## New Coed Dorm Planned In Four Separate Units

Plans for a new women dormitory are being considered  
by college officials. Emory G. Foster, manager of dormi-  
tories and food services, announced yesterday.

The proposed dorm to be built across Harrison Road  
from the Kellogg Center will harmonize with the ul-  
tra-modern Center.

The building, still in the blue-  
print stage, will house more stu-  
dents than Shaw Hall, Foster  
said. Four separate units, each  
with its own dining room, are  
planned for the building.

Each unit will be about the  
size of City Hall. A central  
kitchen will serve all four dining  
rooms.

Government allotment of steel

Plans must be approved before

## Victoria Cross Queen Elizabeth Knights 55 Men In Dramatic Rite

LONDON (AP)—Queen Elizabeth  
II, a lithe figure in black, knighted  
55 men yesterday in the first  
major ceremony of her reign.  
She pinned valor medals on 53  
others, including a laggy, shy  
Korean war hero.

The brilliant investiture cere-  
mony was held in the State Ball-  
room of Buckingham Palace, with  
all the traditional pomp before  
200 spectators.

In slow file, the men passed  
before the 25-year-old ruler to  
receive the decorations and eleva-  
tions.

The most dramatic moment of  
the investiture was dominated by  
a private in a Scottish regiment,  
24-year-old William Speakman.  
He won in Korea Britain's high-  
est award for gallantry, the Vic-  
toria Cross, originated by the  
Queen's great-grandmother.

Speakman came before admirals  
and air marshals. Private and  
queen faced each other as the  
glowing citation of his heroism  
in repelling an enemy attack was  
read and as she adjusted the  
cross with care.

PARIS (AP)—France is negotiat-  
ing to get a trade agreement with  
Russia, a French official said yester-  
day, but the Russians want

for what the Russians were ask-  
ing. Merchant ships are believed  
to be one of the items.

## Chinese Filter Into Vietnam Fighting Force

HANOI, Indochina (AP)—Red  
Chinese military advisers and  
technicians appear to be coming  
into Indochina in steadily increas-  
ing numbers to back up the Com-  
munist-led Vietnamese forces.

French and foreign intelligence  
sources now estimate there are  
about 10,000 Red Chinese aiding  
the soldiers of Moscow-Trained Ho  
Chi Minh in his war against the  
French and Vietnamese. This fig-  
ure represents an increase of  
4,000 within five months.

Intelligence officers say the Red  
Chinese work behind the Viet-  
nam front, keeping tabs on the  
communications network and  
teaching the Vietnamese how to di-  
rect artillery and mortar fire.

There is still nothing to indi-  
cate that Communist China is at  
any time soon going to move  
bulk forces into North Tonkin to  
aid the Vietnamese, but the threat  
of invasion is ever present.

And for the forces of Ho Chi  
Minh which the French describe  
as "massive," continued to pour  
into North Tonkin.

The theme around the Jenison Fieldhouse track this week is "hard work" as Coach Karl Schladerman's thineclads prepare for the Big Ten championship meet set for Champaign, March 7-8.

For State's young up-and-coming squad, the conference meet will be the climax of the indoor

season, and will give many freshmen and sophomore performers their first taste of big meet competition.

Although the Spartans will be primed for an all-out effort, their potential point total suffered when it was learned that Capt. Dick Henson and freshman Doug McFetters would be unable to compete. Both are suffering from muscle injuries.

Henson had been counted on to perform in the low hurdle event, while McFetters was to have been entered in the high jump and broad jump.

Based on their indoor season to date, and in comparison with performances with member schools, the Spartans seemed destined to battle the University of Iowa for third place.

The battle for top honors looks to be between the powerful squads of Illinois, the defending champs, and the University of Michigan. According to Schladerman, the Illini rate a slight edge over the Wolverines of Don Canham. Both squads have a number of potential first place winners.

## Wrestlers Travel To Face Indiana

The season's last dual meet for the Michigan State wrestling squad is set for Bloomington, Ind., Saturday afternoon with the Spartans meeting Indiana University.

With the conference championship meet coming up the following week, the encounter with the Hoosiers will serve as a last tuneup for Coach Fendley Collins' grapplers.

