Organizational meetings for new Congress members were scheduled for tonight and May 21, 27 and 28. Officers will be nominated at the May 27 meeting and elected on May 28.

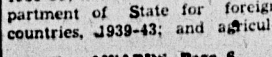
**Red Ban Lifted**

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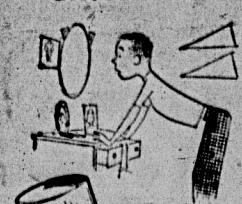

# Newly-Wed Vic Wertz' Homer Helps Bengals Edge Nats, 3-2

DETROIT (AP) — Newly-married Vic Wertz returned to the lineup yesterday and blasted a tie-breaking home run in the eighth inning to give the last-place Detroit Tigers a 3-2 victory over the Washington Senators yesterday before a slim crowd of 2,886.

Ex-soldier Art Houtteman pitched his third victory against four defeats, giving up only six hits to the Senators who had won nine of their last 10 games before yesterday.

## Rog Howard Paces Strong Mound Staff

Any Spartan baseball fan will admit that a strong pitching staff has kept the Kobsmen afloat in the Big race so far this season and that hurler Roger Howard has been the staff's most reliable "life preserver."

Howard, a 20-year-old junior from Johnstown, Pa., has nailed down three Big Ten victories so far this season. His most recent victory came last Friday in a 6-5 thriller over the University of Michigan.

Considering the Spartans have only taken five victories in conference play, Howard's accomplishment is very imposing. But even more remarkable is the fact that Rog won his first two victories on 1-0 shutouts.

Last month Howard set the University of Illinois down on three hits at Old College Field to give Kobs his initial league victory. And those same Illinois had plastered the Spartans, 12-1, in the opener of the Saturday twin bill.

Two weeks ago when the Spartans were on the road, Rog reached his peak of pitching performance. Against the University of Iowa his light hitting teammates backed him up with only one hit, but he still managed to split the Hawkeyes on three hits, 1-0.

Although he was nicked for 11 hits in beating the Wolverines, Rog scattered the blows and didn't issue a free pass. His control has been exceptionally sharp all season.

Rog, who is a right-hander and stands 5'11" tall, has also compiled a very respectable scholastic record to go along with his athletic ability. Last term he made the dean's list with a 3.8 average. Athletics have always composed a major portion of Howard's life.

Howard went to the hill the sixth with the Irish 2-1, and the sacks loaded a none out. Howard nipped potential rally by striking the next three batters.

On the Southern trip that on Howard picked up his first defeating Clemson, 6-3.

Rog feels that his best is his overhead fast ball, though he occasionally uses curve and crossfire when ahead of the batter.

Howard, who is an education major, has one ambition—to play major league ball. Although he has won few professional offers, scouts, he plans to finish college career.

No one is happier about plans than Kobs, who has depended upon top talent to keep the Spartans in the conference race. And now a league club will certainly have a real gem when Howard decides to sign.

## Zerbe Concentrates On Track at MSC

Jerry Zerbe, an athlete of many talents, has to admit he can't do four things at once. This is the number of sports the versatile Spartan junior divided his time among last Central High.

In his career as swimmer, basketball player, gymnast, and football guard is somewhat of a juggling act. After taking a quick look at the gym sport as a freshman, Zerbe has concentrated on track, where he has been one of Karl Schladerman's dependable performers in distance runs, in both track and cross-country. In his prep days at Flint Central, Zerbe won three letters in swimming, two in track, and several in football. He was guard on the football team and was a diver on the swimming squad.

In the 1949 State tournament, Zerbe limited his track to a single event, the pole vault. He entered as a contender, but after a fall in the pole vault, he was out of the competition. Zerbe decided to try his luck in distance runs, to be held at the end of the season.

The amazement of everyone was that he took third in the mile and first in the 1,500. He was a member of the state team. It wasn't until last year, when he tried out for cross-country, that he found his true field. He now has letters in each of these sports, becoming a Spartan champion in each.

It was he who was instrumental in getting State to win its first cross-country championship.

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## Five Seniors Make Last Home Appearance Against Syracuse

Michigan State's improving track team will try to do Saturday what no team has been able to do since 1947—defeat Syracuse in a dual track meet.

