Spartans Win on One Hit

Baseball Team Wins Two over Weekend

Coach John Friedrich said that despite Saturday's loss State will have an even chance to regain their crown at the Big Ten meet later this month.

The Spartans will continue on the road as they travel to Detroit to face the University of Detroit in a game tomorrow afternoon.

Winning 13 out of 15 events, the Michigan State track squad rolled to a decisive 91-40 victory over Penn State Saturday in the season's first dual encounter.

The Spartans will make their first home appearance Saturday when they take a tough University of Wisconsin squad on paper the meet figures to be a tossup and some stiff competition is expected from the Badgers.

In losing only two events to the Nittany Lions from State College, Pa., Coach Karl Schladebach's crew showed vast improvement over its early season's appearances. With only four members slated to graduate this year, the team should be a top prospect for the Big Ten crown next year.

Bob Carney, senior hurdler, rolled with two firsts and a second in the 110, 220 and 440 yard dashes. Carney set a new meet record in the 110 yard dash with a time of 17.4 seconds. He also placed first in the 220 and second in the 440.

Roland gave one of the meet's best performances in the sprints, running the 100 yard dash in 15.7 and the 220 in 31. He came in second in the broad jump.

Williams
Vetos Bill
For Jobless

State News Capitol Reporter Governor G. Mennen Williams vetoed a bill last week that, according to the Legislature, would have improved unemployment payment for Michigan's jobless and would also have relieved the unemployment tax load for large corporations.

The bill, originally designed to provide for unemployment payment to Great Lakes sailors picked up a few riders along the way and was finally passed by the Legislature in a much revised form.

Williams claimed that the bill's passage was a move by the Legislature designed to attract votes in an election year and actually did not meet the existing situation.

It was pointed out by Williams that although the bill appeared to be a boon to the workman, it would only be in effect one year at which time it would have to be brought up for a second session. He pointed out that the bill seemed to be a move to attract votes in an election year and actually did not meet the existing situation.

Williams came out in favor of lengthening the period for unemployment pay, but pointed out that the bill would not go into effect until three months after the Legislature adjourns. Presently, some experts claim that adjournment may not come until late in the summer. Williams compared the bill's one-year life to giving the public a chance to look the candy and then pulling it away from them.

A second provision, which would have set up the merit rating system for employers, would deplete Michigan's unemployment fund by some \$4 and \$12 million, according to who does the rating.

The bill's third provision, which would have forced teachers on the Great Lakes to accept sub-standard wages and employment in order to qualify for unemployment benefits.

Niblock has done a brilliant job of adding music to a text of Ecclesiastes. He has been successful not only in retaining the punch of dramatic words but in lending them a forceful dignity via skillful vocal and instrumental effects using two trumpets, two trombones, two French horns, timpani, organ and the 40-voice choir.

Another highlight was the treatment given Dele's exhortation, "The Mystic Trumpeter." The work, which has a text by Walt Whitman, is characterized by dissonance and a majestic climax.

Serious and determined during its most exacting numbers, the choir triumphed through Liszt's "O Filii et Filiae," Liszt's "Ero Sana," Mozart's "Farmer's Wife Lost Her Cat," Mendelssohn's "The Lark Song" and Beethoven's "To Maestros."

Also on the lighter side of the program were a cheerful song "De Animals a Coming" and two lively spirituals "There Is a Balm in Gilead" and "Exaltation Saw the Wheel."

Williams' "Sinner's Service" Duet, "Kiss, Weekest," "Hosanna to the Son of David" and "Breakers of the Ave Maria" were performed with sympathy and reverence.

The Madrigal Singers, a group of 12 from the choir, gave a pleasant highlight to the program with Thompson's "Alleluia," Child's "Sing We Merrily Unto God Our Strength" and "The Dear Woman's Courtship," a delightful American folk song.