The Spartans will carry a record of five wins and two draws in eight starts against an Indiana squad which has picked up six decisions in seven tries.

Only a 14-11 loss to Ohio State mars the slate for Coach Charlie McDaniel's young Hoosier team, made up mostly of sophomore talent.

Michigan State will be without the services Saturday of Ruben Shehigian, 115 pound starter, who suffered an ankle sprain in practice this week. It is hoped that the East Chicago, Ind., junior will be ready for the Big Ten meet.

The Spartan lineup in the other weight classes, although not officially determined as yet, will probably be the same that came through with the 13-13 draw with Michigan.

This includes Bob Gunner at 123, Dick Gunner, 130; Ed Casalicchio, 137; Jim Knotts, 147; Bob Hoke, 157; Orris Bender, 167; Dick Thompson, 177; and Larry Fowler, heavyweight.

Against the Wolverines, Dick Gunner turned in a surprise 7-5 win over Skip Nalon. It was his best performance of the season. After losing to Wisconsin's Big Ten champ Don Ryan Hoke started a new victory string by winning over Michigan's Miles Lee, a highly regarded sophomore.

Fowler came through with the big points for the Spartans when he defeated the Wolverine's Art Dunne, enabling the team to gain the draw. The Spartan heavyweight had his hands full, as Dunne proved very evasive in employing stalling strategy.

Indiana handed Michigan one of its two defeats earlier this season, winning a 17-11 verdict. At that time, the Wolverines were without the services of Larry Nelson, conference champion at 123 pounds.

The Hoosiers' best bet for a win comes from comparing their performance against Illinois, to the Spartan's tussle with the Illini.

MSC and Illinois battled to a 15-15 draw, while Indiana scored an 18-12 win over the Illini. In their most recent meet, Indiana beat their traditional rival Purdue, 21-6. State hung a 19-8 loss on the Boilermakers earlier in the season.

Last season, Michigan State defeated Indiana in a dual meet, 25-8.

## Loss of Tsakiris Causes Concern to Boxing Team

Spartan boxing fortunes took a turn for the worse yesterday when it was announced that heavyweight Alex Tsakiris would be unable to box in the match against Maryland, Friday because of an injured leg.

This is not the first time this season that the injury jinx has hampered the 190-pound Tsakiris. At the beginning of this season he suffered a bruised eye, caused by a loose-fitting headgear.

This, plus the fact that he was nursing a nose injury from the 1951 season, caused him to train with a heavy mask over his face.

Then, in the first meet with Minnesota, Tsakiris received an eye cut in the first round and the bout resulted in a draw. After pulling the tendon in his leg, big Alex was forced to miss the second match with Minnesota and will miss Friday's match against Maryland.

Al had a record of two wins, one loss and a draw before being KO'd by "Ol' Man Injuns."

Tsakiris got his first taste of boxing in the Navy where he served a four-year hitch. After graduation from Proviso High School, in Bellwood, Ill., where he played guard and tackle on the football team, Al joined the Navy.

He first started boxing in 1945 and in '47 he won the Atlantic Fleet championship in the 175-pound class.

As Atlantic Fleet titlist, Tsakiris went to the all-Navy tournament

at San Diego. He lost in the finals to Dan Bucceroni. Tsakiris had lost the Ninth Naval District championship the year before to this same Bucceroni.

Fight fans will recognize Bucceroni as the fourth-ranking light heavyweight contender who re-

cently scored a decision over Roland LaStarza.

