Hockey Team Ends Losing Ways

Ontario Dropped, 13-1; Mayes Nets Four Goals

After a ten-game stretch without a win, Michigan State's hockey team went on a scoring rampage to whip Ontario Agricultural College, 13-1, Thursday night at the MSCC Arena.

Only 285 fans were on hand to watch the Spartans set a scoring record for an MSCC team. Previous high was 12, set against the Aggies in 1951.

Center Jack Mayes, top scorer for the Spartans last season, found the range and potted 10 of 13 total goals and two assists. Mayes claimed the first two Spartan tallies in the opening stanza and finished off one round in each of the two remaining periods.

The Spartans moved out to a 5-0 lead in the first period and extended it to 8-1 at the second intermission.

Mayes' and MSCC's first goal came at 7:31 when he picked off Bob Revon's long shot and knifed it past Aggie goalie, Bob Wirth. Less than a minute later, Mayes broke through the Aggie defense and put one in unassisted.

Ray Brooks tallied at 9:00 as he dug out the puck from behind the cage, skated around, and converted for another unassisted play.

Wirth, though, hit the cross bar 36 seconds later as he took a long direct ice pass from Steve Star who remained on a man play from Brooks.

The Spartans had to wait 12 minutes for their next tally, the longest wait in the action-packed first half, when fourth-year western devotee, recently in eighth place, followed by only Michigan and Purdue. The Princeton sprinter bagged his two在家前半場。

At the start of the season, the Cats were tabbed as the darkhorse until in the conference experts gave them a good chance to finish high in the Big Ten race. However, the Purple has shown brilliance on only a few occasions. While Weber's crew defeated Minnesota on the Minneapolis campus, while losing to Iowa, 19-14, last Monday.

In a surprising building dash, the Spartans downed Northwestern by the count of 27-17. The visitors possessed a starting line-up that averaged a starting point of 1.75. The tallest member of center Frank Hartwick, who dropped in 15 points against State, on the earliest contest between the two squads.

Leading Northwestern scorer is forward Larry Kunkle, who has a 10.7 average per game.

On the Spartan side of the ledger, Ferraro has vaulted to the eighth position among leading conference scorers with a 14.6 average.

Blackburn and Armstrong rank 19th and 22nd respectively, in the scoring list with averages of 12.6 and 11.7.

Newspaper Conference Scheduled at Kellogg

Talks, Panels To Highlight 85th Session

More than 300 editors and publishers of Michigan weekly and daily newspapers will meet today and Saturday at Kellogg Center for the annual convention of the Michigan Press Association.

The annual Press Association conferences are held for discussion of mutual problems of the members, to give information on new trends in the newspaper field and to promote friendship and cooperation among Michigan newspapermen.

Among those attending the meeting will be Guy Jenkins, chief of the Lansing Bureau of Booth Newspapers; Jack Green, of the Associated Press; Douglas Graham of the United Press; and Mab George, political correspondent for the Detroit Free Press. These four men will act as a committee to introduce Michigan pressmen to representatives of the Michigan legislature, including Sen. Harry J. Little (East Lansing); Sen. Don Vanderwerp (Frederick); Sen. Crockett Cole (Marshall); and Representatives Arnell Engstrom (Traverse City), Rollie G. Conlin (Tipton) and Edward Carey and Gerald E. Murphy (Detroit).

Pres. John A. Hannah will welcome the legislators and MPA members on behalf of the Board of Agriculture at a dinner to night.

Among the addresses planned for the group today are a talk by Robert Kazmayer, publisher of a Michigan newsletter service on "Whither America in 1957"; Kazmayer will speak at the president's luncheon.

Clarence Mantan, author of the book "The Key to Peace," will talk on "Blueprint for Freedom." Publishers of weekly newspapers will hear a talk on advertising and then will gather for round-table discussions on retail advertising rates and contracts.

Representatives of the dailies will hear Earl Leavens of the Indianapolis Times on Saturday. Leavens' topic will be the circulation trends of daily newspapers. Editorial trends will be discussed before this group by Don Carlson of the Niles Daily Star.

Another discussion of current interest will be "What's Wrong with Driver Licensing." The major recommendation of the Michigan Highway Safety Seminar held recently was that the job of licensing motor vehicles should be made the responsibility of a single agency.

Featured entertainment on the Saturday schedule will be a program of music by Charles Vance.

This year's MPA convention marks the 85th anniversary of the Association, which was founded at Jackson in 1958.

An "All-Michigan Banquet" in the ballroom of Kellogg Center will end the conference Saturday evening.

Men's Glee Club to Give Concerts in 11 Cities

Plans for the fourth annual men's glee club concert tour through the Lower Peninsula were announced by John McGoff, assistant director of Alumni Relations.

The tour begins March 25 and runs through March 31.

Twelve concerts are scheduled by the 45-voice group, under the direction of Edward Richmonde, instructor in music.

Concerts are set for Hastings, Lowell, Fremont, Leland, Cadillac, Coldwater, Benton Harbor, Niles, Kalamazoo and Grand Rapids. Two performances will be given in Gaylord, Ind.

March 22, the Glee Club will be heard over the Mutual Broadcasting System on a coast-to-coast hookup. The show will be transcribed and broadcast from New York.

The glee club has toured Michigan, parts of Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula in last year's tour, as well as broadcasts over the Mutual Network and the National Broadcasting Company. An inmate dropped some burning material in highly inflammable rags from which the twine is made. Two other inmates quickly squelched the blaze before it could spread.

The inmate responsible claims he was an accident, Bannan said.

State police have not been alerted to the new unrest, Bannan said. He added the only precautionary measures he had so far taken were in calling in all his deputies to duty Thursday night.

In his prepared statement, Bannan said that Dr. Finch's claim that there has been a policy of brutal treatment at the prison is entirely unfounded and untrue to the custodial staff or the inmates.

Bannan said there has been only one incident in which prisoners were struck by officers since he took over as warden last summer.

Jan. 27 Billiard Tourney Winners To Gain Acclaim
