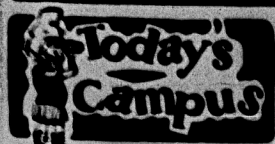

61 Students Take Deferment Exam

The Board of Examiners said 61 students took the makeup selective service examination for college deferment last Thursday. The written test is designed to place college deferments on a competitive basis so that top students will be able to complete their college training. The examinations, conducted by members of the College Board of Examiners, are sent to selective service officials for grading and the results are mailed directly to the students' draft boards.

Two Profs Asked To Study Training

Two MSC sociologists have been designated to study the effect college training and life in the U.S. have had on foreign students. They are Dr. Charles P. Loomis, head of the department of sociology and anthropology, and Dr. John Useem, professor of sociology and anthropology. Dr. Loomis has been named as a member of the newly formed committee of the Social Science Research Council on cross-cultural education. The group will make studies of professional workers trained in U.S. colleges 15 years ago and now living in their home countries.

Lewis Unopposed For Speaker's Seat

Six students were nominated for next year's four top Student Congress positions at a meeting of the new legislature last night.

Elections for the four offices will be held tonight at 7 in Room 32 of the Union. Further nominations are expected before balloting begins.

Opposing each other for the presidency will be Robert Bolo, Grosse Pointe junior representing East Lansing and David Miller, Cleveland Heights, O. junior also representing East Lansing.

Miller has served seven terms on the Congress and was speaker of the outgoing Congress. In addition, he has been chairman of the Elections Committee. He was the originator of the plan creating the Faculty-Student Source Board.

Bolo also has seven terms of experience in Congress. He was this year's speaker pro tem and a member of the committee which drafted the new Student Congress constitution and tax amendment two years ago.

He has acted as chairman of the Committee on Committees, Business and State Affairs Committee, and Big Ten Student Conference last fall. The two candidates for speaker pro tem are Harry Theuerkauf, Menominee sophomore, Abbot representative and Don Holland, Rochester freshman representing East Shaw.

Theuerkauf has been in Congress for three terms during which he was chairman of the Appropriations Committee and a member of the Ways and Means Committee.

Holland, also a veteran of three terms, worked on the Elections and Appropriations Committees. Unopposed as yet for the office of speaker is Horatio Lewis, Birmingham junior and Snyder representative. Lewis has had one year in the Congress and co-authored 25 resolutions, served as chairman of the Appropriations Committee, vice-chairman of the Civil Liberties Committee and a member of the Ways and Means Committee.

Nominee for Congress secretary is Laurel Fountain, Pickford junior, representing Women's Cooperatives. During her three terms as a representative in the last session, she was MSC's delegate to the Big Ten Student Government Conference, a member of the Faculty-Resource Board and was on the Congress Social and Inter-University Committee.

Under the Student Government constitution, the president's duties are to enforce all legislation enacted by the Student Congress requiring executive action and make periodic reports and recommendations to Congress. He may create agencies to carry out executive functions of the Student Government and name chairmen of the agencies. The chief executive also appoints the Congress treasurer and three members of the All-College Judiciary.

Red Police To Patrol Border Zone

BERLIN (AP)—The Communist East German government yesterday told Red secret police they could shoot to kill anyone found without proper authorization in a newly-created no-man's-land at the tense West German border.

Creation of the three-mile-wide zone was one in a series of retaliatory moves aimed at West Germany for signing a separate peace contract with Britain, France and the U.S.

East Germany also cut off all telephone service between West Berlin and the Russian sector and some long distance lines to West Germany. It adopted a new formula for transit visas which could strangle traffic between West Berlin and the Bonn Republic.

With these steps East Germany has created machinery which requires only a little tightening to blockade Berlin.

A senior Allied official said: "They have now arranged things so that we have the alternative of slowly watching West Berlin wither away, put the entire place on the dole (relief), or start up an airlift (as was done in 1948-49 to break the blockade). If they claim the skies above their heads too, that's it."

