
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

# Yogi-talk-A Word for It...

Here's more trouble for frustrated crossword puzzle fans. According to Editor and Publisher columnist Ray Erwin, there is a word hobbyist in Baltimore who is rapidly revamping the English language by shrinking it.

Dr. Jacob E. Schmidt, however, isn't doing anything new. Many contractions are now part of our daily voca-bulary. "Smag" from smoke and fog and "brunch" from breakfast and lunch are some recent addition Welfe Kaufman, theatrical press agent, is credited with coining "whodunit" for mystery stories,

H. L. Mencken calls "O.K." the "most shining and most successful Americanism ever invented." It is traced to President Van Buren, called Old Kinderhook after his birthplace and in 1840 his supporters organized the "O.K." club. It has stuck with us ever since.

The correct word defining the morning yawn-stretch. Dr. Schmidt avers is "pandiculation." He calls Soviet policy "hashibanukery," a combination of cruelty and hasrishness. If you are agraid of thunder you are a "brantophone," and if you bite your nails you suffer

Dr. Schmidt dismisses the charms of Dagmar as "callicolpia." An "anhedonist" is incapable of happiness and a "preterist" is excessively preoccupied with the past. A marriage broker is a "proxenette," a horse thief is a "hoppo-klept," and a mathematics-hater is a "misomath."

What is an employe performing more work than is required really doing? "Superogation" says the doctor of vocabulary. Other choice definitions are "polynemant" for a word with several different meanings and "matribeal" to describe a marriage where the bridegroom goes to live with the wife's family.

The doctor can coin a word for every occasion. A professor at Miami University asked him once for a word to describe his wife, who fears her oil burner might explode. Dr. Schmidt came up with "eleofornapoldophobe," which comes from "eleo" (eil), "forna" (furnace), "plodo" (explode) and "phobe" (One who is afraid).


A man turned wolf is "lyncanthropized," and lucky people have that treasured gift of "serendipity." He describes excessive devotion to accumulation of riches as "mammonolatry." Government of a nation by its norm representatives is "kakistocracy." A shrewish woman is "mantigolingual" which means literally, whip-tengued. Longing for the good old days is called "besternaphilia."

These are just a few of Dr. Schmidt's definitions. Whether any will creep into the English language, like Fresident Warren Harding's "normalcy" and Gov. Elbridgs Gerry's "gerrymandering," only time will tell.