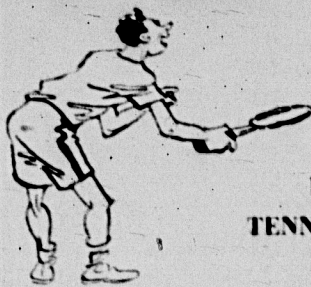

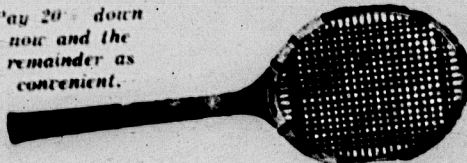

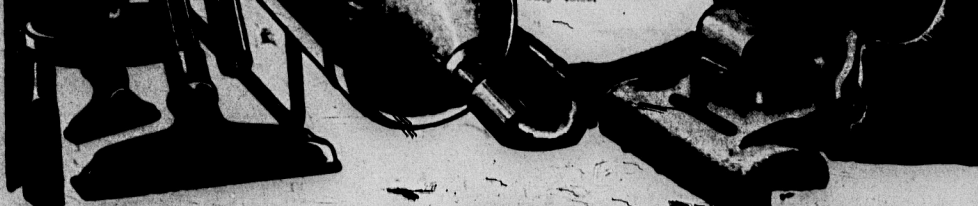

## Six Seniors Play Finale Against U-M

### Final JV Cage Off: Post 3 Record

The scheduled season final of the Michigan State JV basketball squad has been called, leaving Coach Huntington's team with an overall record of eight wins and three losses.

The team was scheduled to have met the University of Michigan Junior Varsity team Saturday evening at 6 p.m. in a game at the varsity gymnasium.

Michigan plans to have his team in action, however, with an unnamed local squad posing the opposition. This game is set for 6 p.m. as previously scheduled.

On Saturday at Columbus, the last Ohio State game was the second time this season the Buckeyes have taken the Spartans to court. In their previous game, State grabbed a 65-59 victory over the Buckeyes.

Ohio State, according to Huntington, the squad display of the last game of the season, "flunked 64" sophomore guard, who tallied 13 points before leaving the game on fouls in the third quarter.

After 11 starts this season, Spartans lost to the University of Detroit JV's twice, dropped a tilt to Perry State after beating the Spartans earlier.

After two victories over Ohio State over Percy Jones, JV's defeated Junior College from Port Huron, Dearborn and Benton Harbor.

They also recorded wins over Ann Arbor's JV's and the Wayne County Junior Varsity.

A squad has scored a total of 77 points to date, while allowing the opposition 561. The offensive effort was the 75-59 over Dearborn JV's, while the peak was the 75-59 triumph over Port Huron.

## Kraatz Calls Russian Hockey Charge 'Silly'

**ZURICH, Switzerland (AP)**—Russian charges of a deal between the Canadian and United States hockey teams to play a tie game so the U.S. could take second place in the Olympic hockey competition were termed "silly" yesterday.

Dr. Fritz Kraatz, president of the International Ice Hockey Federation, termed the charge in the Moscow newspaper, Trud. "So silly it is useless to say anything about them."

In London, Doug Grimston, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, said "Why, that's just about the silliest thing I ever heard."

Canada and the U.S. played a 3-3 tie in the final game of the Olympic round robin Sunday at Oslo, Norway. This assured Canada of the Olympic title, and the U.S. advanced from fourth to second in the final standings.

The Moscow newspaper, declaring there was a scheme to keep Czechoslovakia, a Russian satellite, out of second place, said a "Behind the scenes deal was so evident that even the bourgeois Norwegian press was forced to make declarations on it."

When Sweden and the Czechs wound up in a third place tie, they played off for third, and the Swedes won, 5-3.

"They've got a heck of a nerve," said Grimston of the U.S. accusation. "How in heaven's name can you fix a hockey game? That's just about the stupidest thing I've ever heard."

## Chuck Darling Sets Big Ten Records; More in Danger

## Six Senior Swimmers to See Last Dual Meet Action Saturday

SIX seniors will be seeing their last dual meet action for Michigan State when the Spartan swimmers tangle with Pittsburgh 2:30 Saturday in Jensen Pool.

One of the biggest losses will be that of All-American Clarke Scholtes. Scholtes is Big Ten and NCAA champion in the 50 and 100 yard freestyle events and was top scorer for State last year. He is a strong Olympic candidate.

Hal Shoup is another two-year All-American for the Spartans, ranked seventh best backstroke in the nation last year. Shoup took second in the NCAA 300 yard event and fourth in the 100 and 200 yard races. This 21-year-old senior also is Olympic timber.

Senior breaststroke ace Jim Weitzmann and Dick Robie have been valuable point-getters for the Spartans, and will be counted upon in the conference meet.

Weitzmann, along with his swimming chores for MSC, has been active in Porpoise, national swimming honorary.

Mack Goodwin, a workhorse jack-of-all-strokes, now specializes in the individual medley but is prepared to fill in wherever Coach Charles McCaffrey needs him.

