New Ticket Plan Set by Spartacade

Carnival to House 31 Booths, Shows

The Spartacade committee has devised a new system of admission, a double ticket, for this year's carnival.

One part will be given to the doorman for admission, and the second part will count as one final vote in the UMOG contest.

Carnival costs will be covered by the admission charge, so that all booth profits go to the Green Feather Campaign, according to publicity chairman, Bob Scott.

Spartacade originated two years ago as the Campus Chest Carnival, with only 11 booths and shows.

Last year the name was changed to Spartacade, with about 15 booths. This year's Spartacade features 31 different booths and shows.

Six trophies will be awarded Sunday afternoon at 4 by Nick Pagan, assistant Counselor for Men.

Scott announced that all booths that have not been cleaned up to the satisfaction of the Building and Utilities Department will not only be disqualified from judging, but will also forfeit their \$10 deposit.

An eight-page Spartacade program will go on sale tomorrow at the Union desk for 5 cents.

Phi Kappa Tau members have volunteered to sell programs during the carnival. They will contain detailed information as to the location of each booth, acknowledgments, and a history of Spartacade.

IFC Proposes Constitutional Amendments

Major amendments to the IFC constitution were proposed at a special meeting in the Union last night.

To go into effect the changes will have to be read and approved at three consecutive regular meetings.

Most drastic of the proposals will impose a \$100 fine on fraternities illegally pledging men who have pledged other fraternities. Under the new plan, the fine will go into effect seven days after the fraternity has been warned by IFC if the fraternity does not comply.

Pledges who are not released by their original fraternity will have to wait six months before accepting another fraternity's bid.

Other amendments include adding two more standing committees. The new committees will handle service projects and public relations.

Bill Souther, Grose Pointe senior, gave a report on the proposed service committee. One of its first jobs would be to initiate a community "Help Week." During this time pledges would be required to participate in a unit program to aid the community under the direction of the IFC.

Bob Duxan, Lincoln Park senior, and secretary of the council, read a proposed list of penalties the group will recommend to the administration for fraternity violations of college regulations.

Copies of all the amendments and proposals will be sent to the fraternities for discussion and action.

Investigators Refused Tax Case Records

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department yesterday refused to turn over a huge stack of records to a House Judiciary Subcommittee investigating Attorney General McGrath's conduct of his office.

It declared that the executive branch of government is "independent and equal" to Congress and that the committee is exceeding its powers.

The House committee had demanded records on all tax and other prosecutions which have been quashed in the last six years, or are still pending.

Assistant Attorney General Joseph C. Duggan, acting for McGrath, said that the subcommittee's blanket request for data went entirely beyond the scope of a resolution adopted by the full House Judiciary Committee authorizing the investigation.

Inspired 'Miss Julia' Wins Critic's Plaudits

There was talent in the kitchen last night when Gloria Gluski played the title role in the Studio Theater production of Miss Julia.

Miss Gluski brilliantly portrayed a count's daughter aroused by the excitement of mid-summer's eve. She carried the character through author August Strindberg's intended emotions with finesse.

The play, a realistic tragedy with hints at symbolism, takes place in the kitchen of the count's home while he is away.

In one continuous act the audience saw Ron Van Tassel, Flint junior, as Jean, the valet, change from the servant to the brutal critic of Julia, then back to the servant, bowing and scraping again.

Van Tassel was good. He made the role of valet believable, even when the play was at its highest points of tension. There were no awkward moments when he was on stage.

Christine, the maid, as played by Sue Sullivan, was an unreal rival of Miss Gluski for the valet's affections. Her delivery of lines was adequate.

Bob Housman played the village violinist with considerable aplomb.

Lee Hensley deserves much commendation for his direction. It is an excellent pedestal for the talents of Miss Gluski and Van Tassel.

The play continues through Saturday.

Congress OK's Report on Tax Investigation

All-College Judiciary To Rule on Case Friday

The Student Congress last night certified a favorable report on its tax vote investigation. The case will go before the All-College Judiciary tomorrow.

Congressmen heard Ted Eck, chairman of the elections committee, give a favorable report on the Congress' tax vote investigations.

Eck pointed out that the point of the regulation requiring ID cards to be punched in the election procedure was to prevent plural voting.

"It has so far been established that no person in the dormitories in question, North Williams and Gilchrist voted twice," he said, recommending that the Congress approve his report.

Eck pointed out that the spirit of the election ruling was carried out.

Miss Isabel Gonon, counselor for women and member of the All-College Judiciary questioned Eck's report.

"Wasn't that contrary to the election procedure set up the night before?" she asked.

Eck denied that it was and the Congress approved the motion to accept the report.

