Nineteen Books in One Year

Air Force Writes New Texts

The new books, which will be used by Air Force ROTC cadets, have been written by a team of Air Force officers and civilian writers.

By turning out in a matter of weeks, the United States Air Force managed to write 19 college-level textbooks in only one year's time.

According to MSC Air Force personnel who are using the new volumes, the quality of the texts didn't suffer from their speedy production. Captain Benjamin W. Davis, AFOTC instructor, termed them "the most up to date information on Air Force topics."

Required for the "generalized curriculum" program, which opened this fall, they were begun in September 1955 by one of the nation's top engineers, authors and technical experts on temporary duty for the Air Force.

To finish the work with the necessary speed and accuracy, an assembly-line method of writing known as "panel and review board" was followed. The project combined the knowledge and efforts of more than 200 civilian and Air Force specialists who have seven volumes still in the production stage.

Writing was first started by panels of experts from the various fields covered who discussed the subject matters, worked jointly on research projects and prepared the first drafts of the books.

Committees of specialists in

the texts took over the manuscripts and reviewed them for accuracy and conformance to Air Force policy.

The 19 complete books now finished are in use this fall for the first time in the hands of some 120,000 AFOTC cadets in 207 colleges and universities in the United States, Puerto Rico and Hawaii.

The MSC Air Force reserve branch has made a complete switch-over to the new texts which are issued to cadets.

To acquaint instructors with the new books and curriculum, workshops were held this summer at 20 colleges and univer-

sities. More than 600 Air Force officer-instructors attended, including three from Michigan State.

Major Richard G. Mendrop represented MSC at the workshop held at the University of Notre Dame. Major Frank C. Libune attended at Purdue University and Captain Benjamin W. Davis went to University of Michigan's workshop.

Slightly more than 750 men — about nine per cent of all males students at MSC — live in the 23 fraternity houses.

Vets Find Help At Wells Hall Guidance Office

Veterans—if you have questions or problems about your dependency status, address, Veterans' Administration claims and insurance or certificates of eligibility don't go to the veterans guidance center in Wells hall.

James F. Moore, chief of the college VA center, explains that his office exists only to help veterans who require counseling before entering any type of training, such as class work.

The center does about half its work with disabled veterans and serves the eastern part of the lower peninsula, except for the Detroit and Port Huron suburban areas.

Veterans with a change in dependency status or address should notify the Department of Veterans Affairs, 10 Administration Building.

The Lansing office of the Guidance Center, at 411 W. Michigan Ave. should be consulted for questions about insurance or claims and the registrar's office handles certificates of eligibility.

Game Sidelights

Little LeRoy Bolden, Flint's speedster deluxe, was awarded the game ball following his splendid performance against the Golden Gophers.

Bolden, the work horse of the squad, raised his total yardage for the season to 185 yards as he piled up 145 yards in 13 carries.

Against Iowa, Bolden carried 11 times for 65 yards and a 3.6 rushing average. His spectacular 15-yard average Saturday boosted his two-game mark to eight yards on every attempt for 55 carries.

Strangely enough, Bolden scored all three of his touchdowns on the same play. To accomplish the intricate maneuver, the center passes through the quarterback's legs to the fullback, who spins and hands off to the left halfback.

State's offensive totals were:

Passing yardage was 113 measures for the Spartans and a meager 35 for the Gophers. State's three quarterbacks completed 10 of 18 aerials while Minnesota could manage only four completions in 16 attempts.

President John Hannah was on hand to keep his perfect Spartan attendance record for the season. He spoke at an editors conference on the Minnesota campus Friday, and appeared on a radio show following the game.

Coach Elmer Hunsaker was almost carried off the field, but he didn't get his feet under him. The Spartans landed him on their

shoulders after what appeared to be the game's last play, but a penalty gave the Gophers one more chance. Hunsaker, however, didn't need a ride—he strode happily off the field.

Bolden had only one problem during the contest—his foot ailment was badly ripped after a

hard Minnesota tackle in the second quarter. After trainer Jack Huppenthal taped the pants, one green box spectator remarked, "One of the parties has turned red."

A black and white cocker spaniel broke up the game for a few moments in the closing stages of the first period. One of the referees carried the dog off the field and handed him to a Boy Scout, who transported the animal out of the stadium.

There was only a slight difference in the defenses of the two squads. The Spartans used their standard 6-3-2-1 alignment, while the Gophers employed a 6-1-3-2 arrangement aimed primarily at halting State's aerial attack.

Syracuse University Archbold Stadium, one of the oldest concrete bowls in the country, is now in its 47th season. The first game was played there in 1907.

