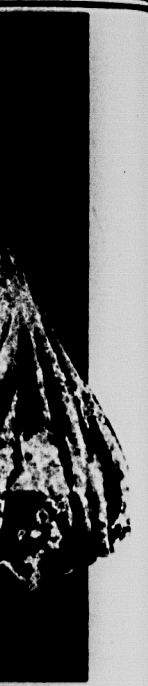

Joan Streadwick, Clawson junior of Delta Zeta, Wednesday was elected president of PanHellenic Council.

Other officers elected were first vice president, Jan MacDougall, Detroit junior of Kappa Alpha Theta; second vice president, Jean McClure, Chelsea junior of Alpha Xi Delta; secretary, Marilyn Byram, East Lansing junior of Pi Beta Phi; and treasurer, Carol Buttolph, Grand Junction, Colo., junior of Alpha Phi.

The new officers will be installed at a banquet April 8 in the Union. They will start their official duties spring term.

Editorially

Mr. Velde Flunks, Needs Experience

Representative Harold H. Velde (R-Ill.) has a lot to learn about the doubtful art of "investigation a la Congress."

Mr. Velde is obviously not half so skilled at this tactic as his Senate counterpart, Wisconsin's famed Mr. McCarthy.

Velde's chairmanship of the House Un-American Activities Committee is in jeopardy because it appears that he unwittingly bit off more than he could chew in saying that his group intends to investigate communism in the churches.

In time, Mr. Velde will probably learn that a master congressional investigator never even hints at subversive activity in institutions like churches, colleges, labor unions, and the like may be described as "hotbeds of communism" but there are some organizations that one just doesn't attack.

Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr. (D-N.Y.) has asked that Velde be ousted from his job as chairman of the Committee because of "threatened investigation" of churches and clergymen and because of Velde's "admittedly false and reckless charge" that Mrs. Agnes Meyer (wife of the board chairman of the Washington Post) was friendly with Russia and had written a pro-Soviet article.

In time Velde will probably also learn not to be so specific in making charges. Character assassination is very effective but must be used cautiously. As it turned out, Velde had the wrong Mrs. Meyer and he quickly became silent on the issue.

The situation involving the threatened church probe has become so snarled that other members of the Committee are attempting to pass a resolution that will hamstring the impetuous Velde. They want to make it necessary that the Committee members approve any investigation before it is announced or begun.

It has been pointed out that Velde's imprudent declaration that the group would investigate churches was typical "Veldeism" in that he struck out at the clergy because his questionable methods have been criticized by two prominent clergymen recently.

New Branch Plan for ROTC Used This Year

This year, for the first time, juniors enrolled in the Army ROTC program are following a plan under which they will not know to which branch of the Army they will be assigned.

Michigan State, along with 50 other colleges, is testing a new program called "Branch General." Under the new program, each cadet is classified by the college during his junior year for one of the 15 branches of the Army.

This constitutes a recommendation to the Department of the Army for final assignment, and is based on the following: (1) the student's preference; (2) his academic major and minors; (3) his academic achievement; (4) his aptitude; and (5) his leadership potential.

The final step in classification is the consideration of each recommendation by the board of review. MSC's reviewing board is composed of Deans Crowe and Rodney representing the college, and Col. Clemens and Lt. Col. Verbeul representing the military.

Recommendations of the reviewing board from Michigan State are forwarded to the Department of the Army, which makes the final assignment to a specific branch of the Army.

Final assignments must be received before plans for attendance at the summer camps of the assigned branches can be made.

Three scientists have developed a "time compressor" machine which can reduce an hour and 15 minute speech to a 59 minute one. Two of the inventors (who must not have realized what this could do in their profession) are a professor and a dean at the University of Illinois.

The machine works on the principle that the ear can pick up words faster than a person can speak them. It cuts up the words into very small sections, discards some, and pushes the rest together as it records. The pitch and meaning are not affected even when as much as 50 per cent of the time is tossed out.

Think of what you, a student, could do with one of these machines! Just by winding a little tape around a revolving drum you would be assured of up to 30 minutes' legitimate sleep for every hour of lecture.

In its present state the machine might be a little unwieldy to carry to class, but if Dick Tracy could invent a wrist-size radio, surely some enterprising student could make a midget compressor.

Because the machine records, you need not even go to class at all, for that matter. Just strap the midget device on the wrist of the amiable scholar who sits next to you, and take the day off.

