Several Student Congress posts are at stake, too.

This year especially eye-catching and elever cam-paign posters have made treks around campus a little brighter, but in past years considerable nudging on the part of student leaders has been necessary to create any interest in the elections.

And there's a valid reason for any apathy-how can a voter be sure he's picking the best candidate when all he has to go by is the quantity and quality of a batch of

To be sure, in production of the best posters, ingenuity and a candidate's ability to organize a crew of helpers are both tested. But what has happened to the personal contact between the opposing candidates and their electors that marks a truly exciting campaign?

This gives rise to the suggestion that possibly there

are no issues to debate. If there are no issues, then why is leadership needed? But today is not the day for such academic questions—today's the day to vote. Even with such scanty bases on which to make a fair

choice, it is a healthy thing for potential voters in future national elections to get in the habit of measuring candidates and casting a ballot.