Spartans Overwhelm Gophers, 21-0

Golden Registers All Three Touchdowns

Captures Undisputed First in Big 10 on 26th Straight

ANN ARBOR—Led by Larry Bolden's three touchdowns in the second half, Michigan State's Spartans won their second consecutive Big 10 start in the 1968 season with a 26th consecutive victory over a four-year period.

After a haphazard first half, the Spartans placed the Gopher defense in a bind.

Michigan State's undisputed possession of the ball in the Western Conference was highlighted by two victories in as many weeks. All other Big 10 teams have won only one conference game.

A 165-pound junior scored on runs of 66, 11 yards in the last 30 minutes of play to thoroughly demoralize the Gophers.

Bolden's scoring spree, which had been a frustration despite their overwhelming superiority in every phase of the game, ended with a 61-yard, largest in-turnout in Minnesota's history.

The Spartans reached the end zone in the first few minutes of the contest and then scored on the 7, 13 and 28 yard runs in the first half before reaching the end zone.

By the extent of the Spartan half domination, the Gophers held the ball for the first 30 minutes and did everything but

of the Spartan success. Minnesota can be held to a 100-yard game, but the Spartans' defense was too strong.

Quarterback Geno Cappalietti led the ball out of danger. He engineered another rush and end of the first quarter.

This threat was halted when Giel blocked a Yewick pass within the 10.

The next threat was headed by Matlock, who led his squad to the seven, from where Wells was handed a 13-yard loss.

Near halftime Giel brought the partisan crowd up with a 20-yard return of a Yewick pass to Minnesota's 44. However, the gun sounded a moment later and Gopher fans sat back satisfied that State hadn't scored on their heroes.

After the second half kickoff, the Gophers made two quick first downs before Cappalietti punted to Bolden.

From their 17, State moved to the 31 on a Morrill pass to Ellis Duckett.

At this point Bolden received the ball, broke through the Gopher line into the secondary, pushed up blockers, veered to the right and ran for a 60-yard touchdown run. Pinnick kicked the extra point and the Spartans led, 7-0, with slightly less than nine minutes remaining on the scoreboard clock.

After the kickoff the Gophers were once again stymied in their attempts at making yardage and Cappalietti booted the ball to Bolden, who this time fumbled with Canales pouncing on the loose pignin at State's 40.

For the first time, the Gophers were within State's territory and they immediately moved forward with Giel, tossing two passes to Ron Smith, who wound up on the 15 after making a second successive first down.

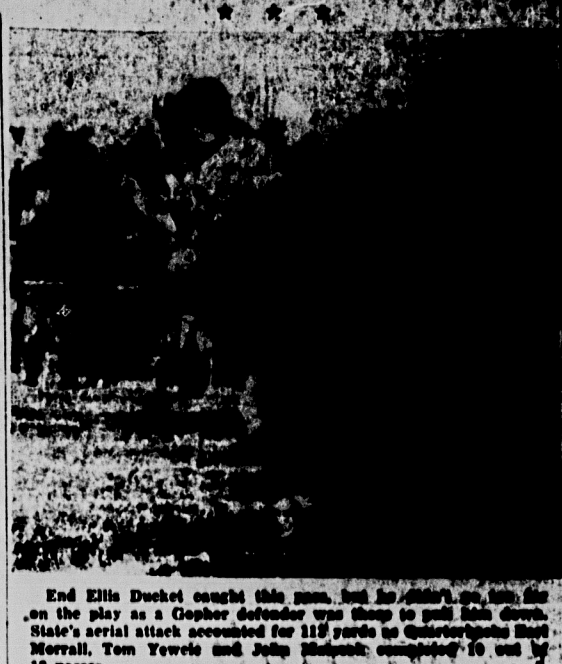
Giel tore through the line for four yards, but then two of his passes went awry bringing about a fourth-down situation with six to go for a first down.

At this point Foster sent quarterback Max Schmidt into the field with a play directly from the bench. The Foster selection didn't turn out too well as Ende Don Schumey and Duckett spotted Giel on the 35 and Minnesota's only serious threat of the day was stopped cold.

In the fourth period Bolden climaxed a 77-yard drive by bulling his way over Minnesota's left guard for nine yards and his second six-pointer of the day. Pinnick converted and increased State's margin to 14 points.

A feature of this drive was a diving catch of a Morrill pass by End Don Kauth on the Gophers' 15.

On the third touchdown drive the Spartans traveled 53 yards in seven plays with Bolden scampering for paydirt from 11 yards out. Even Blom converted for the final point.



End Ellis Duckett caught this pass, but he didn't get the yardage on the play as a Gopher defender was there to pull him down.

State's aerial attack accounted for 115 yards in Quarterbacks Earl Morrill, Tom Yewick and John Matlock completed 10 out of 15 passes.
