The student directory which comes out only once a year is the only method for checking. An attempt was made last term to set up a \$600 fund for the newsletter in the new budget but this was voted down by an overwhelming majority.

Another problem is failure to register books by the students. The demand for books exceeds the supply by a tremendous amount.

Cooperation is the only way to success for STUN. First, students have to register the books they desire to sell, second, they have to report back to office when they sell a book to someone without a card, and third, the students have to be interested in buying books


