## **Penalty Proposed**

The Late Registration Committee has now narrowed its solutions for cutting down the number of unexcused late registrants to one: raising the fee.

Their suggestion, which will go into effect next fall if passed by the Administration Board, is to hike the fee from \$3 the first late day, \$4 the second and \$5 for the third or later, to \$15, \$20 and \$25.

We believe the answer in a good use, Under the present system, the "we-can-always-register-into" vacationers have cost the college excessive time and money in processing their grades.

The other solutions under consideration were: to stop late registration completely, to limit the credits a late registrant may take, and to add credits needed for graduation to those registering late.

Raising the fee, however, will probably work out best. The amount may look at first to be excessive, but when someone can afford an extra-long vacation be ought to be able to pay for the privilage.

If the sum does prove to excessive in actual practice, it can be lowered accordingly, but the philosophy behind a high fee is sound

# In Explanation

Most newspapers watch letters to the editor very carefully. They require that there be a handwritten signature, and that there be nothing in poor taste in the letter.

The State News also follows this policy. If the letter is unsigned, it doesn't run. If it's in poor taste, it never sees print. But if it meets all of our requirements-even though we may not agree with it at all-it is printed.

Wednesday morning, a letter from an "Irate Citizen" of Saugatuck was printed. It was not backed by a handwritten signature.

This "Irate Citizen" took a group of what he thought to be State students to task for creating a scene during a Memorial Day parade in Saugatuck.

We of the State News are concerned about the growing poor feeling toward MSC in that area. In this case, our concern influenced our judgment, and the letter van.

Many readers felt the implication was present that the Upsilon fraternity was to blance, for the affair, although the letter mentioned only that it was a Pai U man that two sung. The State News did not limply, by running the letter, that it was the fraternity which was responsible.

Just as any group could sing "MSC Shadows," any group could sing the familar Psi U march.

The IFC executive council moved Wednesday night to exonerate the fraternity, at least pending further investigation. A sworn statement by the president that none of the chapter members were in Sangatuck at the time of the alleged incident was accepted.

There is a pretty fair chance the coming investigation will turn up some much needed information. For one thing, it will probably determine whother or not MSC students were involved, and secondly, it may mend weakened public relations in the Saugatuck aron.

The letter will put the fraternity involved in an embarrassing situation for at least a few weeks, and cause them to do a great deal of explaining to alumni, their national officials, and others.

But if it leads to a clearing up of the beclouded Saugatuck picture, perhaps some good will come of the entire



## Dr. Emmons Helps Get MSC Accredited

Many changes take place at a college in the space of 44 years. A man who has seen these changes coming and who had a lot to do with them is Dr. Lloyd Emmons, former

dean of Science and Arts,

Dr. Emmons came to MSC students a liberal education with in 1909 as a mathematics in experience in many fields. structor and retired last July as dean of Science and July as dean of Science and and Arts. He went up through the positions and eventually was one of the only two men ever to be given the title of full professor without being the head of a de-partment. Last Shinday at Com-mencement he was given an hon-orary Doctor of Law degree.

Throughout the years he has had many jobs. His most strenuous one was inspector of men's dorms and person in charge of all men students (before the college had a dean of men or dean of women.)

Later he held the title of Research Professor of Institution Administration. This meant that he was practically in charge of the campaign to get MSC accredited. His work consisted chiefly of compiling statistics and questionnaires to acquaint people in Michigan swine or work.

One project on which Dr. Emmons worked was remodeling the curriculum. The college was then on a four credit basis for the most part. Emmons headed the compart. Emmons headed the committee which changed it to the five, three and two credit basis.

Dr. Emmons says now, however, that the trend seems

to be back to four and five credit courses.

In 1934 he started work for visitation of high schools. He and other MSC representatives visited the high schools to inform students of MSC's courses and activities.
