## President To Return For Events

The traditional senior activities crowd the college calendar with seven events, starting tonight and continuing until the commencement exercises on June 7.

The first senior event is the Senior Ball, entitled "Parody." It is scheduled for the Auditorium at 9 p.m. and is the last all-college dance of the term.

President John A. Hannah will arrive tonight to participate in the senior activities during the coming week. He has also planned to attend a staff meeting and banquets for the two retiring deans.

Saturday Ernest I. Anthony, retiring dean of the School of Agriculture, will be honored at a dinner at the Kellogg Center.

The staff meeting will be held at 4 p.m. Monday and will be followed by a dinner in the Union at 6:30 for Lora G. Miller, who will retire as the dean of the School of Engineering.

President Hannah will attend the Lantern Night festivities and there he will speak to the MSC students on the significance of the traditional event. He will announce the all-seniors to be honored at the ceremony.

ROTC commissions will be awarded on the parade grounds at 4 p.m. Tuesday.

President Hannah will be on hand for senior "Swimout" and the senior meeting which will follow in Fairchild. The "Swimout" procession will begin at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday. President Hannah will give his farewell address at that time.

All candidates for degrees have been invited to attend the president's reception in the Union on Wednesday at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Hannah has not yet decided when he will return to Washington, D.C. He indicated, however, that it will be either Wednesday night or early Thursday. He said that he would return to MSC next Friday. He is scheduled to speak at the commencement exercises of Michigan College of Mining and Technology on May 22.

The seniors' annual Water Carnival will be at 9 p.m. June 1-6.

Closing the activities will be commencement at 5 p.m. on June 7. Nearly 2,000 degrees will be awarded in the 90th annual graduation exercises. Dr. Lawson Hovine, president of Purdue University, will give the commencement address.

Mrs. Hannah will present the white carnations to the deans as President Hannah calls them names.

Joan McMahon, outgoing Mortar Board president, will act as mistress of ceremonies.

The AWS presidents, Mary Ellen Wright and Justice Ray, will be installed and the new Tower Guard and Mortar Board presidents will be announced and installed.

The Gamma Phi Beta will present their first place trophy in the seniors' sing. The Alpha Omicron, Tau Sigma and Santa Fe chapters of the women's dormitory sing. East Lansing will sing "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes."

In case of rain the ceremony will be held at 7 p.m. in the Music Auditorium, and the procession will be cancelled.

The commencement exercises June 7 will be held in Macklin Stadium and no tickets will be necessary for admission tickets.

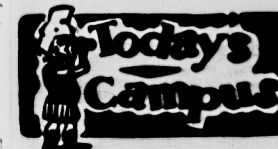
Tickets will be distributed at the Records Office, 106 Administration Building, Tuesday and Wednesday. Three tickets will be given to each degree candidate. In case extra tickets are available they will be distributed on Thursday; one per candidate on a first come first serve basis.

Information on commencement can be found in the booklet "Answer to Commencement Questions," distributed to all graduating seniors by the Records Office. Any degree candidates not familiar with this booklet may obtain one from the Records Office.

All degree candidates are expected to attend classes through June 5, the Record Office announced today. Grade cards will be turned in at the Registration Office at 11 a.m. June 2.

However, the teaching staff will be expected to report to the Registrar's Office and lower the grades of those students who do not attend classes, said Recorder Lyle Leisnering. The changes can be made as late as 4 p.m. on June 5, he added.

These regulations were recommended by a student-faculty committee immediately following 1952 commencement, Leisnering said.

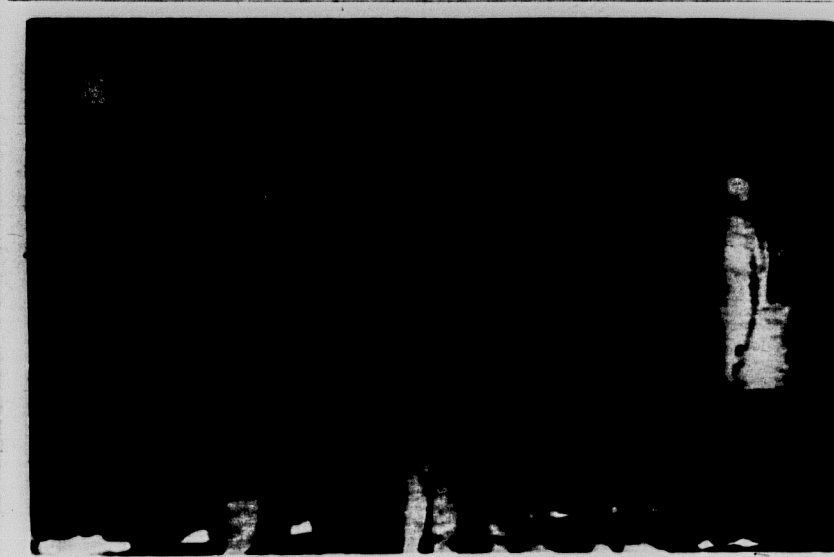

## Local Area Disturbed By Winds

Southeast Michigan  
Struck Hardest

A rare northern tornado sweeping across the U.S. Canadian border late Thursday dealt death and multi-million-dollar destruction in the north end of South and Port Huron and second in Southwestern Michigan.

