More Thought

In any election campaign voters take on a responsibility to choose government leaders who will not only offer constructive programs, but will also respond to issues as they promise and will listen to student wishes.

The Student Government, still in the experimental stage of development needs a considerate and thoughtful hand at the helm next year. Responsibility to choose such a person rests squarely on the shoulders of Congressmen who will elect the President himself.

Those who have worked with the nominees on the previous Congress know well the capabilities of the candidates. However, they may be placing their support behind one or the other for reasons other than the quality of leadership which their man may exhibit. Therefore the choice becomes difficult for new Congressmen.

Attitude of the nominees on present issues on the general purpose of the Government, and an interpretation of the Constitution can be gauged from the statements of candidates as today's State News. Although such comments are not a clearly defined picture of what either nominee would accomplish, it is quite clear the basis of the two men's positions.

Statements by Nader of the most of Campus Chest expenses, and qualifications for possible financial support of personally selected clients are completely consistent. His reply to the State News shows no conflict in student organizations seems more indicative of his personal views on the subject than does Ross' answer which does not provide the possibility of self-government participation over in personal areas established on campus.

Ross' views on this and many other vital world concerns are carefully noted in final statement.

Both gentlemen reflect considerable thought on the part of the writers.

It is for the Congress, not the State News, to decide which of the two would make a more effective leader. But it is clear that issues and promises, not personalities, should be the basis for choice. To elect a candidate because of private job offers or personalities, is a vote against a candidate because of more than twice the non-partisan, non-uniformed candidate is to ignore responsibility.

Charges and counter-charges have been made by different writers since the publication. These range from accusations of Außerdem, Nazis, and supporters of a Hitler-independent basis for development to a personal machine and a standard culturist. Such charges may have some basis of truth, but in the final analysis, they were starting rumors during certain years.

It is also in the basis of these slanders of old that the new President must be elected. It is in fact and written statements, as those regarding the Nazi and Communist influence with findings of responsibility to the Government in which they are to implement party aims, as the slanders that represent strong discontent over powerful.

Pressure from old Congress members will hardly be lacking. Far from it. However, if the Student Government is in favor of a strong, well-kept, the housing and the mistakes which have been made this year, pressures must be thrown aside.

It is the duty of Congressmen, like responsibility, non-government, and the future independent must be assumed. Consider the facts, not the past, and your vote.

The team has a heavy week in store, playing Detroit in a single game Friday and Wayne in a twinbill Saturday. All three contests are home games.

In today's doubleheader Roger Howard, the probable starter for MSU, Howard, will be seeking his sixth win against one defeat.

Aqua Carnival Bleachers Go Up

Tickets Left At Desk for All Nights

Bleachers for MSC's annual Water Carnival ought to be all up by tomorrow afternoon, according to Dick Mosner, production committee chairman.

Tickets are still available for each night of the Carnival, May 3, 6 and 7, at the Union Ticket Office. Seats in the reserved sections are \$1.50 while general admission tickets are \$1.25.

When the construction is completed, the bleachers will have a seating capacity of 6,500. They are being erected, as usual, on the north bank of the Red Cedar across from Shaw Hall.

The committee has also devised a plan for the bandstand and a stage interchange, the river so everyone will be able to see the intermission entertainment. The stage is built onto the east end of the bandstand and elevated for better view.

A "dry run" with everything except the actual float procession will be directed by the committee just before the Carnival opens Monday.

The run will set a more exact timetable of acts between floats and will enable light crews to adjust spotlights for maximum effect on the floats.

Lights and wiring are almost all up, Mosner added, although the lighting for the control towers has not been completed. All of the bandstand is finished except for the decorations and painting.

Catwalks for building the floats are finished.浮游单位 may start working on their floats Sunday. Rafts should be in the water by tomorrow.

About 75 workers, including a crew from the Buildings and Grounds Department, college electricians, carpenters, and plumbers and the 12 production committee members, are working on construction.

The committee is planning to have the area cleared for floats just before the carnival and to string yellow bunting over the bleachers to cut down on noise.

About \$8,000 of the Carnival's \$10,000 budget will be used by the production committee. Around \$6,200 of this will go for labor costs, Mosner said.

Math Professor Awarded Grant

Dr. Leo Katz, associate professor of mathematics at MSC, has been awarded a grant of \$8,000 by the Office of Naval Research to study the use of mathematical models in social group problems.

Dr. Katz will work with Fred Ingram, College assistant professor of mathematics, and James H. Powell, Lansing graduate student in mathematics.

Capitol Comments

Legislators Reduce Bill on Riot Probe

Economy-minded legislators hacked \$10,000 from a \$30,000 appropriation bill intended for Attorney General Frank Millard's office, at a meeting of the Legislature last night.

The bill is intended to provide the attorney general with funds to conduct an investigation of the April 20-24 prison riots.

Another provision was added to the bill which stipulated that part of the appropriation which is not used will revert to the State General Fund.

Protests were voiced against appropriating any money for the investigation because the attorney general's office operates on state funds at present. However, Representative Adrian Bellows pointed out that the investigation will necessitate taking in more than the office was originally designed to handle.

Bellows stressed the fact that results from an investigation of this type are essential in order that proper legislation may be introduced at the next session of the Legislature.

Geer Explains New Housing Law for Men

Answering student complaints about the new housing regulation for men, Richard Geer, MSC housing director said it was only a minor change from the rule placed in effect last year.

Only new regulation he said, is that under the new rule all undergraduate men must live in College-approved housing, while last year men over 22 years of age were exempted from the rule.

He said the regulation was aimed at a small number of students who have been living in apartments off campus and have drawn complaints of wild parties from neighbors and city officials.

Exempted from the rule will be married students maintaining homes in East Lansing or Lansing, Geer said, and some special cases. For the most part, however, all undergraduate student will have to find College-approved housing, he said.

Only practical effect of the ruling will be to close up some bachelor apartments because most of East Lansing's rooming houses have already been approved by the College for student housing, the Director explained.

Undergraduate students are those students who have not yet been awarded their first degree by a college or a university. The rule will not apply to advanced students working on masters and doctor degrees.

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
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
