Memorial Day No Breather for Three Spartan Squads

Michigan State teams, in action Saturday, will see no let-up in Western Conference competition at three big meets this weekend.

The tennis team will begin its Big Ten crown quest at Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., starting through Saturday.

Conference golf meet will be Friday at the University of Illinois, Champaign, Ill., during the track and field championships which start at the University of Michigan today at Ann Arbor.

Michigan State's tennis team is rated an excellent chance to come through the conference tourney victoriously. Spirited opposition is expected from Indiana, only Big Ten school to defeat the Spartans in a dual meet to date.

Stan Drobac, Milwaukee, Wis., sophomore, is rated the likely top singles man in the conference and along with Tom Belton, Dowagiac, he could take the No. 1 doubles crown also.

Actually, nearly every member of the State team can be considered a top pros-

pect for individual honors on the basis of a 4-3 southern trip and a regular season record of eight wins, one loss to date. John Sahrtian, Detroit, was part of the No. 1 doubles team that took top honors last year that took top honors. He also was a seeded player in the No. 4 singles.

Keith Kinsbie, Grand Rapids, seeded No. 5 singles man last year and a semi-finalist, is another able prospect. Dick Rieger, Kalamaire, was the No. 6 singles winner in 1951 and teamed with Kinsbie in reac-

the semi-finals in the No. 3 doubles.

Spartan golfers will face some tough competition for the Western Conference golf trophy, with Purdue, Michigan and Illinois being the pick of the lot. The event is entirely medal play.

In recent matches, several sophomores have been coming into prominence for Coach Ben Van Alstyne, including Harold Ware, Mason, and Doug Hill, Cincinnati. O'Each hit in the mid-70's last weekend and showed excellent form in doing

so. Others counted on to aid are Jack Zinn, Royal Oak; Carl Mosack, Detroit; Chuck Davensport, Midland; and Bill Albright, Detroit.

Michigan and Illinois are expected to make a strictly two team race of the 52nd annual Big Ten outdoor track and field championships. The Illinois are defending outdoor champions and won the 1952 Western Conference indoor meet, then followed up with a 74½ to 57½ dual meet win over Michigan early this month.

Michigan State will vest its hopes in miler Jim Keplord, 880-man, Dick Jarrett, and hurdlers John Corbelli and Henry Gillis. Big Bob Carey is the top field events man for the Spartans, but he will have no easy time of it facing opponents such as Fritz Nilsson of Michigan, a man who has been well over the 54-foot mark in the shot put this spring.

State captain Dick Benson, slowed by a leg injury all season, may be a top candidate for honors in the dashes if the weather is right. With

entries in all events limited to four, Chuck Roland, Bert Ross and Bill Hervey will also be in the 100 and 200 yard runs.

Unless Lou Varga recovers from a recent injury, State will have no entries in the 440, but Dick Jarrett, John Cook and Lyle Garbe will be in the 880 and Jim Keplord and John Walter will be in the mile run. Wayne Scott, Ron Bart, and Jerry Zebe will enter the two-mile runs.

It will be Detroit followed by Wayne Saturday in a pair of home games. The Spartans lost to the Irish and Detroit in earlier meetings this season and were rained out in the third inning of a scoreless duel with the Tigers.

Rog Howard will be seeking his sixth win of the year and he may be backed up by three freshmen who are also making the trip. Shortstop Stan Turner, recently mentioned by the St. Louis Sporting News as the object of several scouts' attention, will start for the second time as a starter.

Second baseman Chuck Bodnar and outfielder Jack Mayes, the hockey dash, are other possible starters in tomorrow's tilt. Both have been swatted back and forth between the varsity and jayvee all season.

MSC will get another look at Tom Buynowski, crafty right-hander who held them to six hits in the first game between the two teams which Notre Dame won 4-2. Buynowski held the Spartans in check all the way as he fanned 12 batters.

Top batter for the Irish is center fielder Joe Ridge, who tapped out two hits in the same game. Other top hitters are left fielder Dave Costigan and third baseman Harry Dunkin.



MSC Offers Course In High Explosives

MSC is probably the only college in the U.S. giving credit for work in explosives.

A one week, two-credit course in explosives is offered by the School of Agriculture the week before fall registration.

The course, open to agricultural and engineering majors, is designed to teach the use and application of explosives for ditching, stumps and boulders.

However, the main stress is on safety methods in handling, use, storage and transporting of explosives. The school has not had a single accident in this study.

This important course ranks application as the principal place of the School of Agriculture before the end of this term.

John Avery, Nashville senior majoring in agriculture took the course last year. After purchasing some equipment he was able to contract for "explosives" work which blasting was necessary. He recently gave a blasting demonstration at Olney to more than 100 people.

Last October the University became Normal in 1823. This year the college first introduced the course. The government wants to dispose of explosives left over from World War II, purchased and gave them to the college.
