Deficit Solutions

Michigan taxpayers can expect no early solution to the state's financial problems. The Legislature, aithough technically in session, will not get down to the business of acting on major bills for several months.

One of the reasons for the delay is the time required for appointing members to standing committees in both the House and Senate. The main reason, however, is that there are state elections to be held in April, Legislators in the past have been notorious for ignoring radical legislation

There's no reason to believe that this year will be an exception, even in view of the state's financial crisis, for no elected officer cares to jeopardize his chances for re-election by sponsoring or even favoring tax mea-

Of the many proposals which have been set forth to soive the money problem, three appear to hold preference over all others. The first would impose a one per cent income tax, the second would impose a corporate profits tax, while the third calls for a one per cent increase in the state

The sales tax proposal should be scrapped merely be cause it is a regressive tax and places the heaviest bur-den on the persons who usually can least afford it.

For four years the governor has been fighting for acceptance of his corporate profits tax, to no avail. Each time the measure is introduced it is considered

Republican members of the Legislature can be expected to go all out in an attempt to pass either the personal in-come tax, the increased sales tax or both. Gov. Williams has said that he will yeto either of the two bills if they are passed. This will be nothing new. In fact, it will follow tamiliar pattern with Williams opposing the Republican Legislature and vice versa.

It would seem that this is a time when neither political party can afford to hang on tenaciously to party ideals. Rather, this is a time when co-operation between parties is not only desirable, but instead, is man-

Let us all hope that members of both parties can reconcile their differences during the current legislative session and come up with a workable solution for removing the red ink from the record books.


