WASHINGTON (P)—President Eisenhower, pleased at the California election result but nettled by persistent questioning about the Harry Truman-Harry Dexter White affair, held one of his most dramatic news conferences Wednesday.

He also found time, before knocking off work for a round of golf, to place an Armistice Day wreath at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier and to mes-sage condolences on the death of Saudi Arabian Ibn Saud.

In an unprecedented move, ex-President Havry S. Trumen and Gov. James F. Byrnes have been subpressed to tell their sides in the Harry Dexter White "app" case. It was the first time that a President or ex-President had been

The crux of the White case revolves on charges that Truman's appointed to an intermitmal Monetary Pundpant was known by the ex-Chief Executive to be a Communiat.

The committee has already made public for the first time what it said were photostats of documents in White's handwriting that were turned over to a Soviet ring by Al-

ger Hiss, convicted perjurer.

Byrnes, governor of South Carolina and once secretary of state under Truman, has charged that his ex-homs knew of White's affiliations but still went shead with the promotion. Truman has said he doesn't remember a loyalty report supposedly forwarded to him. Byrnes claims he has the proof-and says he's ready to produce a copy of it.




