



The annihite was disqualified by the Student Congress Election Review Board, but reinstated by the Judiciary.

The jurists acted as they saw fit in these cases, which is their duty, but in doing so set a precedent nullifying ident Congress statutes.

The Congress plans to rewrite the election laws before the next election. We can hope they will be more readily

enforceable than the present ones.

This doesn't alter the present situation. Student Congress has the job of making the laws and All-College Judiciary the job of enforcing them. The two groups should get together sometime.


