

Are We Delinquent?

Every time an individual member of a group acts antisocially he drags the name of his group down with him when his pranks are aired before the public. MSC's student body as a whole has mud slapped on it because of the actions of individuals quite often.

The hostile attitude of neighboring townspeople toward thoughtless students is certainly understandable. So is the stand taken by the Ingham County News in an editorial which appeared April 24:

"Juvenile delinquents are not always teen-agers, nor are they the so-called under-privileged.

"It is possible, as Michigan State College fraternities so often prove, for young men in their 20's to be juvenile in their actions. It is possible, as those same fraternities prove, for young men with plenty of cash to be delinquent in their actions.

"That is one reason why the Dean of Meu at Michigan State has to order a fraternity house shake down every year to have road and traffic signs restored to the public. "Last Friday night college 'boys' tore down and carted off direction signs at Fden. They had such 'fun.'

"Ingham is glad to have Michigan State College men and women as neighbors. Probably a few juveniles mixed in are no more than we should expect. Yet, on the other hand, college should not be a refuge for delinquents so juvenile that they have fun tearing down highway markers.

"We want our markers back," the editorial ends. There it is, another case of throwing all of us in a bad light because of the thoughtlessness and childishness of

. Such activities by three or four are the reason for a stereotyped picture of rah-rah college students in the minds of many. If someone else's property interferes or adds to the fun, take it along or else get it out of the way, goes the stereotype. There are enough people who think that way or don't bother to think at all to give the stereotype a factual basis.

Considering the other guy, or the whole group is part of anybody's social obligation, and a sign of maturity. What's the point of taking road markers anyway? Let's


