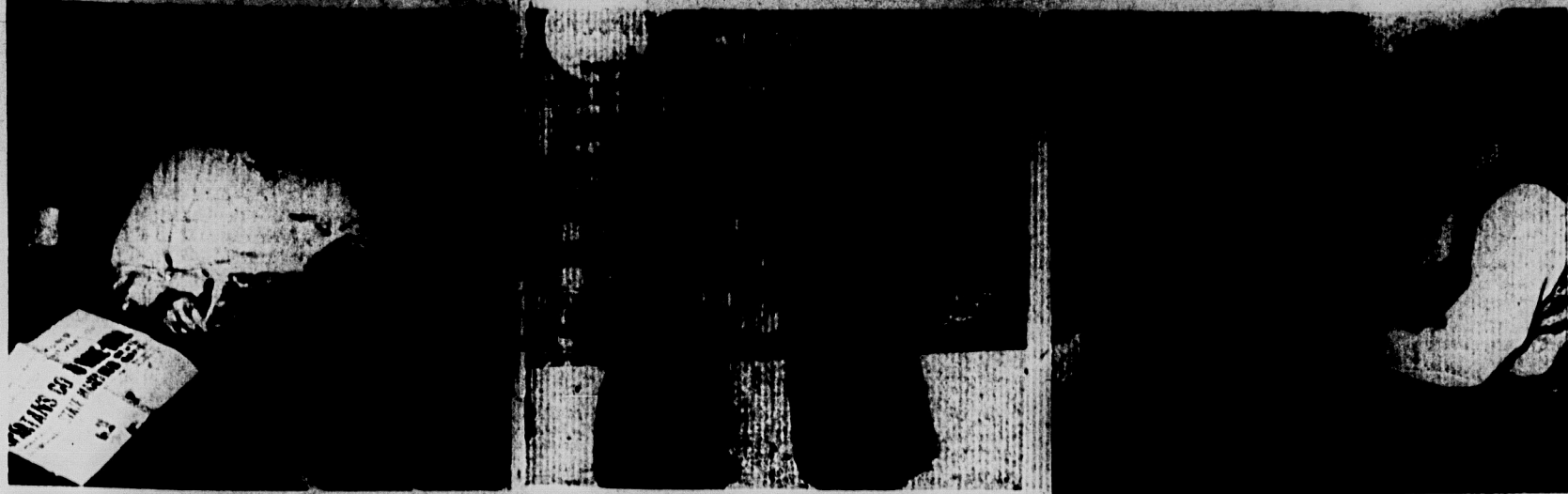

King Denies Rumor of New Job for Munn

Anything about Biggie Munn resigning as coach and taking over as athletic director is "definitely in the rumor stage," Dean Tom King, member of the Athletic Commission, said Monday after a Detroit sportscaster talked of the switch on his 6:30 program.

"There has been no official discussion," Dean King said. "The Athletic Board met Monday and the matter did not come up."

In Florida, Munn declined to comment.

Bob Reynolds, AAU sports announcer, said the change would be denied in East Lansing when he predicted Coach Munn would replace Ralph Young as athletic director. He said line coach Duffy Daugherty would be coach.

Young is due to retire in July, but his successor has not yet been named, according to King.

Spartans traveling on the "Spartan Special" train will be expected to observe the same rules that exist on campus. Linwood Voller, assistant to the Dean of Students, Men's Division, said Monday.

Regular college rules concerning drinking and other behavior will be observed on the train as they are on campus, with student responsibility assuming the major responsibility for behavior," Voller said.

"I know that the students will realize that their behavior on the train and in California will be a reflection on Michigan State. We want the team to be as proud of us as we are of the team," he added.

Faculty chaperons have been selected for the "Special" by Voller and Dean Tom King on the basis of their responsibilities on campus in personnel work, according to Voller.

Student chaperons were appointed by the Men's and Women's Divisions of the Dean of Students' Office. Schedule books for winter term registration may be obtained from the Registration Office in the Administration Building today, and in offices of the Deans of the Schools on Wednesday.

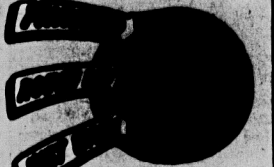