Acting captain for the Pitt meet is senior Rod Quigley. Although considered the number two backstroke behind Shoup, Quigley has tallied several first places this season.

It is the loss of Quigley and Shoup in the backstroke that will hurt the Spartans most next year.

## Spieser to Take Over Heavy Slot

Boxing coach George Makris announced yesterday that NCAA champion Chuck Spieser will fight in the place of injured heavyweight Alex Tsakiris against Maryland this Friday.

Tsakiris injured his leg during training last week and was replaced by Wayne Keller against Minnesota Monday. The Belknap, Ill. sophomore reported for work-outs again Tuesday but Makris said that Tsakiris was still not in condition to go against Maryland.

Makris was not sure how long Tsakiris would be out of action but stated that he hoped Alex would be available for the match with Fort Custer, March 8.

Friday night's contest will mark the second time that team captain Chuck Spieser has fought at the heavier weight this season. He traded spots with Tsakiris at Gonzaga and defeated Mike McMurry, 29-28.

Spieser's 175-pound spot will probably be taken over by Leon Hamilton against the Terrapins.

Keller looked outstanding in gaining a draw with previously undefeated Gopher Sam Orlich Monday but Makris stated that Keller needs more experience. Lack of experience would be a decided disadvantage against Maryland because the Terp heavyweight representative is undefeated Cal Quenstedt, a 21-year-old senior.

Makris expects big things from Keller in the future. "He has looked very good in workouts," the Spartan coach said, "but he needs more conditioning."

# Reds Balk at UN Plan

## Halt in Talks Threatened

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—Communists threatened a halt in Korean armistice negotiations Wednesday unless the UN reverses itself and accepts Russia as a neutral truce inspec-

"Until such time," declared North Korean Col. Chang Chun Sun, "there will be no progress in the negotiations."

While negotiators argued, U.S. sabre jets shot down one MIG and damaged another, as Red planes made their first appearance over North Korea in four days.

An estimated 190 Red fighters were sighted. Allied losses, if any, were not told.

UN patrols crept across the muddy hills on the central front and engaged in light skirmishes with small Red units.

Feiping radio, in a broadcast heard in Tokyo, said "There is no question that recent developments in Korea are seriously endangering the peace talks."

The issue of Russian membership in the neutral inspection group is so sharp that observers speculated the next decision might come from Washington or Moscow.

Communist nomination of Russia probably could not be withdrawn without consent of the Soviet Union. Washington would have to approve Russia as a truce team, it is believed.

Red insistence on Russia's participation as a truce inspector was matched by Allied firmness on voluntary repatriation for prisoners. Col. James C. Murray informed the Reds Wednesday "there will be no possibility that our side will ever abandon the position."

Staff officers agreed to refer the prisoner-of-war issue to a sub-delegation Friday.

Communist propagandists disclosed by inference yesterday that an epidemic of bubonic plague, cholera and small pox may be sweeping through Red front-line ranks and elsewhere in North Korea.

Epidemic appeared as one of the best explanations for an unusually vehement series of charges that the UN was dropping deadly germs behind Communist lines.

The charges have been aired for the last five days by Radio Pyongyang.

UN commanders ignored the Red charges till Tuesday night. Then the "unofficial voice of the UN Command" declared there was ample proof the Reds were attempting to cover up a seasonal winter epidemic, and also stalling tactics at the armistice conference with fake charges.

In Washington the Defense Department announced an increase of 151 casualties since last week's modifications to relatives, including 36 killed. It brought total casualties to 105,992 since the start of the fighting.

## Ferguson Questions Acheson

### Asks if Secretary Covered Up Report

WASHINGTON (AP)—A suggestion that Secretary of State Acheson threw out a loyalty board's finding and cleared O. Edmund Clubb of disloyalty charges was injected yesterday into a Senate investigation of possible Red influence on U.S. Far Eastern policies.

Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) brought up the matter during the second day of acrimonious exchanges between Owen Lattimore, Far Eastern affairs specialist, and the senate's internal security subcommittee.

Ferguson asked Lattimore if he knew Acheson had reversed a recommendation by the State Department's Loyalty-Security Board and "freed" Clubb, who recently resigned as head of the Department's Office of Chinese Affairs following an announcement that he had been cleared.

