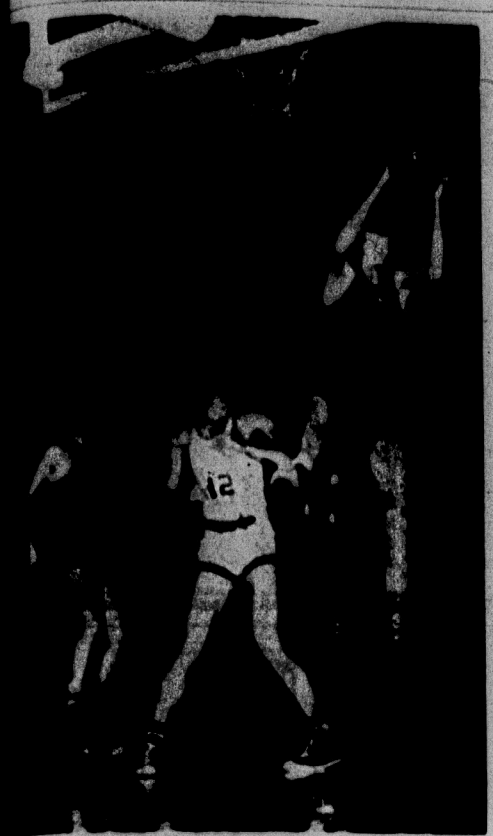


Intramural Cage Games Open in Jenison Tonight

Michigan State's winter intramural program rolls into high gear tonight with the opening of basketball in Jenison Gym. Dormitory bowling started last week to open the winter IM season.

Well over 1,000 men will take part in the independent, dormitory and fraternity basketball leagues.

Eight sports, including basketball and bowling, are listed on the winter term program. Individual badminton, handball and weightlifting entries are now being taken with tournaments slated to start later this term.

Fraternity and dormitory swimming meets are scheduled for February, and the All-College table tennis tournaments will get underway this term also.

The All-College free throw tourney is also on the list of winter term IM activities.

A new basketball league has been started by Frank Boorman, MSC's IM director. Called the "Unlimited" league, the teams are composed of varsity athletes and others ordinarily ineligible for IM competition.

Also Victor Hoosiers, Badgers Make Big Ten Wins

Indiana's Hoosiers won their eighth league victory without defeat Monday night by stamping on last place Purdue, 52-40, to highlight Big Ten cage action.

Iowa and Iowa also annexed league wins in Monday night's play. The Badgers and Ohio State, 64-51, for winning win and Iowa Northwestern, 69-68, in the seventh place and Northwestern was pushed down to the bottom of the standings.

Three contests were played on home floors of the winners: Schlundt hit five field goals and 16 of 26 free throws, 75 of the 88 Hoosier tallies. Iowa is rated No. 2 nationally by Associated Press poll.

Hoosiers finally ended a three-game losing streak by beating the Wildcats and moved back to the top of the Big Ten. Iowa is now in seventh place and Northwestern was pushed down to the bottom of the standings.

Losing Streak Presents Problem

Fans, Coach Stymied by Hockey Squad

When will Michigan State's hockey team start winning?

Many Spartan puck followers are asking themselves this question as the 22-game season moves into the final half this week. And if the fans are bewildered, Coach Anne Bessone is just as stymied.

The pucksters have played 12 contests so far this season. After winning their opening game against the Spartans, they proceeded to go into a tailspin and lost 10 straight in the Midwest Collegiate Hockey League.

It is extremely surprising that these 10 consecutive losses are not a record, but a check in the record book reveals that this is exactly the case.

In the 1948-49 season, the first year of hockey's revival after a 20-year absence, the pucksters dropped 14 games in a row. Adding insult to injury was the fact that the Spartans only played 14 games that season.

This week, the Spartans will have a golden opportunity to snap the string that has bound them for so long.

