## State Spartans Take Sixth NCAA Place

Dohoney, Bolden

### Two Spartans Hit All-Big 10

Michigan State's Spartans added to their football laurels Monday by placing two men on the Associated Press All-Big 10 team.

End and Capt. Don Dohoney and halfback Leroy Bolden

were the MSC players honored on the team chosen for the AP by conference coaches.

The United Press went along with the AP in its All-Big 10 team, also selecting Dohoney and Bolden to first-team honors. Randy Schreengost made the second team at tackle, and Billy Wells and Evan Blawie were on the third team.

Co-champion Illinois and Iowa each placed two men on the AP honor team.

Ferris Holbrook, guard, and Tom Yaworski, quarterback, made the second team.

Michigan, Ohio State, Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin each won one position on one of the best represented teams with coaches chosen by the coaches.

Only Indiana and Northwestern missed the first team, but the Hoosiers took one place on the second.

Halfback Paul Giel of Minnesota was the only unanimous choice.

Rounding out the No. 1 backfield were J. C. Carls, of Illinois, and to the most consistent sophomore to hit the conference since Red Grange, and Alvin Adams of Wisconsin.

Bolden, MSC's leading scorer with eight touchdowns, was given 16 points.

In addition to Giel and Ameche, tackle George Jacob of Ohio State was a holdover from 1962. He collected 12 points.

Dohoney, a defensive star all season long, pulled a total of 13 points. The other end was Bob Topp of Michigan.

Illinois' other representative on the team was guard Jim Smith.

Iowa's two men were both linemen. They are center Jerry Haggberg and tackle Calvin Jones.

Purdue's only representative was the best vote-getter in the line. He was Tom Bettis, a guard, who was given 14 points.

The rest of the second team follows: ends—John Ryan, Illinois; and Bill Fenton, Iowa; tackles—Stavros Canakes, Minnesota, and Harry Jagielski, Indiana; center—Jerry Helgeson, Minnesota; guard—Michael Takacs, Ohio State; backs—Howard Casaday, Ohio State, Mickey Bates, Illinois, and Bob Watkins, Ohio State.

Prof. Roy Underwood, head of the music department, will represent MSC at the annual meeting of the National Association of Schools and Music, Friday to Sunday at Chicago. He is a member of the NASM commission on curricula.

More than two hundred music educators from colleges across the nation will attend the convention of the association, which is responsible for the approval of music standards on a national basis.

A symposium on "Literature and Music," a forum on "Opera Workshop," and discussion on the economic problems of the symphony orchestra will highlight the meeting. The delegates will also be guests at a concert given by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

Excavation for library starts

Excavation for the new library was begun at Pleasant Meadows, with construction set to be completed by 1965.

While students worked up for the winter day of vacation, work was continued on the new library building project. The new building will be a two-story structure with a total area of 100,000 square feet.

The railroad line had not yet been chosen definitely Monday night.

### Debaters Split Series At Purdue

State Card Named One of Best 12

Michigan State debaters finished with a four won-four lost record at Purdue's Sixth Annual Invitational Conference, Thursday through Saturday. They placed 11 points behind the conference winners, Notre Dame.

Rhodes Dobben, Jackson sophomore, was picked as one of the top 12 debaters out of more than 100 debaters who attended the conference.

Debating the negative side with Miss Dobben was Lynn Bergman, Escanaba sophomore. On the affirmative side were Roger Needham, Lansing sophomore and Bill Munyon, Lansing junior.

The question was the national debate question, "Resolved: That the United States should adopt a policy of free trade."

State's negative team debated with Augustana, Missouri, Notre Dame and Western. The affirmative debaters faced Ohio State, University of Pittsburgh, Utah, and the University of Illinois.

Each group had two rounds of audience debate and two rounds of debate before judges only.

Seventeen schools were invited to Purdue this year. They were picked on the basis of outstanding debate in last year's tournaments.

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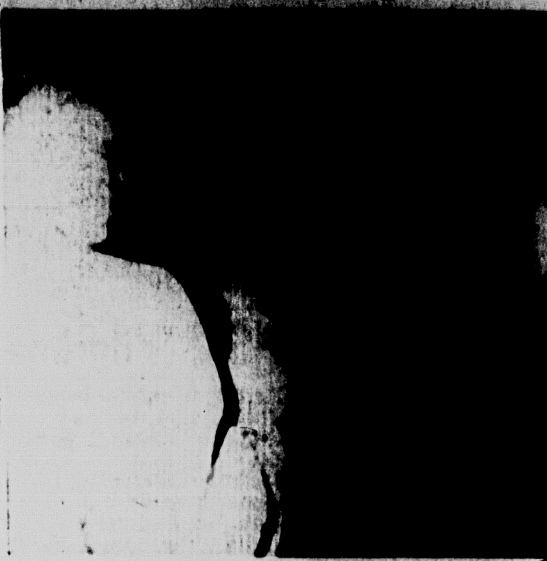

## Band to Share Bowl Activities

Michigan State College's Marching Band will share the Rose Bowl halftime spotlight with the UCLA band on Jan. 1.