Coach Karl Schladerman's athletes, winners over Penn State and Wisconsin in previous dual meets this spring, may even rate a slight edge to turn the trick. Syracuse defeated Colgate last week and has won 12 straight meets dating back five years.

The meeting also will mark the last performance before a home crowd of five Spartan seniors. Included are All-American shot putter Bob Carey; Capt. Dick Henson, hurdler and sprinter; sprinter Chuck Roland; quarter-miler Lee Jones; and sprinter Bill Hervey.

Syracuse is expected to field a number of fine distance runners, including several members from the cross-country squad that swept to an NCAA championship here last November.

Orange Coach Bob Grieve has a strong entry in the 880 yard and two-mile runs. For two-milers, he can call on Ray Osterhaut, Tom Coulter, Bill Ireland and Don Freyer, who placed in the NCAA barrier meet, to oppose State's Jerry Zerbe and Ben Barr. In the 880, the Orange have strength in Steve Armstrong, Powell Benedict, Bob Fine and Ireland. The durable Ireland has also run the mile. The Spartans

will counter with Dick Jarrett and John Cook. Last week against Wisconsin, Jarrett set a new Michigan State field record for the half, going the distance in 1:53.5.

Joe Martin of Syracuse is a good bet to pace the field in the javelin, which is being added to Saturday's program. The Spartans do not regularly compete in this event. Martin recently set a school record of 193 feet 7½ inches.

Syracuse has a standout hurdler in Neil LaForest, with a season's best of 14.9 in the highs. He'll face Henry Gillis and John Corbelli. Gillis sped over the high barriers last Saturday in 14.7.

Grieve also has strength in the sprints this season. Spartan sprinter Chuck Roland will go out for his third straight sweep in the 100 and the 220. He did the century in 10.1 against Wisconsin Saturday.

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# Honorary Gives Award To Top Photographer

## Coed Named Queen by Press Group

William Kuenzel, manager of the Detroit News photography department, received the honorary award of photo journalism yesterday at the Michigan Press Photography conference. John Randall, Elk Rapids senior and past president of Kappa Alpha Mu, national photography journalism honorary, presented the award to Kuenzel at a dinner in Kellogg Center.

Kuenzel, who has been associated with the Detroit News for more than half a century, was elected by a board of KAM advisers as the nation's outstanding photographer.

Wallace Kirkland, a staff photographer for Life magazine, spoke to the group on "Adventure for Life." He talked on his experiences in shooting pictures.

Director of the conference is William K. Cumming Jr., instructor of press photography at MSU and former free lance photographer. Norm Williams, chairman of the 1952 conference, is Detroit Bureau manager for United Press Newspictures and a former Acme photographer.

Chosen "Miss Press Photographer" of the conference was Gwen Hansen, Grand Rapids sophomore. The conference is designed to review the latest photographic developments and to improve standards of photo-journalism.

Today's sessions will include symposiums on sports, photography, problem negatives and photos. There will be an equipment clinic, a shooting session with Gen. Douglas MacArthur as the subject and lectures on phases of photography by outstanding men in the field.

tural attache in the American Embassy at Moscow, 1943-46. He retired in 1947, but continues to serve as special agricultural consultant for the U.S. government.

Dr. Smith was one of the leaders in the fight to eradicate tuberculosis from cattle herds of the U.S. from 1917 to 1944. He served as director of a nation-wide campaign largely credited with the reduction of tuberculosis in cattle by 98 per cent during this period.

He taught animal husbandry at the Universities of Nebraska and Minnesota and was given an honorary doctorate from

the University of Nebraska in 1944. He retired in 1950.

Turner was Hillsdale county's first 4-H Club agent. He served as state 4-H Club leader from 1918 to 1924, when he went with the U.S. Department of Agriculture as a regional 4-H Club director. He retired in 1951.

Dr. Dorsey received master's

and doctor's degrees from Cornell University. He was head of the Department of Horticulture at West Virginia University, 1921-25, and the University of Illinois, 1925-49. A leading figure in research and development of new peach varieties for the U.S., Dr. Dorsey is secretary-treasurer of the National Peach Council.