The Ontario Aggies, reportedly weaker than the tough league competition that has ruined the Spartans, will invade the MSC Ice Arena Thursday night for the opener of a two-game series.

Not that the Aggies are a pushover, but the Spartans are bound and determined to break the bonds of defeat in this series. After that, they will attempt to salvage a few conference contests.

It is difficult, to say the least, to explain the component parts of a losing streak such as the one the Spartans now hold. But most opponents will even admit that the Spartans have not had "Lucky Luck" skating with them this season.

A case in point is the six-game Western trip during the holidays. There was the epic of the team streak and probably no team ever had poorer fortune than did the Spartans in the West.

For example, three of the games were decided by one goal and two of them went into overtime. And all six games were lost by a combined total of only 11 goals.

Bessone has also pointed out that only in three of the 12 games this season have the Spartans been outshot. "One of these days we're going to start hitting the nets instead of the boards," he remarked.

The pucksters should be pretty close to full-strength for the Aggies. Co-capt. Bob Lord is ready to go again on his post. Forward George Hutton serves as the second combination. Gordie King, John Gipp and Jack Mayes, Jack Thomas and Jerry Bergin, all minor casualties from a rough Minnesota series, are back to par.

The pucksters will resume practice this week after a short layoff because of the "Holiday on Ice" show at the MSC Arena. They should be well rested for the Ontario crew, who have not fared too well in the hockey wars this season.

Bessone will probably retain Weidie Olson, Steve Raz and Ray Brooks as his number one line with Mayes, Lord and George Hutton serving as the second combination. Gordie King, John Gipp and Jim Ward will also be on hand.

North Dakota Still Leads Midwest Hockey League

Unbeaten North Dakota still hangs tenaciously to the top rung in the Midwest Collegiate Hockey League after another rough weekend of conference play.

The Nodaks trimmed Michigan Tech twice over the weekend, but had to fight for their lives to do it. Friday night Tech forced the Nodaks into overtime, but the league leaders finally pulled it out, 5-4.

It was equally tough Saturday night, but North Dakota again edged the Houghton stars, 6-5 for its eighth straight league victory.

Michigan's Wolverines, bidding for an unprecedented third straight national championship, split with Minnesota and are now tied with Denver for second spot in the league.

In other weekend action, Denver moved up by defeating Colorado College twice, 11-4 and 4-2.

Cage Scores Show Rise

NEW YORK (AP)—The scoring is going up, up and up in college basketball under the new rules.

Checking into its books, the NCAA's service bureau discovered Monday that only two major teams were averaging over 80 points a game at this time a year ago and 10 teams were allowing less than 50 to be scored against them.

This year, through games of Jan. 6, the service bureau's statistics disclose that 17 teams, headed by George Washington and Navy, have averaged more than 80 points a game. And only one team, Oklahoma A & M's perennially strong defensive outfit, was holding its foes to less than 50 points a game.

The new rules on fouls are chiefly responsible for the upsurge in point-making. The "one-and-one" rule on free throws whereby if you miss the first shot you get a second chance, the two free throws for each foul in the final three minutes, and the waiving of free throws have helped George Washington, with a scoring average of 82.3 points for eight games, took over first place from Navy's undefeated array.

Ducats on Sale For Grid Feat

Allied Tank Attack Prompts Red Reply

SEOUL (AP)—Allied tanks, planes and big guns ripped apart Communist troop bunkers, supplying shelters and communications Monday along most of the frozen Korean front. The co-ordinated attacks gounded the Reds into furious artillery and mortar shelling, and brought small but sharp fighting on the far eastern sector.

Eighth Army and Air Force communications claimed 275 Reds were killed or injured in air and ground assaults.

Temperatures hovering for days around the zero mark left ice fields frozen solid, permitting both U.S. Patton and Chinese Red tanks to cruise through no man's land in search of targets. The tanks were operating in the old Iron Triangle section north of Choson and west of Kumsong on the Central Front.

Nine Red tanks were destroyed or damaged since Sunday, air observers reported.