In Paris, the Big Three Western powers said they would regard aggression against Berlin as a threat to their own security.

Vet Medicine Students to Get First Degrees

The first Bachelor of Science degrees awarded in Veterinary Medicine at Michigan State College will be given at Commencement June 8. Fifty-one students are eligible to receive the degree. In previous years, the College gave only D.V.M. degrees in Veterinary Medicine. When the school opened in 1913, four years were required for a Doctor's degree so no other degree was offered. In 1941, the school expanded the requirements for a Doctor's degree to five years and then to six in 1947. Two years of pre-vet and two years of upper school training are required for a Bachelor of Science degree under the new program.

(The following is an open letter from Bill Bower, captain of the Michigan State baseball team, regarding reports of team "dissension" and an unfortunate display of temper which involved two members of the MSU team. We are as sorry as anyone that the situation occurred and, in an attempt to treat the matter as fairly as possible, we are printing Bower's letter.)

To The Editor:

This letter is written in strong objection to an article on the sports page at the Tuesday, May 27, issue of the Michigan State News under the headline "Skirmish Shows Team Dissension."

As captain of the baseball team, I can ask: What team dissension?

Reported in this story was an incident between two individuals which had no bearing upon the team as a whole nor was it the result of any team dissension. I can truthfully say that this was the first display of temper between ball players this spring.

On all of our road trips and at home the friendliness of team members toward each other was displayed by the close unity of the players in victory and defeat, both on the field and off. Yet the headline and story would indicate to the uninformed individual that there has been trouble on the ball club all year long and the current incident merely brought it out into the open.

I wonder if the writer of this article realizes the harm and trouble which might come from such irresponsible reporting. This was an incident which concerned two ball players and which could have been settled quietly by Coach Koberis and forgotten in a short while. Now, thanks to the publicity, it may be some time before it blows over and is forgotten.

The story was unfair and damaging to the players involved, Coach Koberis, the team, and the college. In regard to the players, it made a mountain out of a mole hill by exaggerating the importance of a personal scuffle which both players now deeply regret.

In regard to Coach Koberis, it placed a lot of unnecessary and undesired pressure on him as head coach. In regard to the team and the college, it places the ball club in a bad light and hence reflects on the college, too.

Without going into detail, I would also like to say that some of the facts in the story were distorted. The most unfortunate thing about it, however, was the implication that the incident was indicative of "team dissension."

There is another point I'd like to mention, too. In the first sentence of the article itself the writer says our baseball team is slumping. This is very unfair to the ball players and coaches.

Does the writer realize that had we won the Wisconsin game last Friday we would have qualified for the N.C.A.A. district playoffs? That means we were within one victory of the regional tournament leading to the College World Series at Omaha, Neb. Does that sound like a slumping team?

No one will admit quicker than the players themselves that we lost games we should have won. But what team hasn't? We are a winning team! (The record right now is 15 wins and 12 losses.)

Earlier in the year, while on the Southern training trip, we won the first annual North Carolina invitation tournament involving Yale, North Carolina and ourselves. Here during the regular season we won three out of five games with the two top teams in the conference, Illinois and Michigan. Does THAT sound like a slumping team?

It seems to me that "dissension" and "slumping" are not accurately descriptive of our team but as far from the truth as they can be. I think The State News owes all concerned an apology.

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Aqua Carnival Bleachers Go Up

Tickets Left At Desk for All Nights

Bleachers for MSC's annual Water Carnival ought to be all up by tomorrow afternoon, according to Dick Moorer, production committee chairman.

Tickets are still available for each night of the Carnival, May 3, 6 and 7, at the Union Ticket Office. Seats in the reserved sections are \$1.50 while general admission tickets are \$1.25.

When the construction is completed, the bleachers will have a seating capacity of 4,634. They are being erected, as usual, on the north bank of the Red Cedar across from Shaw Hall.

The committee has also devised a place for the bandstand and a stage, overlooking the river so everyone will be able to see the intermission entertainment. The stage is built onto the east end of the bandstand and elevated for better view.