The band would appreciate ideas from students for the show, Leonard Falcone, veteran director of MSC's band, said Monday. A brief sketch or outline for a theme may be sent to him at the Music Building.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for the band to participate in Rose Bowl activities," Falcone said. "The theme should be significant to State's long climb to national recognition."

The 120-piece band will be guests of the Oldsmobile Division of General Motors on the trip to the West Coast. J. F. Wolfram, general manager of Oldsmobile and vice president of General Motors, said Monday. The invitation was extended to MSC through the State Board of Agriculture.

"We are extremely grateful to Oldsmobile for making it possible for us to play at such an important game," Falcone said. The company financed the band's two previous trips to away games at Minnesota and Ohio State.

The band will leave for Pasadena on Dec. 24, 25 or 26 via a southern route, according to Dick Goodrow, information services employee in charge of the band.

Members will report Dec. 15 for practice sessions. If it doesn't snow, they will practice here before taking a West Coast-bound train.

If the weather is bad, the band will have earlier to practice on football fields further south, Goodrow said. Jackson Fieldhouse can't be used for practice because the basketball court will be installed by that time.

This song, to the tune of "California, Here I Come," was introduced at the pep rally Sunday by its authors, Phil Kappa Tau fraternity.

"UCLA, watch your stuff. We don't want any of your stuff. The Spartans are rugged. We're coming for you. We smell that sweet road, smothering, crushing right on through."

When we come we won't be late. We'll tear down that Golden Gate. Look out Bruins, here comes State, UCLA here we come."

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## Second Title Hope Thwarted

Kansas Wins Monday Meet

Kansas University, led by its long-striding ace, Wes Santee, rudely ended Michigan State's dream of scoring its second consecutive sweep of the country's major cross-country titles by winning the NCAA meet on the MSC course Monday morning.

After winning the Big 10 for the third straight year and the IC4A for the second successive season earlier this fall, the Spartans fell to sixth place in the final run of the season. In 1962 MSC won all three championships.

Placing men in 8th, 17th, 28th, 35th and 37th. Coach Karl Schlademan's team finished behind Kansas, Indiana, Syracuse, Penn State and Pittsburgh in the team standings.

Kansas won besides Santee's first the 7th, 10th, 25th, and 27th places to top the E. C. (Billy) Hayes trophy, emblematic of national cross-country supremacy, with a low total of 70 points.

Indiana scores, 82 points, Syracuse 94, Penn State 97, Pittsburgh 104, and MSC 125.

The Spartans previously had beaten four of the five teams

which placed ahead of them Monday. They finished ahead of Indiana in the Big 10 and in front of Syracuse, Penn State and Pittsburgh in the IC4A. They had not met Kansas.

The sources for Michigan State were led by Capt. Lyle Garbe, who finished 14th in actual placing. He was followed in order by Ken Barr, Ken Barley, John Cook and Bob Jarrell.

Santee waited until the three-and-a-half-mile post before he took the lead. Before that, Kibun Moriya of Wheaton was leading. John Joe Barry of Villanova and Ray Osterhout of Syracuse were third and fourth, respectively.

The long, lean Kansan, who ran the fastest American mile at Compton, Calif., last spring with a 4:02 clocking, then began to lengthen his lead. When he flashed across the line he was 60 yards ahead of the field. His winning time was 19:45.4, just 0.8 seconds slower than the record of 19:34.7 set by German-born Charlie Capompoli last year.

Meanwhile, John Kellner of Boston University, winner of the 5000, closed out the race. Barry, John Cook, Ken Barley, John Cook and Bob Jarrell.