Only a few tank clashes have been reported this winter, but increased tank activity especially around Choson and Kumsong pointed to a possible tank battle.

Red artillery fired about 13,000 rounds of mortar and shell fire Monday—equaling the output of the preceding day.

Sabre jets patrolling MIG Alley over Northwest Korea fought two brief engagements with Red jets but made no damage claims.

Placement Bureau States Interviews For Job Seekers

The Placement Bureau has jobs available for graduating seniors. Those who haven't filed an application should do so as soon as possible, says John Schluter, placement director.

January and February are the biggest months for job interviews. There will be an average of 10 companies on campus every day interviewing a prospective employee. Companies, both national and local, from 36 states will have representatives on campus. Companies from 42 of the 48 states have requested help from the MSC Placement Bureau, Schluter said. They are interested in all graduates, regardless of their military status. Even though the new employee may be with them only a few months, he will be able to secure a job when he returns.

Three Spartan Engineers Win \$100 Awards

Michigan State engineering students received three out of five scholarships awarded annually by the Detroit Society of Engineers' Wives.

According to Mrs. Homer Harrison, society president, Spartan students have won more than the students of any other college during the five years the awards have been made.

The winners are Robert H. Perik and Daniel W. Grenawick, both of Detroit, and Harold J. Smith of East Lansing. All three are seniors.

The \$100 awards are made to junior and senior students enrolled at any accredited engineering college in the U.S. and whose parents live in Detroit. Scholarship, campus citizenship and need are considered before final selections are made.

High Honors Given By Chem Department

The MSC Department of Chemistry awarded 12 doctorate degrees and 17 master's degrees in 1952.

Three women were among the 17 who received a master's degree in chemistry.

The Green and White quintet connected on 10 of 22 charity tosses with Forest leading 30-11 at halftime. The Spartans' free throw average was an astounding .583.

Harry Combes' eagles led percentage-wise from the field with an average of .378, netting 28 baskets in 74 tries to State's 343 on 23 field goals in 67 shots.

The defeat dropped the Spartans into a third place tie with Minnesota with each squad holding a four won-three lost record.

Professors Aid Highway Development

The era of the super highway is closer to reality today due to research work by three Michigan State engineering faculty members.

Two of the men, John T. McCall, assistant professor of applied mechanics, and Roger J. Claus, assistant professor of civil engineering, have worked together nearly two years perfecting a better form of concrete. Their experiments with different forms of calcium chloride resulted in a stronger, faster hardening concrete which is more resistant to heat and cold.

The third man, G. C. Bloomquist, associate professor of civil engineering, has been working on better soil mixtures and turf growth for highway shoulders and airports.

McCall and Bloomquist have reported their findings to a meeting of highway research engineers in Washington.

City Hall Officials Hold Open House

Several hundred persons attended East Lansing's city hall open house Sunday afternoon in spite of cold weather and slippery conditions.

Visitors toured the newly enlarged and redecorated city library, the remodeled municipal offices, the fire station and police headquarters.

City officials talked about city expenses and also added some explanation on why taxes will probably go up in the next few years.

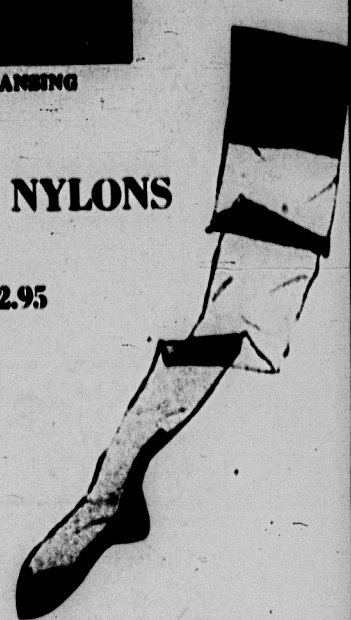
Spartacade Meet To Discuss Plans
