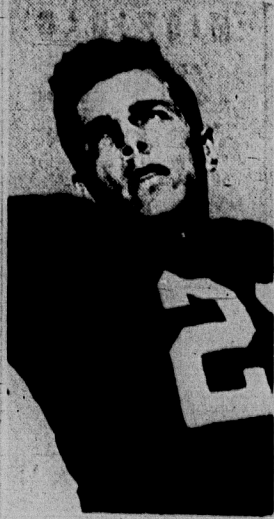

## Spartan Cage Slate Lists 22 Contests

A 22 game Michigan State basketball schedule, including the fourth annual Spartan Basketball Classic, has been announced for the 1952-53 season by Ralph H. Young, director of athletics.

The Classic includes two successive nights of basketball doubleheaders featuring UCLA, Kansas State, Notre Dame and Michigan State.

In addition to the Classic, Michigan State will play a full slate of 18 games in the Western Conference, home and home with each of the Big Ten opponents. Single games with Marquette and Notre Dame complete the season card.

Black, winner in five of six fights since turning professional, may be in for a rough night against DeLorma, according to many fight experts.

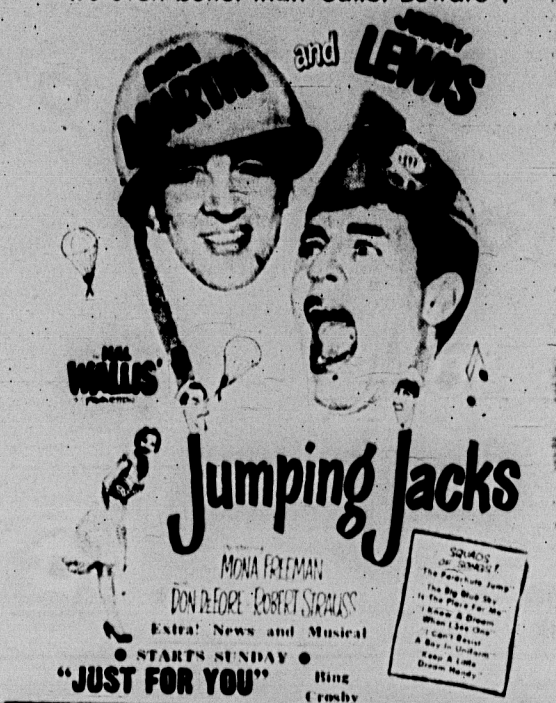
DeLorma recently fought two draws with Lefty Cash, an outstanding 147-pounder.

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# Bolo Drafts Tax Budget

## Proposal Referred to Committee

A proposed budget for the entire school year was presented to the Student Congress last night by Bob Bolo, Student Government president.

Bolo said that an open meeting will be held before Student Congress takes action on the measure. The budget was then referred to the Finance Committee for further review.

Approximately 50% of the total expected income will be spent for "direct" student benefits, according to Bolo. He said however, that it is difficult to give students something direct except to return their 25 cents. The general fund, largest item listed, is expected to cover the "direct" benefits.

Bolo pointed out to Student Congress that they were not necessarily obligated to fulfill last year's promises.

"One legislature is not bound by another legislature's promises," he said.

Bolo told Congressmen that the Student Government was still trying to make additions to the lecture-concert series but that such an attempt could use up almost the entire \$1,000 of the general fund.

He also indicated that he would ask Congress to assess students 25 cents per term for the next two terms. This would bring the total expected income for winter and spring terms to \$5,960.

A bill calling for the reorganization of Campus Chest was referred back to committee for further consideration. Several congressmen felt that they did not know enough about the bill to cast an informed vote, they said.

If the bill passes, Congress will be required to pay a part of Campus Chest's operating expenses. The amount Congress appropriates for the group will be determined by the Finance Committee, according to Kees Hagadorn, Absorbent Hall representative.

Campus Chest asked that Student Congress for \$300 to defray a part of this year's expected expenses. Bolo recommended that Congress appropriate \$225 with the balance to be paid later from funds raised by the Campus Chest.

Another bill appropriating \$120 to the equipment and equipment repair fund was approved by Congress. This amount is expected to cover any additions to the newly purchased public address system.

Student Congress also stated that they are planning to stage a free dance in the Union Building Nov. 25, MSC, place Notre Dame on this date.

Approximately 350 Michigan dairy manufacturers opened the 13th annual Michigan Dairy Manufacturers Conference yesterday at the Kellogg Center. The three day meeting is devoted to Butter day, Market Milk day and Ice Cream day.

Chris Jensen, Head of the Department of Dairy Husbandry at North Dakota Agricultural College, addressed the group yesterday on butter manufacturing.

