### To Consider **MSC Budget** House Opposition Expected on Tax

Legislature

The business receipts tax, the Senate tax committee's answer to the state's mountanswer to the state's mounting deficit, survived an attack on the floor Monday night and is ready for a vote in the upper chamber today. Also on the docket today is the appropriation bill including the MSC appropriation. Sen. Joseph P. Choon (R-Wakefield) fought the bill from all angles but apparently did not muster enough support to defeat the measure.

The betting was that it would squeak through the Senate but

Cloon attacked the bill as one designed to "bail out" General Motors, the Ford Motor Co., the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co. 

# Tops in Tennis

If performances to date are any indication, Michigan State may be the proud possessor of another Big 10 cham-pionship when Memorial Day rolls around.

By disposing of defending champion Indiana last Satur-day, the Spartan tennis squad eliminated the biggest barrier in its drive to a second conference crown in the three years State has been in the Western Conference.

Never has a Michigan State team compiled such an enviable record as the netters. They have lost only one dual match in three years of competition, and that was to last year's Hoosier outfit.

In 1951, State's first year of Big 10 competition, the Spartans surprised everyone by going undefeated and capturing the title as rookies.

Last season, they were beaten out by Indiana for the top prize, but still brought back the runner-up award.

Through Monday's Michigan meet, the nettern had compiled a victory string of 11 straight, which extends back into last year's matches.

Few people realize the amount of hard work connected with producing a championship squad of this caliber.

For instance, earlier this spring, the Spartans returned

from a Southern tour with a losing record of 2-4. They had played some of the best tennis schools in the country and had been soundly beaten.

The discouraging Southern setbacks didn't daunt Coach Frank Beeman and his players, however. They simply worked twice as hard to bring the squad up to a par where it is now rated as the favorite for the conference crown.

All the successes this season have been only preliminaries. The showdown comes next week Thursday. Friday and Saturday in Evanston, Ill, when the team competes in the Big 10 championships.

Michigan State will have all the advantages because of the dual-match wins compiled during the season. But despite the preference in drawings the Spartans will get, they still have to produce at the crucial time.

Looking at the all-over record, it's hard to see how State can miss. Win or lose, however, the Spartan tennis sound deserves some well-earned praise.

High School Seniors To Take Service Test

WASHINGTON (A)-Maj. WASHINGTON (A)—Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, selective service director, said Monday, Defense Mobilization officials are studying proposed changes to tighten up on draft deferments for college students. The changes would become effective in September and would principally affect freshmen, apphonores, and graduate students, Hershey said.

One of the changes he has recommended in negatiations with the Manuover Commission of the Office of Fef ne Robbitsotion would provide this high school sentors he allowed to the the solvetive service college qualification test which is now confined in college students.

That change would involve al-That change would involve al-lowing uncoming freshmen who, make a passing grade of 70 on the test, or who have a standing in the upper one-that of the male members of the freshman class, to be considered for educa-tional deferment by their lead tional deferment by their local

The freshmen could establish his class standing after one quarter or semester instead of having to go the full year, as

The change for unphamores proposes a required passing grade of 72 instead of 76 on the test, or the maintenance as class standing in the upper one-third, instead of two-thirds.


