Travel to Indiana After Beating Michigan, 80-59

The Michigan State basketball team will meet Indiana tonight at Bloomington in the Spartans' final game of the season.

Pete Newell's squad, which had a half-game lead over Ohio State, who placed fifth Saturday night, will give State a victory would give State possession of fifth place, a defeat tonight would give the Buckeyes and Ohio State the fifth place in the final standings.

Who sewed up fourth place Saturday night, led by freshman center, Don Schlundt, has already won three school records and is one of the top five scorers in the Big Ten with an average of 13 points a game. Bob Leonard, with a average is the other big gun in the Spartans.

State scored an 80-59 win over Michigan Saturday night. Michigan fans in Jenison, Mich., were disappointed. The victory assured the Spartans of their second season in 10 years earned revenge for an earlier defeat at the hands of Michigan.

Michigan seniors, making their final appearance, contributed a total of 58 points, less than the entire Wolverines team.

Bob Carey paced State's attack with 25 points while Leonard, Bill Bower, had 15 points. Bower also played his last game. Carey, who had three points, and Leonard, with two, were the senior members of the team.

The game was marred by 63 fouls with five Michigan men fouling the game with five fouls. The Spartans missed their charity throws while Michigan missed 15 fouls.

The Spartans held an 18-12 advantage at the end of the first half before Carey cut loss in second quarter. The 63 fouls, committed in 12 fouls to spark point attack in the second quarter built up the Spartans' lead at halftime to 41-24.

Matmen Lose To Indiana In Last Meet

After dropping their final dual meet of the season to Indiana Saturday, Michigan State's wrestling team will prepare this week for the Big Ten championship meet for Ann Arbor Friday and Saturday.

The Spartans' matmen dropped their second meet of the campaign in losing to the Hoosiers by a 14-12 score at Bloomington.

Indiana picked up all their points in the first four weight divisions, including a forfeit in the 130-pound class. The Spartans gathered 12 points by winning the final four matches.

The rest of the MSC gloves were equally unimpressive. Herb Odum took a big jump from his high 139 slot to defeat a discouraged heavyweight Bill McInnis.

Odum kept his heavier foe off balance with a jabbing left hand. McInnis gambled everything on landing a roundhouse right but he never got the old equalizer across and Odum took the match 20-28.

Dick LaForge protected his unblemished record against Bob Theofield. It was anybody's match until the third round when the Pontiac sophomore scored a big edge. LaForge now has the enviable record of never having lost a round in dual meet competition this year.

The crowd-pleaser of the night once more proved to be State's 119-pounder, Leroy Jeffers. The Detroit freshman and Gary Garber were fighting an exhibition because Garber was ineligible and no decision was announced.

Two other consistent winners for the defending NCAA champion Spartans, Tom Hickey and Norman Andrie, also added to their list of victories. Hickey knocked Ronnie Rhodes to the canvas in the final round. This proved to be the deciding factor because both men were even up to that point. Andrie used a nice combination against southpaw Dave Schaffer to chalk up win number five.

Michigan counted twice more before the period ended, added a single counter in the second and beat goalie Del Reid four more times in the final stanza. Four of Michigan's last five goals were by forward Doug Mullen.

The Spartans twice tied Michigan in Saturday's game before penalties left State two men short. Michigan capitalized on the break and took a two-goal lead.

The Spartans played on even terms with Michigan in the first period which ended with the score 1-1. Michigan scored early in the second but once again State came back to tie. Then came the penalties and the roof caved in.

A varsity-reserve game is scheduled for the MSC Ice Arena Wednesday night at 8. No admission will be charged.

Other Spartan winners were Hal Shoup, Bob Hynes, and Dave Norman in the medley relay. Larry Johnson in the individual medley, Pavette in the 100 free style, Norman in the 440, Rod Gougey in the 200 backstroke, and Dick Robie in the 200 breaststroke.

Michigan State's gymnastics team completed the 1952 dual-meet season undefeated as they won a decisive 57-39 over the University of Michigan Saturday.

With six wins the Spartans are the only team in the conference to go unbeaten. They will be favored, along with Illinois, Minnesota, and Iowa, to win the Big Ten meet Friday and Saturday at Bloomington, Ind.

Freshman Carl Rintz of Michigan State gave his best showing of the year as he took individual scoring honors with 19 points. He won the side horse and flying rings, took second on the horizontal bar, and third on the parallel bars. Rintz has placed first on the side horse in every meet this season.

Capt. Bob Feldmeier, playing in his last dual meet, was second in scoring with 14 points. He finished first on the horizontal bar, second on the parallel bars, third on the rings, and fourth on the side horse. Feldmeier has been undefeated on the horizontal bar in six meets this season.

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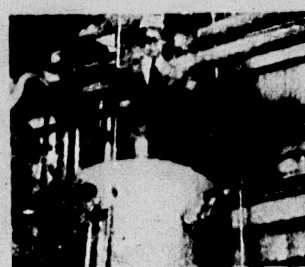

Work as production supervisors prepares
chemical engineers for jobs in management

The last issue of the Digest described the broad opportunities offered chemical engineers in research and development at Du Pont. Now let's look at the opportunities in production supervision.