Lattimore said he did not know this.

The State Department declined to say whether Acheson actually did reverse the Board, noting that regulations forbid step-by-step disclosure of action in all loyalty cases.

Lattimore, a Johns Hopkins University professor and one-time government consultant on Asia, was before the group to deny testimony by several previous witnesses that sought to link him with the Communist movement.

He accused the committee itself of publicizing false testimony and of conducting a "reign of terror" against foreign service officials.

## Czech Army Purge Reported, President's Position Shaky

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—Reports from Prague indicated last night that a top-level purge has occurred in the army of Czechoslovakia, which has the most modern military force among Russia's Communist satellites.

The Prague radio indirectly confirmed reports that Gen. Jaroslav Prochazka, who became Chief of Staff in May, 1950, has been removed.

Maj. Gen. Václav Kratochvíl was identified as "Chief of Staff" in a broadcast reporting details of a Communist ideological conference in Brno which Kratochvíl attended.

The Prague newspaper, Rude Právo, earlier yesterday gave the name of an apparently new Deputy Defence Minister.

The reports indicated that Czechoslovakia's Communist leadership—insecure in a crisis that came into the open with the arrest of former Foreign Minister Vlado Clementis in 1950—was engaged in a wholesale action to remove doubtful elements from the army.

A dispatch from Rome said the position of President Klement Gottwald himself is shaky.

A reliable source from Czechoslovakia reported Gottwald may be purged in from two to six

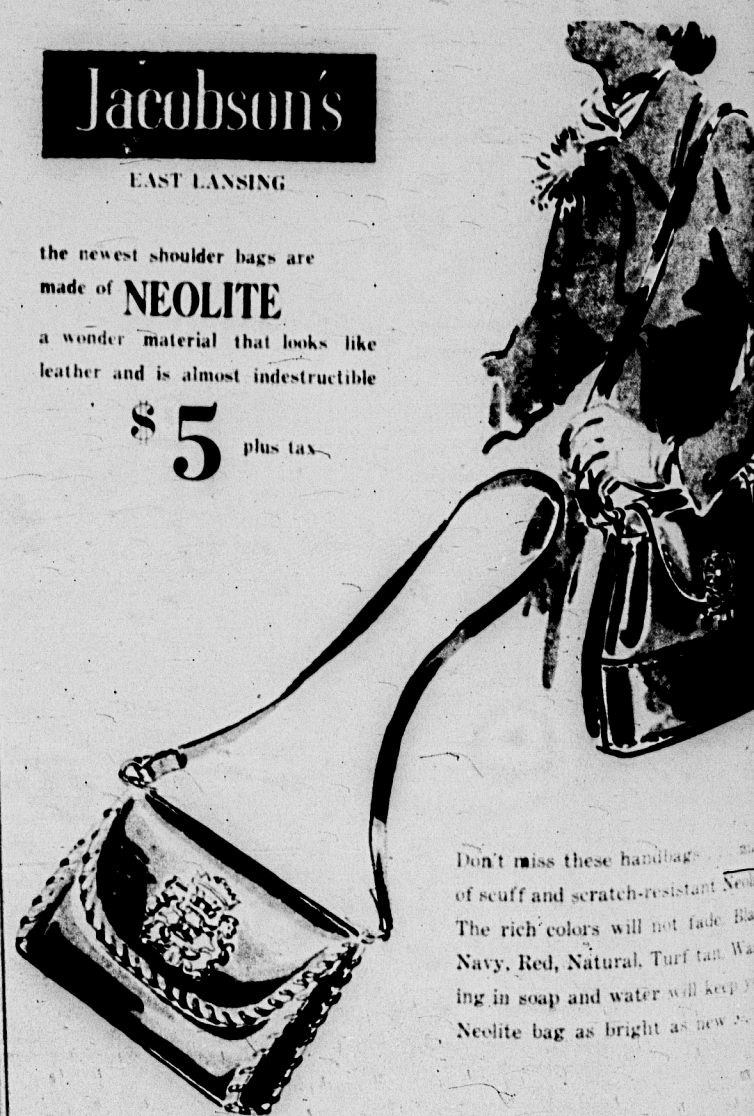
