Too Much Good Food?

Coeds Count Calories and Cut Costs

Six overweight State coeds are losing weight and saving about half of their board fee by doing it.

Seven days a week these calorie-conscious women trek over to the Home Ec Building for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. They are participating in a dietary research program headed by Dr. Wilma Brewer and Dr. Dana C. Cederquist of the School of Home Economics.

The coeds, from 20 to 60 pounds overweight, must pay for their special diets, but they eat much less than dormitory board fees. "The money they save is part of their reward for furthering science," Dr. Cederquist said.

The research seeks to determine if the body can be protected

when losing weight, against possible strains caused by an upset in the balance of basic food essentials, like calcium and protein. The effect of special diets is studied.

Similar experiments were conducted in 1958 and 1959. Most of the coeds in this year's experiment were contacted through Home Ec enrollment counselors.

One woman heard of the program from her county agent, then asked about it when she enrolled as a freshman. Another signed up to stick with her roommate.

In 1959, a football player had to lose weight to avoid aggravating a leg injury. The department took him at the coach's request, then signed up

another man to keep him company.

After signing up, each coed gets a complete physical check-up. Her proper weight is determined by measuring her bone structure. Height alone doesn't indicate proper weight.

Next the rules of eating are explained and each coed is on her honor not to "cheat" between meals. If she did it would probably show up, but no attempt is made to police them, Dr. Cederquist said.

During vacation, however, "mitching" is allowed with discretion.

For the first week or so coeds are fed regular food, and their dietary habits are observed to determine what they are

overweight. Then a diet is decided upon.

The diets resulting from this research are available to all overweight people, but only through their doctor's prescription. With this they can obtain the diet from the department and come in regularly for observation and instruction.

To those who want to lose weight, Dr. Cederquist says emphatically: "See your doctor and get a diet. There is no easy, fast-and-safe-way to lose weight."

A person usually puts on excess weight over ten years or so, and he cannot expect to lose it in a week or a month, she explained. The reason for overweight is often just too much food and too little exercise.

Chinese Stalling Continues

Break Hopes Dim As Talks Drag On

PANMUNJOM (AP)—U. S. envoy Arthur H. Dean said Wednesday a break could come yet this week in the deadlock which imperils hopes for convening the Korean peace conference this year.

Dean and his aides met the North Korean and Chinese Red delegates in the 10th session of the preliminary talks at 8 p.m. CST Wednesday.

Red persuasion teams Wednesday appeared to be stalling in a bedlam of interviews in which cunning Chinese prisoners again overwhelmingly rejected Communism.

Only three of 200 Chinese prisoners agreed to go home to Red China. And one of these was held back by Indian guards for a sanity hearing.

Red arguments dragged on so long—even after it was obvious that attempts to ease back the prisoners were futile—that Dean and army U. S. observers walked out on some sessions in protest. One Red team also walked out when the Indians cut an interview short.

The Communists asked for about 450 Chinese prisoners to be sent to the interviewing tents in the neutral zone Wednesday.

Dean told newsmen a break could come this week in the deadlock which has all but dashed hopes of the conference beginning this year.

Indian officers said privately after Wednesday's stormy interviews that they thought the Communists were stalling. But the reason was not clear unless it was to proceed so slowly the Reds could claim they were unable to interview all the 7,000 North Koreans and 10,000 Chinese prisoners by the Dec. 24 deadline.

The Communists have been taking a propaganda beating so far. Of 1,134 Chinese interviewed through Thursday, only 23 elected to go back. Only 20 of 913 North Koreans interviewed have changed their minds.

Ike Undaunted by Democrat Victories

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower declared Wednesday that "I've lost skirmishes before." He voiced firm confidence that in spite of Tuesday's Democratic election victories the American people in the long run will endorse the policies of his administration at the polls.

Eisenhower volunteered these remarks in a brisk, thrust-and-parry news conference at which he also assailed Russia's rebuff of an Anglo-American-French proposal for an early Big Four meeting on Germany and Austria.

The President put on his glasses and, in sharp words spoken with stern emphasis, read a statement asserting that Tuesday's Soviet note showed "no intention to get together but an intention to create as many difficulties as possible."

The news conference fell on the first anniversary of Eisenhower's election.

Eisenhower announced at the outset that quite naturally he was not completely happy with Tuesday's election outcome in some places.

He went on to say, with growing warmth, that it is the administration's job not so much to intervene in elections on behalf of individual candidates as to provide a dynamic foundation for Republicans' campaigns.

He said he sincerely believed the program his administration is developing will work for the benefit of all Americans, in what he described as a slow but sure process.

During the news conference Eisenhower made two other main points.

He thinks the chances are favorable for holding a Korean political conference but there are many factors which might prevent it.

Prospects Reviewed By Rhee

President Sees Unity Failure

SEOUL (AP)—President Syngman Rhee in a gloomy review of peace prospects said Wednesday he would step aside if free elections could be held in Red North Korea and went against him.

In written replies to questions submitted by the Associated Press several weeks ago, the aged South Korean leader could see little hope for uniting his divided country at a Korean peace conference, accused the Communists of violating the armistice, and charged India with playing the Red's game in prisoner explanations now in progress at Panmunjom.

Asked for his views on the peace conference, ultimate unification, and free elections, Rhee said that Red tactics since the armistice "confirm our doubts as to the possibility of a peaceful settlement of any questions with the Soviets at the conference."

"We will allow the people of the North to hold the election under the observation of the United Nations," he said. "If the free people of North Korea should elect someone other than the president of the Republic of Korea I would be glad to step aside and let the entire nation hold a nationwide election."

Asked if he thought the Communists were observing the armistice, Rhee declared:

"The Communists are scornful both the letter and the spirit of the armistice. They have brought Chinese soldiers to the northern part of Korea; they have reinforced their armies and air force; they have refused to negotiate in good faith at the preliminary political discussions, and they have plotted with the Indian colonial force to force desperately unwilling prisoners to go back to the chains of Red slavery."

Rhee said the Communists once more would attack South Korea "after gaining as much as they can" at negotiations. See IRE, Page 6.

The AE Plus was founded at Barnard on Oct. 24, 1909 and Jan. 8, 1910 marks the AO Pi's birthday.

Alpha Epsilon Phi was established at MSC Nov. 15, 1932. They boast of 39 active chapters and sport green and white as their colors.

At another point, Rhee declared that if the peace conference fails South Korea "must act to unify Korea, and drive from our soil the Chinese who now are settling in the North with the idea of eventually seizing the whole country."

"In this action," he added, "we would welcome the support of the United States and the United Nations, but we do not ask them to stay against their wish solely for the sake of Korea."
