

Reds Arrest Nine Doctors

Anti-Jewish Purge Seen Taking Shape in Kremlin

LONDON (AP)—The Kremlin's crackdown on nine Russian doctors, accused as traitorous killers taking orders from Zionists, appeared Tuesday to extend ominously a purge with anti-Jewish overtones that has flamed across Soviet satellites.

The production is sponsored by the Department of Speech, Dramatics and Radio Education and is under the supervision of Dr. Robert Crawford, professor of speech and dramatics.

No definite date has been set for the production.

**Red Planes Told
To Avoid Japan**

TOKYO (AP)—Gen. Mark Clark, U.S. commander in the Far East, backed up Japan's blunt warning to Russia Tuesday to keep its planes from the air over Japan or they might be shot down.

Clark's headquarters said he had issued instructions to appropriate commanders to take all measures necessary to prevent further violations of Japan's security or acts which endanger U.S. forces.

Japan's warning, made with full U.S. agreement, reflected a toughening policy, U.S. planes have not hitherto fired on intruding Russian planes.

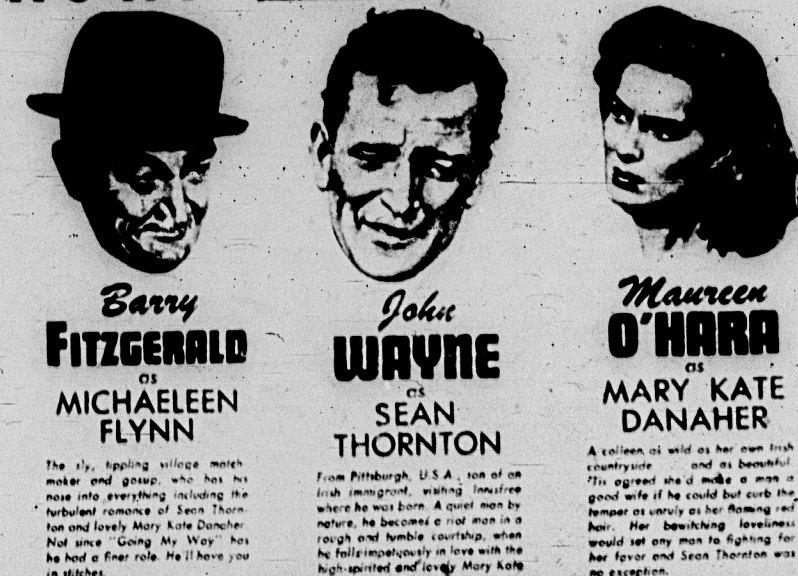

Mrs. Lynch Follows Her Five Children

Grandmother Enrolls in College at 72

Mrs. Augusta M. Lynch, after seeing her fifth and last child graduate from Michigan State College in December, is now realizing a lifelong ambition—to work for a bachelor's degree of her own.

Mrs. Lynch, a 72-year-old grandmother of 10, is as spry and quick-witted as a 50-year-old. She is a resident of Custer. Registrar Robert S. Linton said that Mrs. Lynch is enrolled in general business, majoring in insurance and real estate. She is classified as a junior on the basis of her age, special tests and courses taken previously at MSC.

Mrs. Lynch has had at least one child enrolled at Michigan State continuously since 1932.

Ruth Lynch, now Mrs. Albert Lesauksy of Custer, class of 1943, and Harry W. Lynch, East Lansing, who was graduated in December and is now enrolled in the Spartan Graduate School.

The Lynch family moved from Grand Rapids to East Lansing in 1933 following a crucial injury to the father, William G. Lynch, who died two years later. Mrs. Lynch kept the children in college by taking in boarders for the next eight years. With the coming of the war in 1941, she bought a 100-acre farm in Custer, her present home.

Mrs. Lynch's yearning for education dated back to 1901 when she started taking summer work at Ferris Institute so she could get certificates for teaching or selling insurance. She took summer work at Fer-

ris Institute for six years, after which she taught in public schools for several years. She also has taken numerous short courses at Michigan State, the latest being in 1949.

She is dead serious about her college venture. Pointing out that she is the only one in her family without a college degree, she said, "I certainly don't intend to be outdone by my children." She says there is a good possibility that she will enter the insurance business in Custer once she receives her degree.

Mrs. Lynch hopes to get a

dormitory assignment to live with "the freshmen." She added, "I might as well start right at the bottom be one of the girls."

As far as social life, she hopes to attend as many functions as possible—courses, that include are available.