The milk market industry will be discussed today by C. D. Dahle, professor of Dairy Manufacturing at Pennsylvania State College.

The Wolverine Club, a group of 60 Michigan bankers who attended the University of Wisconsin School of Banking will meet today at the Center to discuss various projects. The alumni club is meeting in co-operation with the Michigan Bankers Association.

About 600 Michigan milk producers will hold a meeting today at Fairchild Theatre. The farm co-operative annual meets at MSC.

The third state-wide Small Business Clinic will open at Kellogg Center Saturday with 125 representatives of Michigan small businesses expected to attend.

Clinics will be held on marketing in the areas of arts and crafts, processed food and agricultural products. Many authorities on the aspects of small business operation will appear at the sessions.

Eight of Michigan State College's top administrators will take leading parts in the 66th annual meeting of the Association of Land Grant Colleges and Universities to be held Nov. 11-13 in Washington, D.C.

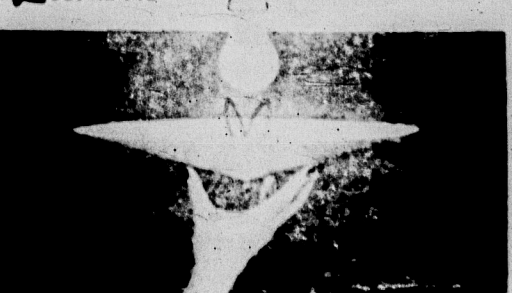

ger before the Chicago National Convention; James P. Kem of Missouri; Harry Cain of Washington; and Zales Ecton of Montana.

Democratic losers were Ernest McFarland of Arizona, the majority leader; the veteran Joseph O'Mahoney of Wyoming; William Benton of Connecticut; and Thomas Underwood of Kentucky.

The GOP Senate "class of 1946" which won a big victory when the Republicans took over Congress temporarily six years ago, fared very well in its second test at the polls.

Only three members lost—Cain, Ecton and Kem. Eleven others were victorious including Joseph R. McCarthy of Wisconsin and William E. Jenner of Indiana, both targets of heavy Democratic fire this year.

New Democratic faces in the Senate will include Stuart Symington of Missouri, former Air Force secretary and administrator of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation; Price Daniel, Texas attorney general, and four youthful members of the present House: John Kennedy of Massachusetts, Albert Gore of Tennessee, Henry Jackson of Washington and Mike Mansfield of Montana.

New GOP faces will include former Gov. Dwight Griswold of Nebraska.

## Russia Labels Michigan Daily As Warmonger

The Michigan Daily meant no offense to Russia last January when it ran a satirical editorial called "I Killed Stalin."

Charles A. Saragoe, publisher of the Salem, Ore., Statesman, said Saturday that the editorial was intended as a take-off on the Collier's article, "I Killed Stalin."

Russia had accused the Daily of warmongering. In a UN debate on freedom of information delegates also said the newspaper had made a mistake when it placed a submarine base at the inland Russian city of Minsk.

## MSC Fund Provides Help for Projects

Tucked away in one of the rooms on the Union's second floor is a college department little known to many students — the MSC Fund. Established in 1949, the fund receives gifts of real estate, cash, equipment, and securities from individuals, corporations, associations, foundations, estates, and government agencies.

These gifts have been used to improve Michigan State College— from providing money for research in turkey production to purchasing bells for the carillon.

A share of the money contributed to the MSC Fund comes from alumni through the annual roll call solicitations, according to William Davidson, MSC Fund director. Corporations, foundations, and associations are also contacted for funds as well as individuals who have no college affiliations.

Ways in which the money has been used include the providing of scholarships, fellowship and professorships. Tuition scholarships worth a total of \$165,000 per year are available to outstanding high school students. Fellowships are offered to both post-doctorate and predoctorate students from other colleges and are obtained through competitive exams.

Professorships were offered to Dr. Ralph Huston, chemistry professor, for research in basic science and to Dr. Frank Barrett, associate professor of poultry husbandry, for research in turkey production. More than 10,000 turkeys were used in this 17 year research program which is near completion. Many other phases of research were made available through the fund.

Equipment purchased for the college by the fund has been a movie projector for the Union.

Building, tape recorder for Speech and Business Education departments, an electrocardiograph used to determine the effects of athletics on teen-age boys, out-of-print editions for the library, and the newly purchased carillon bells.

In addition, the fund has established the Annual Distinguished Teacher Award, Student Loan Fund to be used by students for emergencies, Annual President's Fund and Annual Parents' Day.

The identifying of historical trees on campus and the publication of the Campus Capsules, a booklet sent three times a year to all parents of students on campus, was made possible through the Fund.
