The latest rash of intervention in college athletics has one far enough. Despite all the talk about desemphasizing the commercial aspects of the game, there are persons who believe that college Sports operate for benefit of sports-writers, Monday-morning quarterbacks and self-styled ex-

If the NCAA is going to limit television and supersee other aspects of collegiate athletics—then we pro-pose that unconcerned persons restrict their promotion schemes to wrestling or some other form of commer_



SACRAMENTO (A)-- Mervyn Shea, former Detroit Tiger coach and for the past two seasons coach of the Sacramento Solons in the Pacific Coast League, died Tuesday after an illness of a year

Shea, who spent parts of 10 seasons catching in the big leagues, was bought by the Tiggs for \$40,000 in 1927. After three seasons he was sold to Milwauker, returning as a coach under form-

Shea's best season was 1933, when with the Red Sox and Browns he equalled the American League fielding record for catchers with a 996 average and set a major league record by handling 409 consecutive chances without processing the season of without an error.