Seven persons were reported killed.

The storm tore part of a freight train off its track and thrust leveled the two cities.

Ten dead have been reported. Estimated damage in the two cities amounted to \$10 million.

## Port Huron Gets Brunt Of Tornado

Severe Damage,  
Hills City, Sarnia

PORT HURON, Mich. (AP)—Residents of this border city made their way through darkened tree-littered streets Thursday night.

Rescue workers and first aid men searched at the small number of personal injuries sustained in the "Blackout" area which was practically flattened when the twister hit and before a rain.

Buildings plowed through wreckage and twisted metal under falling trees as automobiles laden with the injured could reach hospitals.

All buildings of more than one story suffered severe damage. Exposed windows along Wellington Street from the river northward into the city was shattered by winds. Cars were blown across streets and some were crushed by falling buildings. Trucks were overturned.

A radio warning, broadcast to station WYUU about 10 minutes before the tornado hit Port Huron, was credited with keeping the death toll at a minimum.

## NEWS IN BRIEF

### Ridgeway Calls for Action

NEW YORK, (AP)—Senator Matthew W. Ridgeway, supreme Allied commander in Europe, called on the Western Allies Thursday night for more positive action to counter what he described as Russia's uncooperative, aggressive and disruptive hostility.

### Bright Side Seen in Trade

TOKYO, (AP)—An optimistic view was taken today by authoritative sources watching a recent Korean trade proposal round into shape as Allied negotiators. But Peking's Red radio, anticipating the plan's presentation next week at Pootungnam, sounded a sour note.

### Labour Disputes Tell Workers

DETROIT, (AP)—Labour disputes brought out automobile production Thursday and made idle 17,000 workers in the Detroit area. About 14,000 workers were able to report to work in other plants. The total loss was about \$17,000 in a few days.

### Air Strength Expected to Fall

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Rep. York (R-Calif.) Thursday quoted the Air Force as saying President Eisenhower's program for building up the nation's defenses will result in air strength with fewer "top absolute maximum" for national security.

# Get Football Tickets Now

Spartan football fans who wish to obtain tickets for some of the top Michigan State games next fall had better remember one thing—"he who hesitates is lost."

There is bound to be a rush for tickets. Coach Biggie Munn's squad is the defending national champion. And besides, next season will be State's first in Big 10 gridiron competition. Both of these factors will undoubtedly cause an increased demand.

Last fall there were cries of anguish from all quarters as students finally realized the week of the game that they didn't possess tickets for the Michigan-MSU game in Ann Arbor.

They had no one but themselves to blame. In the spring of 1952, as per this spring, Ticket Manager Warren Burrill warned students that there would be a shortage of ducats for the Wolverine classic.

But most persons calmly brushed this advice aside and said complacently to themselves, "Out of 100,000 tickets they'll be crying to sell them next fall."

As it turned out, of course, such was not the case. Michigan's huge bowl was jammed and outsiders were picking up as much as \$15 a ticket outside the gates.

Next fall, however, the Michigan game is a home tilt and students will be admitted but tickets will be scarce for the away games.

The procedure is much the same as last spring. There is no limit on season tickets while applications for indi-

dual games will be held through June 13 and then the issue will be decided through a draw.

Restrictions for home games include a limit for the Michigan contest and a maximum of four for the homecoming contest with Indiana. Fans may buy as many tickets as they wish for the home games with Texas Christian, Oregon State and Marquette.

For road games, there are four tickets each available for the Iowa, Minnesota and Purdue games, but a limit of two has been set for the Ohio State contest. After June 13, away game tickets will be sent out as applications are received until the supply is depleted.

Tickets for the Buckeye tilt will probably be as scarce as they were for the Michigan game last year. Students who wish to see the game in Columbus are urged to get their applications in now—or sit home and listen to it on the radio come next Nov. 7.

## Groups Move To New House On Evergreen

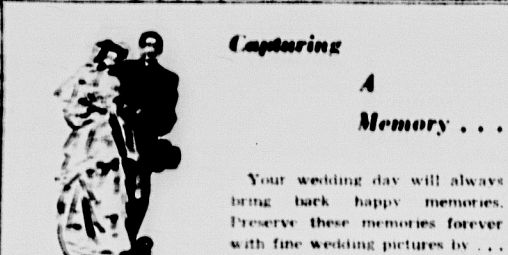
The college YWCA and YMCA are trying something new.
