, IFC was not consulted, but members of the fraternity involved were present when the Social Committee heard the

Reasons given for not consulting IFC are reasonable, but co-operation must be a more general procedure. Fraternity violators would be thoroughly investigated by the fraternities themselves, under an ideal setup for penalty distribution. Administrators seem to agree that more co-operation is necessary, and in the latest case showed their willingness to co-operate.

Decision in this week's case was held up until IFC could make a recommendation and then review it after the Social Committee turned it down, However, no change was made in the IFC suggestion so light it had to be disregarded by the Committee.

No governing group whose subsidiary members are consistently getting themselves into trouble can have respect if no action is taken to control causes of trouble. When the governing group supposedly controls 23 living groups its authority should be proportionate to the prestige of the groups it represents!


At present IFC's prestige is at a low ebb. Controversy over the relative worth of greek organizations is endless. Particularly when probations are continually doled out by a committee actually dominated by administrative personnel, IFC must realize the precariousness of its

One of the Committee's recommendations was strong The fact that the group modified one probationary period from two terms to one term shows the strength of the two-term ruling. It also shows the Committee's good

judgment In fairness to the Committee, their handling of the latest case was undeniably just. A welcome practice began of calling in members of the group involved to state their case. The two-week wait on a final IFC recommendation was also welcome to objective watchers.

Cooperation between Council and Social Committee is vitally necessary since the Committee makes its judgments partially from results of IFC investigation. If student recommendations are not prejudiced in favor of fellow fraternity members, more effective measures to eliminate future violations could be taken. Action should come from IFC.

No student wants to be governed by either administrative decree or Committee decision if student investigation and recommendation can be used to correct mistakes. When students turn in white-washed recommendations


