

President Says UMT Not Feasible

Hawaii Statehood **Strongly Advocated**

WASHINGTON (A)-President Eisenhower voiced willingness Wednesday to meet Joseph Stalin face to face and thresh out differences splitting East and West. The President imposed conditions however, that the Russians have turned down repeatedly in the past. Eisenhower made his qualified offer in response to questions at a news conference. He said he

would meet anybody anywhereeven half-way to Russia--to ad-vance the cause of peace. But he aid he would do so only if any agreements made were safeguard. d against violation.

Russia has rejected "self-enforcing" agreements consistent-ly. The Rumans have refused to permit U.N. or any other in-spection teams on Soviet soil.

The President said among other things: 1. This country might find it-

This country might find it-self in an awkward position if it tried to repudiate all the serret agreements inade by Democratic Presidents with the Russians in World War II.

3. The Korean conflict is a fairly major war, and he dom-n't at the moment see how uni-versal military training could be started on top of the draft program needed for Korea.







This is the Dionysians' motto-one which they are having trouble living up to.

This year they are contending themselves with the first part and presenting neither comedy, nor tragedy, nor story, nor anything. But at their meeting Tuesday night, "The Dihardians" attempted to get back on their feet for next year.

Since 1946, Dionysians have organized a yearly musical comedy in which all acting, dancing, directing, choreography, sets and other backstage work is done by MSC students with members of the Speech Department staff in advisory capacity only. They have given some good shows, and helped to send alumni on to Broadway and the big time.

But they have yet to prove themselves.

Dionysians' aim is to present an original college pro-duction. It takes long, careful planning to work up a good student-written, produced, and acted show.

This year the two tries for production failed mainly because details were not worked out carefully enough or worked out in advance.

Dionysians reportedly are \$1,000 in debt. The show which they produce next year will have to be planned carefully enough this year to justify the continuance of an independent student theater group.

Now the organization has received an ultimatum: Merge with the Speech Department or disband entirely! Dr. Wilson Paul, head of the Speech Department, gave the stand of the dramatics department:

"We feel that we should not approve a policy of de-veloping another original which will enter the same field of production as has been entered by Theta Alpha Phi and the drama program of the MSC players of this department.

The administration, in issuing the ultimatum, said the Dionysians were not strong enough, had violated their constitution by not scheduling a college production, and had insufficient planning.

If Dionysians folds completely, future musical comedies are likely to be produced by the Speech Department or dropped entirely.