And the machine works the other way, too. It can stretch time by filling in the gaps between sections of the words like putting extra boards in the dinner table. Say you have a three-minute speech due in class. You could prepare enough material for a minute and half, set the machine for 50 per cent expansion, and pantomime while you play back the tiny recording tape.

Who said time waits for no one?

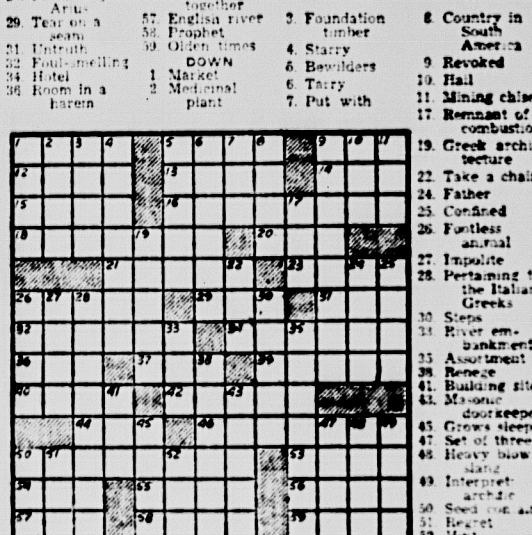

Spartan Teams Take Rest Before Entering NCAA Tournaments

Michigan State's athletes can take a well-deserved rest for a while after completing both regular seasons and the Big Ten championships. Only the track team will be in operation over a three-week stretch, while the other squads have either called time out or completed their schedules.

Basketball and Hockey have capped up their competition for the season while the wrestling, swimming, gymnastic and tennis teams are waiting for the annual Collegiate Athletic Association tournaments.

The boxing team will get back into action March 23 after a month lay-off when they meet Wisconsin, last year's NCAA champion.

Coach Karl Schladerman's track and field team will be busy with the many relay races slated for the next few weeks. This weekend some of State's top squad, that finished in fifth place in the Big Ten meet, will be in Milwaukee for the Milwaukee Invitational meet.

Coach Charles McCaffrey's basketball team will get back into action, but they still don't know where they stand in the Big Ten. They will play Wisconsin on March 26, 27 and 28, but the results haven't been determined yet.

The Spartan wrestlers, who finished second in Michigan in the Big Ten meet, will travel to State College, Pa., March 27 and 28, where Penn State will host the meet.

George Szypula will take his basketball team to Syracuse for the NCAA meet March 26 and 27. Leading the Spartans will be Earl Rintz, who won three individual titles while leading the team to a third-place Big Ten finish.

Coach Charles Schmitter will lead the Big Ten's champion, to lead his squad in the NCAA fencing meet slated for March 27 and 28 at Philadelphia.

The Spartan boxers have two more meets on their schedule before they travel to Pocatello, Idaho, for their NCAA clash. They will meet Wisconsin, March 28, and the Quantico Marines, April 1. Both meets are slated for the Fieldhouse. The NCAA meet is scheduled for April 9, 10 and 11.

State swimming coach, Charles McCaffrey, will handle the head tank duties and Fendley Collins, wrestling mentor, will act as manager of the mat competition.

The two meets, besides showing some top-notch prep school competition, will serve as a "homecoming" for several Spartan graduates now coaching at various institutions around the state.

A quintet of swimming mentors hold State degrees. Nearest and most familiar to Spartan fans is Fred Stillman, who holds the reins at Lansing Eastern.

Completing the group are Alex Crane, Flint Central; Will Cooley, Jackson; Bill Beach, Bay City; and Herb Schroeder, Dearborn.

Five mat coaches, including two from Lansing and one from East Lansing, have been graduated from the Spartan realm. Iggy Konrad, who tutors a journey-favored Lansing Sexton crew, probably holds the most enviable position.

Don Johnson, however, also feels fairly secure in that his Lansing Eastern squad is second No. 2.

The other three include East Lansing High School's Pat Sullivan, Jackson's George Bender, and Ypsilanti's Bert Waterman.

The two contests differ in only one respect. In the swimming only Class A competition is scheduled, while the mat engagements are for all schools, despite size, that field wrestling squads.

Preliminaries in both sports

will start at 7:30 tonight with the wrestling events slated for Jensen Gymnasium. Only diving finals will be held in the pool tonight.

Wrestling semi-finals will be held at 2 Saturday afternoon while the swimmers will tangle at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Finals in both meets are scheduled for 7:30 Saturday evening. All sessions are open, free of charge, to the public.