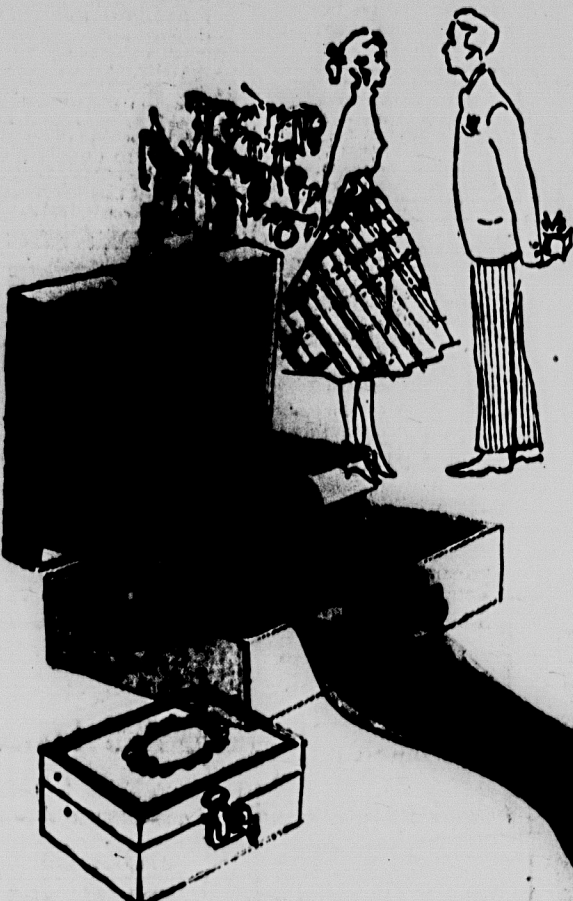

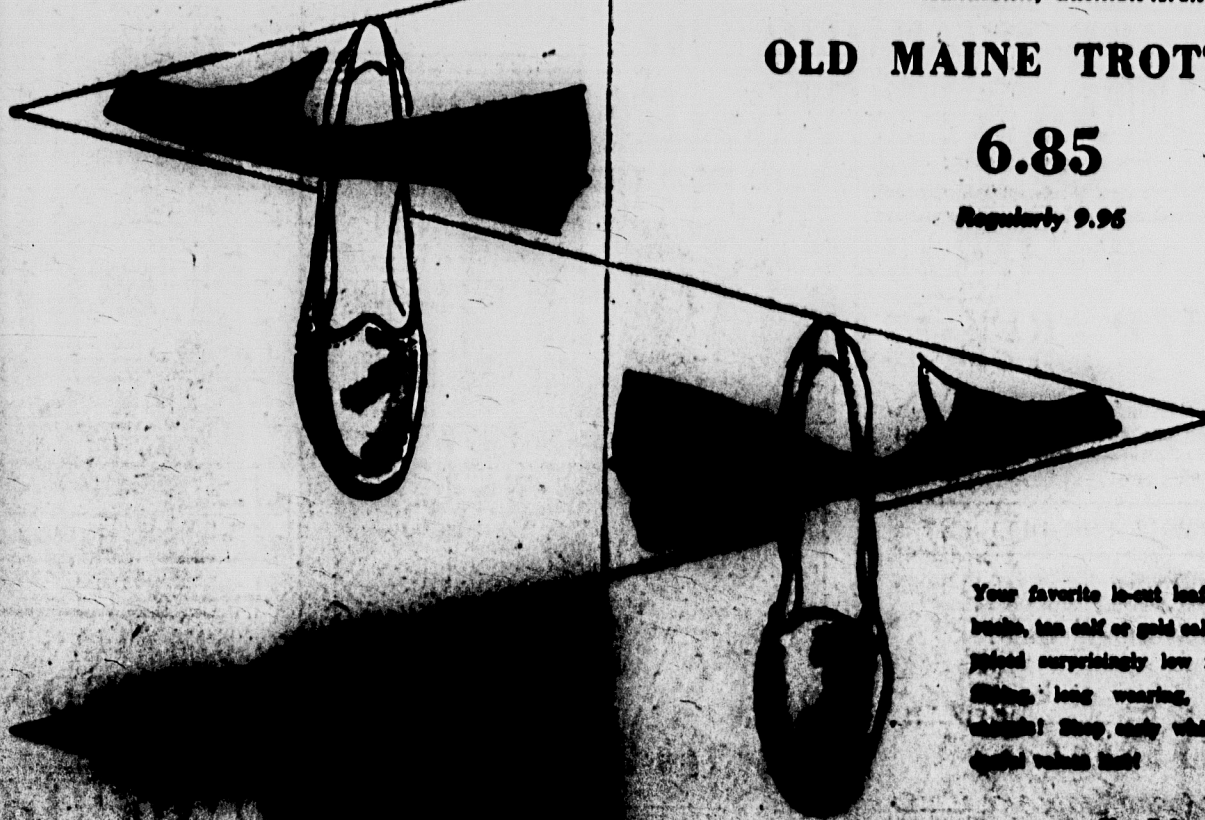