The tax-vote issue will come up before the All-College Judiciary Friday afternoon.

"Students who wish to come for the question period before the secret meeting of the court are welcome, but we would like them to let us know in order that we can get a large enough room," Mrs. Gonon said.

The Congress also passed the revised constitution of the Committee to End Discrimination. The vote which was 18 yes to four no with two abstaining.

The organization's charter will now go up before a faculty committee for final approval.

Finals Loom For UMOG Competitors

Five finalists in the "Ugliest Man on Campus" contest will be chosen at the close of voting today.

Elliot Greenberg, sponsored by East Yakeley, led after yesterday's count with 1,949 votes.

In order, the next five were: Bob Martin, 1,660; Dick Mayhew, 1,517; Dean Garner, 1,498; Duke Messenger, 1,346; Bill Morgan, 1,178.

Two days of voting have produced \$205.94 for Campus Chest. Each vote costs one cent with no limit on the number of votes one person may cast.

UMOG Director Will Sterzik, Alpha Phi Omega, said finalists will be announced Friday.

One candidate brought a jazz band into the Union Concourse yesterday to aid his campaign, and other stunts are on tap for this afternoon.

Churchill Gains After Labor Split

Bevan Socialists Desert Atlee Camp

LONDON (AP)—Aneurin Bevan, left wing Socialist leader, split the British Labor Party wide open last night and paved the way for an overwhelming 314-219 vote of confidence for Winston Churchill's handling of the rearmament program.

The bushy-browed Welsh rebel and upwards of 50 of his Leftist Labor followers in the House of Commons abstained from voting in protest against both Churchill's \$13,160,000,000 arms program and Clement Attlee's leadership of the Labor Party.

Coupled with the small normal Conservative Party edge in the House, the Bevan move let Churchill and his followers beat down decisively the Labor Party motion of no confidence on grounds that the government was moving too slowly in rearmament.

Churchill conceded in the day-long debate that the arms program was running a year behind the time-table. He blamed this on a lag in American aid, but said he pins his hopes for peace mostly on the United States' "rapidly growing stockpile" of atom bombs.

He also said that British air power was dragging and announced he was mobilizing home-front volunteers against the remote possibility of an airborne invasion.

Parliament went on record formally in favor of the rearmament program itself by a 313 to 55 vote which followed the vote of confidence.

The 55 votes in opposition came from the Bevan group.

Attlee and his supporters abstained on this ballot but made no effort to block the program they originated a year ago when they were in power, after losing out in protest against Churchill's handling of it.

MSC Ranks 3 in Field of Social Work

Michigan State's graduate Department of Social Work has been ranked as the 35th member of the American Association of Schools of Social Work, named Dr. Ernest B. Harper, of the department.

Wayne University and the University of Michigan also have accredited social work graduate programs. The association inducts institutions in the U.S., Canada, Puerto Rico and Hawaii.

The MSC department is in the Division of Business and Public Administration.

The college sought admission to the association in March, 1951, during a visit by the association's accreditation committee.

Approval of the Michigan Department of Social Work was made at the association's annual meeting in New York City on Jan. 29.

The graduate program was begun in 1940, suspended during World War II and revived in 1946.

The two-year program leading to a degree of master of social work is staffed by five full-time faculty members and six part-time lecturers.

Guest of 40,000 Michigan Women

German Coed Finds U.S. Hard to Leave

Inga, the pretty German girl who was guest of 40,000 Michigan women for eight months, had trouble saying her good-byes before she left for home early this month.

But Ingeburg Thimmer has a big job to do back in her native land telling about Michigan.

Co-operative Extension work she was here on a scholarship financed by the Michigan Home Demonstration Council, executive organization of the state's home demonstration groups.

Inga's visit here was unique, for it was sponsored entirely by Michigan women.

Her itinerary took her into 40 counties, including the Upper Peninsula. She was a guest in nearly 45 Michigan homes.

Thimmer said she learned a great deal here, especially about how democracy works in an extension program.

The I-H program here interested Inga, and she hoped to promote it in Germany.

"American movies have given Europeans the wrong impression of your life, I'm afraid," she replied to questions about American life. "I did not expect streets lined with gold, but I felt, somehow, that there would be more general wealth."

"I find business and industry more specialized here, and much greater opportunity for young people."

"We have gone a long way toward learning democratic ways in our country," she said proudly, "but there was much we had to learn. Simple things like freedom of speech and freedom of movement were new to us after the Hitler times."

If the slight, vivacious girl had one lesson to teach the women of Michigan, it was that differences between them and the women of her country are small.

Language and social customs differ—but the large things are the same.

