Administration Okays Mimeograph Purchase By MARIELLEN ALFORD

Student Congress voted to reorganize Campus Chest last night after the proposed legislation drew stormy protest from the floor.

With some members shouting disapproval, an amendment to the reorganization bill was

passed which will give the appointed head of Campus Chest power to appoint his own board of directors, subject to the approval of the Student Congress

The original bill, introduced by Bob Bolo (East Lansing), would have had the government president and Congress make all ap-pointments to the board of di-rectors and the chairmanship.

The accepted amendement. proposed by Arnold Spellun (East Lansing) will grant the student government president power to appoint, with the ap-proval of Congress, only the executive chairman of Campus executive chairman of Campus Chest from petitions submitted. The chairman will appoint a board of directors from those petitioning, again with Con-generation approval. The or-iginal bill did not call for ap-pointments to be made from weithing. petitions.

The place of some class officers in the campus setup is well established, but, still quite indefinite.
