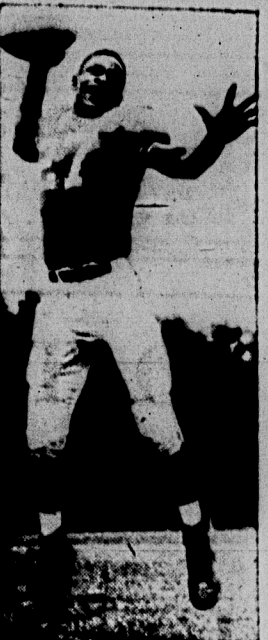
While Biggie Munn was not part of last week's scrimmage, Munn was disappointed. "We sure miss our seniors," Munn stated as his two offensive teams had been unable to consistently on the ground against the opposing defensive line. Several long passes, however, did click for the offense.

Munn was working with two top offensive units, line and backfield. Steve Schoen was working with the other offensive unit, the number one defensive line.

Yocco and Willie Throver, who did the punting, worked in the "Pony" field last season, has been a little more action in the backfield with Capt. Don Atchie, Vince Pisano and Al Doro.

Throver has looked good with his passing and punting. Throver, who came to Michigan State as one of the top players ever from Pennsylvania, will be a key player next fall. This fact has caused the number one back position.

Throver, who shared the punting duties last season, on the other hand, is also making a strong signal caller position. He probably rank better than more experienced players.

# Fourth Spartan Classic To Show New Cage Foes

The fourth annual Spartan Basketball Classic next December will feature Notre Dame, Kansas State, U.C.L.A. and host Michigan State in two nights of double header attractions.

The state of teams in the classic was announced by Coach Pete Newell with the comment that "this is easily the strongest line-up of teams we've yet had in the Classic. Kansas State is a top flight team nationally and always a power in the Big Seven conference. U.C.L.A. is the defending Pacific Coast Conference champion. Notre Dame is heading back to the top under new coach Johnny Jordan."

Newell also disclosed that the Classic dates have been advanced from their previous Christmas week slot to the pre-Christmas week-end. Double headers will be played both Friday and Saturday nights, December 19 and 20.

The Friday card will pit U.C.L.A. against Michigan State and Kansas State against Notre Dame. On Saturday U.C.L.A. will play Notre Dame and Kansas State will meet the Spartans. No team championship will be at stake.

Newell also disclosed that plays were being formulated to stage the event.

## Illinois Takes Big Ten Pin Tournament

Illinois bowlers walked off with top team honors but Michigan State kegglers all but dominated the Big Ten Union bowling tournament Saturday at Minneapolis.

Illinois toppled 2730 pins to take the team title for the third time in the four year history of the tourney—giving the Illini permanent possession of The team trophy. Illinois finished 45 pins in front of second place Michigan State.

Spartan bowlers LeRoy Smith and Ted Poniatowski stole almost all the individual honors as they teamed for the doubles championship and finished one-two in the all-events. Poniatowski also took second place in the singles.

The Spartan duo combined for a 1,131 count in the doubles event to a second place score of 1,078 by Henry Ford and Ralph Jones of Indiana.

Smith topped the all-events with a nine-game total of 1,725, 12 pins ahead of teammate Poniatowski's 1,713.

Poniatowski had games of 263, 198, and 198 for a 589 total and second place behind Dick Lewis' 616 in the singles.

Smith's all-events total came on scores of 585 in the doubles, 548 in the singles and 592 in the team event. Poniatowski had 546 in the doubles, 589 in the singles and 578 in the team event.

# New Campus Movie To Star Spartans

A movie of campus life at MSC will be made during spring term. It was announced yesterday by Kappa Alpha Mu, national photojournalism honorary.

The 25 minute 16mm movie will be shot in color and will have as its theme, "Roads to State."

Completely written, directed and shot by KAM, the movie will be donated to the college through the Alumni office for use in student recruitment. It is hoped that the movie will give the prospective "Spartan" a view of the campus activities as well as scenery, chosen by the students who know it.

The film will not follow any single student or group of students but rather attempt to include as many different phases

of campus life with different students as possible.

A shooting script has now been completed and includes such activities as ROTC parades, spring sports, canoeing on the Red Cedar, the more photogenic campus buildings and popular scenic spots.

The actual shooting of each scene will be as realistic and unposed as possible, said Dick Meyer, cameraman.

The film, scheduled for completion around June 1, is expected to cost \$200.

"These fortifications are somewhat crude in construction when compared with the Siegfried Line."


The Siegfried Line was Nazi Germany's famed World War II defense system along the French border.
