Conferences Ask for Killing Of NCA Ruling

CHICAGO (AP)—Presidents of four major college athletic conferences Monday night asked the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools to "immediately suspend its proposed enforcement procedures."

Heads of colleges in the Big Ten, Big Seven, Missouri Valley and the Skyline Conferences unanimously approved the request at a special meeting.

The NCA, an accrediting agency governing colleges and secondary schools in 19 states, last September forbade schools under its jurisdiction to give athletic scholarships.

Later, the group threatened Oklahoma A. and M. with academic blacklisting on a charge of subsidizing and recruiting of athletes.

The college presidents, at their meeting, decided that the NCA's regulations were "extraneous" and "confusing" in view of "proper machinery to control athletics existing in various regional athletic conferences," spokesmen said.

They also signed a telegram sent to the board of review and the executive committee of the NCA Commission on Colleges and Universities.

Or Who Wants a Pennant? West Readies for East In Major League Races

NEW YORK (AP)—East is east and west is west, and until the twain meets you aren't going to be able to get a very accurate line on the major league races.

To date, eastern teams have been trying to knock each other's brains out, and ditto for the western teams, and although certain rather significant events have occurred, such as the well-regarded New York Giants dropping a series to Pittsburgh, the line is rather dim.

The National League champion Brooklyn Dodgers, who won their pennant by topping over second-division clubs like the Braves, have had only one chance at their 1952 patios to date, but on that occasion they started right where they left off. They took three straight from the Pirates.

The Giants figured to be tough on their pitching, with the big question concerning how long the pitching will hold up. It's still the question, although you can be pretty sure there will be no sagging on the part of Robin Roberts and Curt Simmons.

The Giants got away to a feeble start largely because two of their key men, Monte Irvin and Bobby Thomson, couldn't buy hits, and the other first-division, last year, National League club—the St. Louis Cardinals—got away from the batter well as Stan Musial and that century plant, Enos Slaughter, resumed hitting where they left off last fall.

There is still the idea the Dodgers won't have it as easy with second-division clubs this year, despite their early success against Pittsburgh. The Cubs and Braves, particularly, aren't going to play dead for the Bums, and Rogers Hornsby might just possibly have found an antidote at Cincinnati for the Brooklyn poison.

In the American League the Yankees, who started well against their eastern opponents, start their western invasion Wednesday against the Browns, a team which on its showing to date may not be exactly a soft touch.

With all the respect to the White Sox, who have been picked in some quarters to win the pennant, Cleveland generally is rated the team the Yankees will have to beat if they are to win their fifth straight championship.

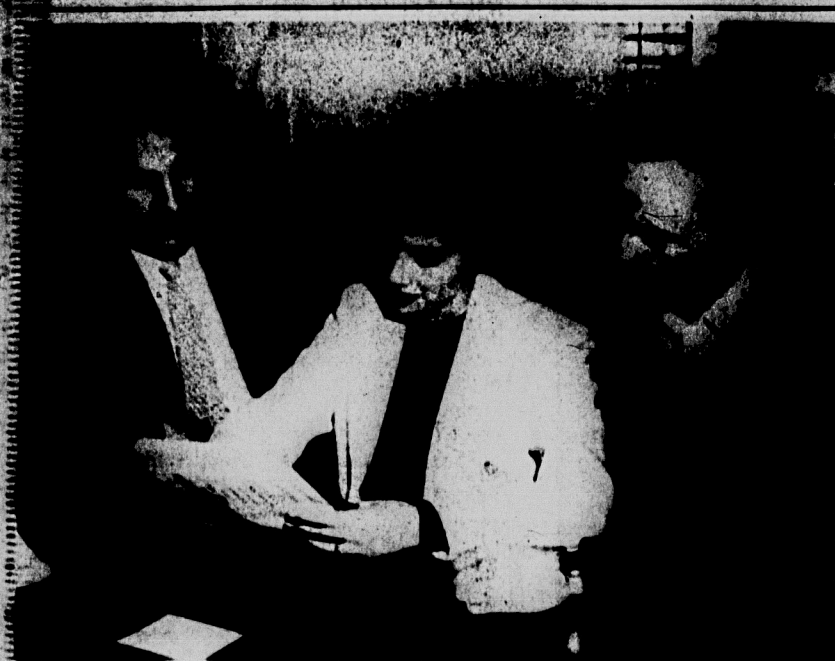