In this important phase of plant operation, Ch. E.'s and others are responsible for investment in plant facilities, supply of raw materials, supervision of operation and maintenance, cost and shipment of finished products, as well as personnel relations, training and safety.

Normally, chemical engineers enter production supervision by reason of preference and special abilities. Their first step depends on which of their department they work in. For example, in one department they follow a training program as student operators. In another, training in a plant laboratory familiarizes the engineers with processes and products.

After the training period, the men are given supervisory responsibility.

ties, usually starting as foreman. At this level they meet problems like these:

1. Occasionally, in a still connected to a sulfonator by a pipe line with a single valve, the product disappeared, and residue increased. The supervisor's study of control data showed that small amounts of gaseous sulfur trioxide were venting into the still causing decomposition of the product. His recommended installation of a positive pressure block in the pipeline eliminated the difficulty.

2. A high temperature batch reaction process was revised to increase production of a critical material. For safety, adjacent reactors had to be shut down as work on each unit proceeded. The supervisor planned maintenance and batch schedules to minimize costly down-time and retrained personnel for the new process.

In solving such problems, supervisors have an opportunity to use all their knowledge and ingenuity. Equally important, they acquire the

background and varied experience that prepare them for advancement to responsible positions in management and administration.

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French Smash Enemy Attack 500 Vietminh Troops Killed in Bitter Battle

SAIGON, Indochina (AP)—The French high command announced yesterday it had smashed an attempt of elements of two communist-led Vietminh divisions to gain a foothold in the Red River delta 30 miles southeast of Hanoi.

The command said hand-to-hand fighting and attacks by mobile units of artillery and tanks and planes dropping napalm bombs had resulted in killing 500 Vietminh soldiers and the wounding of 1,000 others.

Fourteen thousand Vietminh troops had tried to cut the delta in attacks from the north and south of the Red River. The French said a cleanup of the delta is now underway.

The French aim is to consolidate their own positions preparatory to launching an offensive against the Vietminh when it is said, could be undertaken at any time.

A high command spokesman said the French started hitting the Vietminh's delta infiltrators simultaneously with the withdrawal of French and Viet Nam forces from Hoa Binh on the Black River in Western Indochina Feb. 24.

He insisted the French had quit Hoa Binh so that they could retain the initiative of action through a regrouping of their forces in the Red River delta and building up for an offensive. The spokesman said the loss of Hoa Binh had created alarm over a "French defeat" in Washington, London and Paris, but he added future developments would prove the soundness of French strategy.

In one of its few appearances, Orchesis presented the annual dance concert in Fairchild Theater Friday evening. Displaying the vitality and vigor that characterizes youth, the dance honorary left an enthusiastic audience wishing for more.

There were two numbers from the 1951 program and nine new ones added. It was altogether a memorable evening.

Perhaps the most important of the new group-numbers was Guernica, inspired by Picasso's huge black and white mural. In the manner of the creative artist, Nedra Smith, Buchanan sophomore, elaborated on Picasso's theme and while not imitating it, effectively transposed the devastation of the Spanish Civil War into dance movement.

Top form was demonstrated consistently by Becky Fuller, Kalamazoo senior, in her three works. She was most satisfying in Montage where she projected abandonment and precise timing. Pat Jones, Detroit freshman, offered the perfect complement in an interpretation which in lesser hands might have fallen short.

Junior, who scored a personal triumph in Evolution was also in top form. The wedding of wit with meaningful dance movement provided comedy relief. His final number, I Have A Very Important Appointment, achieved the calibre of a classic in its swift pace and terse abstractions of a busy day.

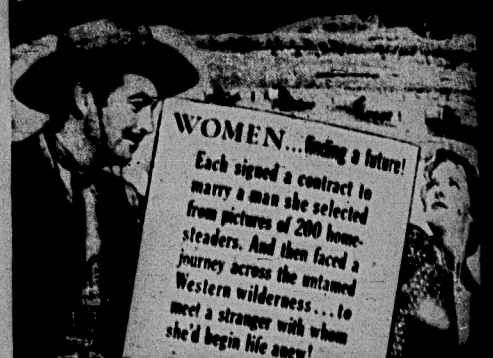
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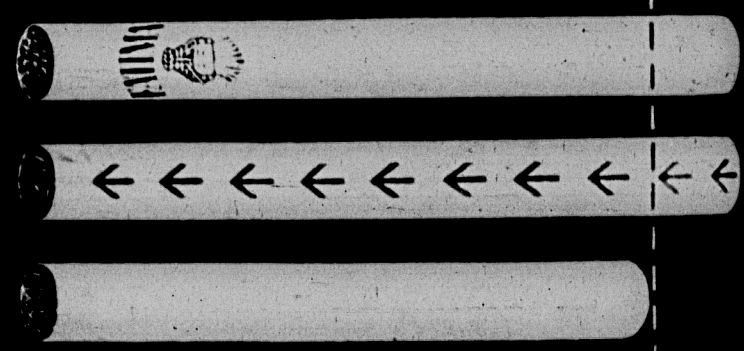


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
