Truman's 'No Deal' Title Blasted by Truman

Williams, Moody Praised As Able, Promising Leaders

President Harry Truman lashed out at the "no deal" title used by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower yesterday in a last-stop speech in Lansing.

President Truman, speaking before an estimated crowd of 5,000, declared that the Republican presidential nominee has made a series of "cold-blooded deals which can lead to war or depression."

The President focused most of his attack on the famous Eisenhower-Taft conference breakfast meeting at New York's Morningside Heights.

Eisenhower's "casual pledge over a cup of coffee" to slash federal spending by \$20 billion, President Truman said, "could mean the difference between peace and a third world war."

Spotlighting the Republican Old Guard, which he said, "has hopelessly dominated the party for almost the entire past century," President Truman added, "No matter what Eisenhower might want to do, they (the Old Guard) would take this country back to the outmoded, discredited Republican economic policies of the 1920's."

President Truman also heaped praise on Gov. G. Mennen Williams and Sen. Blair Moody.

"I hope you Democrats here in Michigan realize how fortunate you are in having Mennen Williams as governor and Blair Moody in the senate," the President said.

Both of them have "a national reputation as two of the ablest and most promising young leaders in the entire Democratic party," he added.

President Truman closed his tour of Michigan last night with a speech at the State Fair Coliseum in Detroit. During his whistle-stopping in Michigan, the President stopped at Muskegon, Grand Rapids, Durand, Pontiac, and Highland Park, as well as Lansing.

Flash photography of the speech was more than adequate with metropolitan daily and bureau having three or four representatives on hand to cover the event. Flashbombs exploded from the time the train pulled out until it left and even the train was pulling out photographers were shouting "just one more."

Members of MSC's Democratic Club were on hand to greet the President and his daughter. The President and daughter were greeted by a crowd of about 5,000 persons.

The first drama, "The First Drama," was presented by the group. It was a play about the life of a young man who was a member of the group.

The group will stay at the Kellogg Center overnight and leave tomorrow morning for Detroit where they are scheduled to appear next.

This is the second year that the Quaker has presented "Don Juan" at MSC. The first appearance was in March, 1951.

The Michigan State cross-country squad will leave tomorrow morning for South Bend, Ind., to meet the Notre Dame Harriers in the Big Ten championship race at Chicago.

Keith Schladerman will lead the team with a record of 11-1. The three unlucky athletes who have been plagued by hip and knee injuries are Jerry Zerbe, Ken Broughton and Jack Boughton.

Zerbe has suffered a sprained knee which keeps him from running. Broughton has been plagued by hip and knee injuries. Boughton has a bad knee.

The traveling team will consist of 10 runners. Other members of the squad include: Scott, Lyle Garbe, and Walter, all of whom competed heavily in upsetting State and Michigan.

State won the meet by some 100 yards. Scott finished fourth, seventh and eighth, and Walter third, seventh and eighth.

Completing the Spartan contingent for the Notre Dame trip are Ed Townsend, John Cook, and Jack Boughton.

Jack Boughton, who broke the MSC record and dual meet record last year, will be the team's main attraction.

Georgia Tech over Duke—It's Kansas like this that spoil averages.

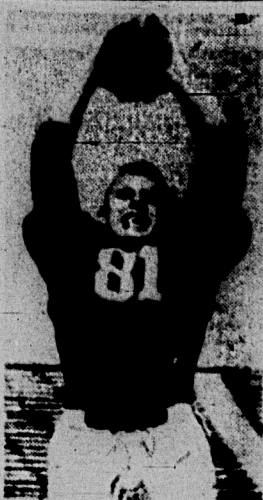

To combat the Boilermakers' offense, the Spartans possess a defensive line-up that has yielded an average of one touchdown a game this year.

Since the Oregon State game, none of State's opponents have been able to gain more than 90 yards by rushing last week, Penn State could pick up only 41 yards via the ground.

In comparison to this, the Spartans' offense has averaged 265.6 yards a game rushing and 476.6 yards per game in total offense.

Purdue scout Mike Milligan rated the Michigan State defense as great and called the Spartans one of the best defensive squads he has seen in some time.

In Ed Luke and Don Dohoney, Michigan State has two of the nation's top defensive ends. Frank Kush at guard and Dick Tamburo at linebacker have given the defensive unit a big boost since they were moved from the offensive line.

Jack Morgan and Chuck Frank have been operating at the tackle posts while Hank Bullock has shown well at the other guard position, opposite Kush. Ed Timmerman is the left linebacker while Doug Weaver replaces Frank when State uses a five man defensive line.

Munn will use his same offensive lineup, which has rolled up 174 points this season, an average of 34.8 points per game. Tom Yewell will be at quarterback, with captain Don McCallister and Billy Wells at the halfbacks and Dick Pann at fullback.

The Spartans will work out at Purdue's Ross A.D. field this afternoon and spend the evening in the Purdue Union.
