

# Ike's Victory **Comes Early**

### Stevenson Concedes As GOP Lead Grows

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower won the presidency by a landslide early today and brought to a crashing end the 20-year era of Democratic political reign.

Eisenhower even split the Southland. Down to galling defeat went Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of

Illinois who conceded at -1:44 a.m. Associated Press returns at the time Stevenson conceded showed the popular vote:

Eisenhower 17,067,455. Stevenson 14,636,336.

"My fellow citizens have made their choice . . . and I gladly accept it," Stevenson said.

Praising Eisenhower as a great leader in time of war, the beaten governor read a statement at Springfield, Ill., urging all Americans to unite behind the winner.

"I urge you all to give Gen. Eisenhower the support he will need," Stevenson said. "With a united people, with faith in democracy... we shall move forward with God's guidance . . . in freedom and dignity and

As Stevenson spoke the fateful words of concession, this was the scope of the Eisenhower sweep!

Ike had ripped Virginia and Florida away from the traditionally "Solid South" and was leading in Texas and Tennessee. He had captured Oklahoma and Maryland along the border and was out front in Missouri.

New York, New Jersey, Ohio-all big vote states-were solidly in the GOP column. So were Illinois and California.

Michigan and Pennsylvania were moving in that direction. It all added up to an Eisenhower lead in 39 states with 442 electoral votes out of 531.






