Every estimate is that the next four years will be ones of an great crisis as over found the falion. Russia will be coming to the peak of her military pre-paredness. Her industrial plant, augmented by that of countries conquered by Communism since 1941, begins to approach war capacity. Her political regime is acquiring the age and conse-quent creaks which could cause her rulers to take desperate her rulers to take desperate gambles in the hope of self-

Preservation.
Thus the time of expected crisis, against which America and her allies have been building their strength, comes mener and nearer. Every month can be ex-pected to produce additional

Strains.

Because he was their leader in war, because of his counsertion with the birth of the new post-war defense system, because he has now come to head the most powerful nation on earth, the world will heat to Eisenhower as it has subtentioned to ense man before.

This morning, all across the land, prayers will go up that the man be given strength for the job. Few men have stood in greater need.

Allied Tank Attack **Prompts Red Reply**

SECUL (49)—Allied tanks, planes and big guns ripped art Communist troop bunkers, supplying shelters and com-unications Monday along most of the frozen Korean front. The co-ordinated attacks goaded the Reds into furious

Hillery and mortar shellings, and brought small but sharp fighting on the far eastern

Eighth Army and Air Force communiques claimed 275 Reds were killed or injured in air and

Temperatures hovering for days around the zero mark left rice fields frozen solid, permitting both U.S. Pattons and Chinese Red tanks to cruise through no man's land in search of targets. The tanks were operating in the old fron Triangle section morth of Cherwon and west of Rumsong on the Central Front.

Nine Red tanks were destroyed or damaged since Sunday, air ob-

servers reported.
