## U.S. Destroyer, Carrier Collide In Maneuvers

## Navy Reports 61 Survivors; 174 Officers, Men Missing

WASHINGTON (P)-The destroyer-minesweeper USS Hobson collided with the aircraft carrier Wasp and sank in mid-Atlantic maneuvers Saturday night, the Navy innounced vesterday.

Atlantic fleet headquarters at Norfolk, Va., reported 5 p.m. yesterday that as that time, 61 survivors of the Hobson had been picked up by rescuers. The ship had sailed with 237 officers and enlisted per-

nnel/aboard. The Atlantic fleet mine forces

The Navy in Washington broadly implied that there were casualties in the collision and said rescue operations were con-tinuing nearly a full day af-ter the ships lift in night ma-

## Seniors' Choice

The controversy over\_changing the date of graduation from Saturday to Sunday last term brought up the problem of whose choice the date should be and when it should be

Sunday was first choice of most students as a graduating day this year, and the college administration was gracious enough to bow before the wishes of the class.

Choice of day for the class of '53 and '51 probably will be taken into consideration by the powers that be, inspite of the fact that if Sunday were named again. it would bring the same inconvenience for the college that it does this year.

Administrators don't like Sunday commencements because of the additional work entailed for the Grounds Department. The East Lansing Police Department doesn't like

the day either; for automotive reasons However, wishes of the graduates should be considered.

Some sort of method of determining the wishes of the class and hashing them out with the administration early in the fall would probably be most fair to both groups. A vote of June graduates at September registration would be an easy and early way of finding out class opinions.

Another method of choosing the day would be for members of the Jumor Class Council to meet with the Administrative Group to discuss possible dates in the spring, with possible dates released to the class for a vote

It does seem, as happened this year, that the wishes of the class should be final after inconveniences to both sides are weighed.

A plan for discussion and a class vote would eliminate late changes and end the trouble of having to rush to find a commencement speaker

It would give the students the voice they desire in choosing the date for their final ceremony