Saturday to Sunday

After almost two terms of controversy, the June graduation date was changed from Saturday to Sunday by a faculty vote this week.

The vote, taken after a postcard poll of seniors showed an overwhelming preference for Sunday, should still complaints that the college faculty never pays attention to student opinion.

State News editorials and letters to the editor finally resulted in the poll which was the deciding factor. But changing the date in this manner every year is hardly possible.

Sunday seems to be the first choice of most students as a graduating day, in spite of the fact that only two other schools in the Big Ten have scheduled their commencements for a Sunday.

Senior Council has recommended a way to make absolutely sure that seniors favor Sunday which would avoid a repetition of this year's wrangling over the date.

The suggestion, which seems to be a sound one, is that students who plan to graduate in June 1953 list the day they would like to have commencement at fall term registration. Thus, the question would be settled so that plans could be made without fear of contradiction later.

Such a plan would be much more feasible than the way the date was finally determined this year.

Revenue Muddle

The job of a state legislator has not always been a thankless one. In years past, running the state of Michigan required comparatively little effort. In fact, it only meant the attention of the legislature once every two years and then only for a few months.

Times have changed though. The present legislative session is the first under a new constitutional provision that provides for regular sessions every year.

The growing complexity of state government is manifesting itself in other ways. For over three years the legislature has been wrestling with the problem of how to make an antiquated revenue structure meet the needs of a modern industrial state. Various solutions have been proposed but the situation remains unsolved.

Three straight years of deficit financing have brought the state general fund down to a level where the basic obligation of meeting payrolls may not be fulfilled. Legislative finance committees asked to appropriate funds for necessary pay increases have announced their intention of denying them. To do otherwise would be dishonest. The state just does not have the money to meet new authorizations. Instead anywhere from 500 to 3,000 employees of state agencies may lose their jobs.

Still the legislature gives no indication of making more than a half-hearted stab at solving the state's revenue problems. Present activities are confined to attempts to recapture part of the lion's share of state income which by law must be

turned over to local units of government.

Such measures cannot bridge the gap between present income and that needed to properly meet state obligations. Neither will they help restore public confidence in the legislature, the lack of which led

to the sales tax diversion amendment with all its inequities and restrictions.

The legislature has shrugged off the realities of the situation for too long. Michigan's financial plight has reached a critical point. We hope effective action is forthcoming.





Top Level Parley Hinted

Allies, Reds Test Eastern Defense Lines

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—Basic differences on prisoner exchange and Russian participation as a neutral truce in-pector pointed yesterday toward a high level decision to break the Korean armistice deadlock.

Advance UN Command Headquarters would not conjecture on how the stalemate might be broken. Observers believed the problems were receiving a careful consideration in Washington and perhaps in Moscow and Peking.

On the fighting front, in the Eastern Korean hills yesterday Allied and Red raiders tested each other's defenses and found each had fortified well in the long days of Twilight War.

They found that since the war tapered off last autumn, the natural defenses of mountains, hills and ridges had been bolstered by lines of bunkers and trenches too tough to crack without heavy losses.

Air combat tapered off yesterday afternoon after a morning in which U.S. Sabres shot down five and possibly six Communist jets in a snarling battle high over Northwest Korea.

While the fighting raged, the UN planes cut rail lines in 63 places on their drive to choke all Red communications with the front.

Penguin Books, Ltd. of London has announced the forthcoming publication in 1953 of a two-volume American intellectual history for British readers, under the joint authorship of Dr. R. B. Nye, professor of English at MSC and J. E. Morpurgo, consultant on American history to the British Broadcasting Corporation and former editor for the Falcon Press.

These volumes will appear in the Penguin History of the World series, of which Morpurgo is general editor. According to the authors, the combined British-American authorship is intended to present to British readers a more balanced view of the American character and its development than is customary in popular histories.

Monday Set as Deadline On Deferment Requests

Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, Director of Selective Service, reminded college students that applications for the April 24 Selective Service Qualification Test must be mailed by midnight Mar. 10.

The Educational Testing Service at Princeton, N.J., will process the applications and assign each applicant to the testing center requested by the student, or to the closest alternate center.

Application blanks may be obtained by students from the nearest board.

An applicant must be a selective service registrant who intends to request deferment as a student. He must be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time college course leading to a degree, and must not previously have taken the test.

Students may be deferred if they make a score of 70 on the Service College Qualification Test or have class standing among the male members in the upper half of the freshman class, upper two-thirds of the sophomore class, or upper three-fourths of the junior class.

Seniors accepted for admission to a graduate school may be deferred if they are among the upper half of the male members of their senior class, or make a score of 75 or better.
