Besidelity it means that a teacher has full freedom in re-barch and in the publication of his results, within the spanie-yest of his contrast. It should be obvious that the is an im-pertual matter and is probably the told way for men to arrive if an approximation of the truth. Most teachers experience no difficulties in their research pro-ing on this score. Sometimes one encounters difficulties when ywork is in highly emotional areas as in religion or in appraisals forms of government.

Smettmes pressure groups try to influence the dissemination truth. All attempts to suppress valid research are, however, isred by wise administrators.