A "dry run" with everything except the actual float procession will be directed by the committee just before the Carnival opens, Moorer said.

The run will set a more exact timetable of acts between floats and will enable light crews to adjust spotlights for maximum effect on the floats.

Lighting and wiring are almost all up, Moorer added, although the wiring for the control towers has not been completed. All of the bandstand is finished except for the decorations and seating.

Catwalks for building the floats are finished. Laying units must start working on their floats Sunday. Rafts should be in the water by tomorrow.

About 15 workers, including a crew from the Buildings and Grounds Department, college electricians, carpenters, and plumbers and the 15 production committee members are working on construction.

The committee is planning to have the area sparsely lit with just before the carnival and to string yellow bulbs over the bleachers to cut down on mosquitoes.

About \$6,000 of the Carnival's \$10,000 budget will be used by the production committee. Around \$6,200 of this will go for labor costs, Moorer said.

Math Professor Awarded Grant

Dr. Lee Katz, associate professor of mathematics at MSC, has been awarded a grant of \$8,000 by the Office of Naval Research to study the use of mathematical models in social group problems.

Dr. Katz will work with Fred Ingram, Olin, assistant professor of mathematics, and James H. Powell, Lansing graduate classmate in mathematics.

The three men will spend half of the 1952-53 school year working on the problem.

Capitol Comments

Legislators Reduce Bill on Riot Probe

Economy-minded legislators hacked \$10,000 from a \$30,000 appropriation bill intended for Attorney General Frank Millard's office, at a meeting of the Legislature last night.

The bill is intended to provide the attorney general with funds to conduct an investigation of the April 20-24 prison riots.

Another provision was added to the bill which stipulated that any part of the appropriation which is not used will revert to the State General Fund.

Protests were voiced against appropriating any money for the investigation because the attorney general's office operates on state funds at present. However, Representative Adrian J. Belbeck pointed out that the investigation will be necessary, taking on more than the office was originally designed to handle.

DeRoos stressed the fact that results from an investigation of this type are essential in order that proper legislation may be introduced at the next session of the Legislature.

Geer Explains New Housing Law for Men

Answering student complaints about the new housing regulation for men, Richard Geer, MSC housing director said it was only a minor change from the rule placed in effect last year.

Only new regulation, he said, is that under the new rule all undergraduate men must live in College-approved housing, while last year men over 22 years of age were exempted from the rule.

He said the regulation was aimed at a small number of students who have been living in apartments off campus and have drawn complaints of waste from neighbors and city officials.

Excepted from the rule will be married students maintaining homes in East Lansing or Lansing, Geer said, and some special cases. For the most part, however, all undergraduate students will have to find College approved housing, he said.

Only practical effect of the ruling will be to close up some bachelor apartments, because most of East Lansing's rooming houses have already been approved by the College for student housing, the Director explained.

Undergraduate students are those students who have not yet been awarded their first degree by a college or university. The rule will not apply to advanced students working on masters and doctors degrees.

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All students planning to do their student teaching for secondary education winter quarter, 1953, must submit applications before June 24. Applications should be taken to Room 201, Morrill Hall.

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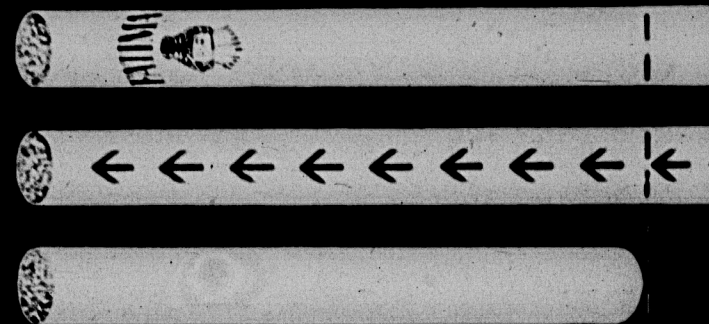
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