Mat competition in the sixth annual meet will be featured in 12 classes, ranging from the 95-pound division to the unlimited or heavyweight.

Lansing Sexton has gone undefeated in dual meet competition this season—therefore, its number one rating.

Lansing Eastern, beaten only by Sexton, will be pushed for runner-up honors by Ann Arbor, which has been pinned by both Lansing squads.

Competition among the natators will feature seven individual events and two medley races. Heavily favored in the meet is powerful Dearborn Fordson, current champions of the Border Cities league.

Close behind will be Grosse Pointe, Jackson, recently crowned as the best in the Five-A league, and the Saginaw Valley champ Saginaw Arthur Hill.

Three defending individual champions of the 1952 meet will be back to defend their respective titles.

The trio includes two Fordson stars, Kenneth Gest in the 50-yard freestyle and William Black in the 200-yard freestyle.

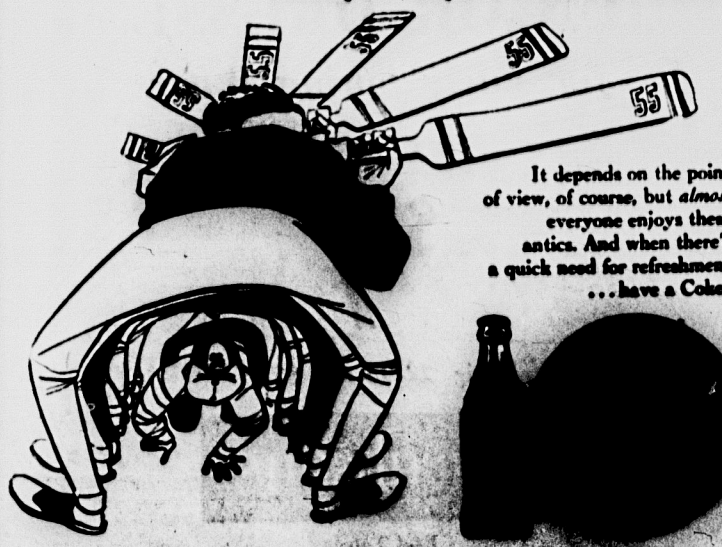

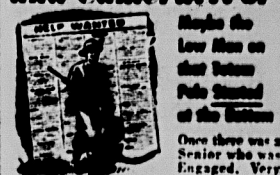
Big Ten Cage Coaches Meet

Because of the increased enrollment the library was expanded in 1949 into another building, the Library Annex, which holds 150,000 more volumes and 5,000 study seats. At the present time 500,000 volumes are crammed into the space for half that number.

The proposed new library would be built for 15,000 students with study areas for 3,000 and storage for more than a million volumes.

which and the Russian War on the basis of the U.S. Soviet Embassy in Moscow. The Soviet Embassy in Moscow quickly rejected his appeal.

The Assembly wound up the Korean debate, for the present, at least, by rejecting, 54 to 5 (Soviet bloc), a Soviet demand for liquidation of the UN Commission on the Unification and Rehabilitation of Korea. It passed a resolution, 55-5 (Soviet bloc), calling on all countries to pay up promptly the pledges they have made toward Korean relief and reconstruction.

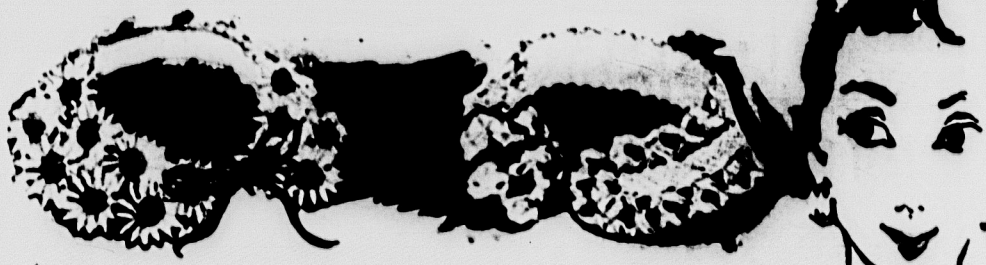

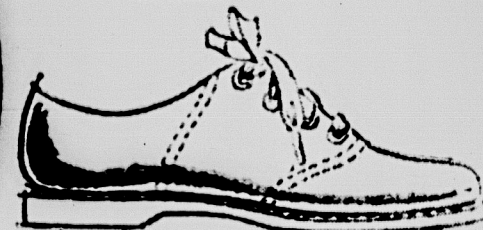
