

Tankers, Cagers Face Rough Foes

Swimmers Meet OSU. Then Tangle With Illini

The preliminaries are over for Coach Charles McCaffrey's swimmers as they plunge into a rough week of Big Ten activity Saturday afternoon in Columbus against Ohio State.

If the tankers get the Buckeyes, there will be a brief rest. Next they engage Illinois in a meet and take the road next Saturday against Purdue.

The all-powerful Buckeyes, winners of four straight conference crowns also reign as reigning champion of the Big Ten. Michigan State was runner-up in the Big Ten last year and took a fourth-place finish in the national championship.

Factor the Spartans swimming against is the Buckeyes. In a series going back to 1922, Ohio State has defeated Michigan State swimmers 12 times.

Coach McCaffrey said the Spartans' biggest hope lies in the loss of veterans by the Buckeyes. The Spartans' crew will be led by Ford Kenna and Dick Kenna, the most plus swimmers who are lost by the Buckeyes.

Today's meet with the Illini, which is expected to be a high level of no pushover, will be to McCaffrey.

The meet will begin in Columbus at 4 p.m. and all swimmers will be admitted by showing their membership cards.

Michigan State's swimmer, John Walker, who was first runner-up in the season and was defeated by highly-regarded swimmer, 62-31. They were defeated, however, by the Buckeye Badger pool.

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Purdue Next For Spartan Wrestlers

State's wrestling team faces Purdue Saturday afternoon as the Spartans shoot for their fourth straight victory and a continuance of their clean slate in Big Ten mat competition.

Spartan coach Fendley Collins said he would start the same team that defeated Iowa 72-5 last week except in the 177 pound weight class.

Regular starter Ralph Gill is all right but the and will be replaced by Dick Abraham. The rest of the team will be: Bob Gunner, 125 pounds; Ed Chaschke, 130 pounds; Dick Gunner, 137 pounds; Jim Knott, 147 pounds; Bob Hoke, 157 pounds; Vito Perone, 167 pounds; Dick Abraham, 177 pounds; and Larry Fowler, heavyweight.

Collins said that Purdue's best men will be in the heavyweight and 123 or 130 pound classes.

The Spartans' next match will be a week from Saturday, Feb. 7, when they take on Michigan at Ann Arbor.

Basketball Team Battles Gophers for Third Place

The cage quintets of Michigan State and Minnesota will square off in a battle for third place in the Big Ten Saturday at Jonison Fieldhouse at 8 p.m.

To the victor belongs undisputed possession of third place behind idle Illinois.

The Spartans enter the contest trailing the Golden Gophers by a half game margin. State holds a five won-three loss mark compared to the visitors' six-three record.

In an early season engagement, Minnesota dropped State by a 61-47 margin, although the Green and White outscored the Gophers in field goals, 18 to 17. The triumph was gained at the free throw line, where Ozzie Cowles' crew sank 30 points.

Minnesota is paced by guard Chuck Merrell, who tanks third in conference individual scoring with an average of 19.1 per game. The 5'11" Merrell nets a great majority of his points with a jump shot, which is quite similar to a shot formerly employed by Whitey Shoop, an ex-Gopher star guard.

Second ranking Minnesota threat is center Ed Kalafat, who has an average of 14.6.

As has been the case for several weeks, forward Al Ferrai still leads the Spartans at the basket with a 15.8 average, which places him in the eighth position among leading conference scorers.

Pete Newell's probable starting line-up includes Ferrai and Keith Stackhouse at the forwards, Bob Armstrong at center, and Rickey Ayala and Jim Schlatter at the guard positions.

Concerning the physical condition of his squad, Newell said, "I don't expect too much from Ferrai against Minnesota because he hasn't been his old self in practice this week as a result of a combination of a cold and heavy participation in outside activities." Newell was quite perturbed over the latter fact.

A strange situation has arisen over attendance at Spartan home games. Despite a fine band of basketball offered, the students are not attending the Jonison battles as expected. In recent games the general public has outnumbered the student crowd.

The conference second place team, Illinois, drew the largest attendance of the season on Jan. 19 when almost 3,000 fans visited Jonison Fieldhouse.

Intrasquad Tilt on Tap For State Hockey Team

League competition will again beckon the varsity next weekend when they travel to Houghton to battle Michigan Tech for two games.

Shea, Former Tiger, Dies on West Coast

SACRAMENTO (AP)—Mervyn Shea, former Detroit Tiger coach and for the past two seasons coach of the Sacramento Solons in the Pacific Coast League, died Tuesday after an illness of a year. He was 52.

Shea, who spent parts of 10 seasons catching in the big leagues, was bought by the Tigers for \$40,000 in 1927. After three seasons he was sold to Milwaukee, returning as a coach under former Tiger manager Del Baker in 1939.

Shea's best season was 1933, when with the Red Sox and Browns he equaled the American League fielding record for catchers with a .996 average and set a major league record by handling 499 consecutive chances without an error.

Eisenhower stressed the need for a healthy world economy as the key to the nation's food price problem. He also cautioned the farmers present never to depend on a fixed formula.

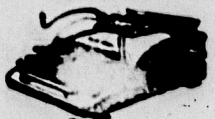
He played a false economy for supporting the present high price of farm products brought on by the Korean war. He cautioned that since the U.S. ships shipping goods and military aid abroad, with the cost being the taxpayers, the farmers would be hit hard unless adequate steps are taken.

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Money Needs May Grow With Michigan's Schools

Despite the present appropriation tension, problems may be in an infant stage.

According to interpretive materials compiled by the Michigan State College administration, enrollment in Michigan's state-supported colleges and universities will skyrocket from an approximate 1952 total of 43,000 students to an estimated 96,000 by 1970.

With such an enrollment boost, MSC statisticians see a rise in educational appropriations from an approximate \$36 million in 1952 to about \$83 million by 1970.

Administration officials believe that such upward financial swings will become of paramount importance if enrollment estimates follow expectations.

And the financial question between MSC and the state Legislature may grow with a great boost in attendance of public colleges in Michigan. While public enrollment topped that of non-public by a 1950 count of approximately 77,000 to 30,000, it is expected that in 17 years hence the ratio will be 158,000 to 37,000.

Philip J. May, comptroller of the College and treasurer of the state Board of Agriculture, said Wednesday that the \$11,707,000 appropriation recommendation of Gov. G. Mennen Williams fell short of College requests in every field of operation.

May said that the college operational costs were not the only ones trimmed from the original request. The college, which is receiving \$11,194,000 for the year ending June 30, made an original request for \$13,375,250 for the coming year.

Gov. Williams recommends \$1,260,000 for the Co-operative Agricultural Extension Service, while MSC's bid was for an appropriation of \$1,792,733. Last year the Legislature passed a budget allocating \$1,145,831 for the College.

In finances regarding the Agricultural Experiment Station, May said that a request of \$1,675,604 was passed by the governor to a recommended \$1,128,900. The present appropriation is \$1,020,420.

Williams has proposed that the Legislature hold its ground providing funds for the Hope Planning Program, an extension branch that deals with research in marketing and distributing methods, among other purposes. The college has asked for \$293,000. The governor has advised an appropriation identical to the present \$203,000.

May added that the school asked the Legislature for a capital outlay that would cover funds for construction of a new library, animal industries building, school of education, seed storage building, school of business.
