

## Sebo Chosen Coach Penn

### Daugherty Now Lacks Se, Backfield Coaches

MSC assistant football coach became the head of a major university Saturday.

Sebo, Spartan backfield coach, was given the head coaching job at the University of Pennsylvania to succeed George Munger, who gave up the job after 18 years. Munger will take over as Director of Physical Education at Penn.

The University of Pennsylvania is located in Philadelphia and is a member of the Eastern Ivy League.

The 30-year-old Sebo is Penn's 14th coach—and the fourth new coach—since the Quakers started playing football in 1876. Jerry Ford, Penn athletic director, said Sebo was selected from more than 50 candidates.

A former Michigan State football and basketball star from East Lansing, Sebo returned to his alma mater as an assistant under Biggie Munn in 1960 as a freshman coach.

Sebo was elevated to backfield coach for the 1963 campaign and is credited with a great deal of Michigan State's success during the past two seasons.

Sebo is the seventh Michigan State coach under Munn in seven years to be named head coach of a major university. He joins the ranks of such former MSC coaches as Forest Broshovski (Iowa), Kip Taylor (Oregon State) and Red Dawson (Pittsburgh).

If possible, Sebo plans to use the Michigan State system of Penn next season. He said it would depend on what his assistant coaches and the staff thought of the "S" and "dagger" system used by MSC.

"I never saw Penn play," Sebo said. "I did see a few of their films. We'll have to do what the material merits. In the Michigan State system, we seldom try the same types of plays week after week."

MSC's Davy Daugherty, who was elevated to head coach only a week ago when Biggie Munn was named to replace the retiring Ralph Young, now faces a huge rebuilding program in his staff.

Daugherty must find coaches for both the line and backfield. He may have another vacancy at the end position if Earl Edwards decides to leave for a head coaching position.

One of the vacancies may be filled by Everett (Sonny) Grandelius, former Spartan All-American backfield who played last season with the professional New York Giants. It is widely expected that the other two positions will be filled from the ranks of Michigan high school coaches.

Daugherty plans to submit his recommendations to the State Board of Agriculture at its February meeting.

Sebo was an All-American backfield and football at Michigan State. He had a brief stint in professional football with the Detroit Tigers from 1957 to 1959.

The new Penn coach started his coaching career at Potomac High School and after three seasons entered the Army for five years.

Sebo was named athletic director and head coach at Alma College in 1950. His 1950 team won the MIAA championship and won the MIAA championship in three years at Alma. His teams won 18 games, lost seven and tied one.

In 1951, Sebo left Alma to join Art Valley, former University of Michigan star on the staff of Harvard. It was there that Sebo's work attracted the attention of Munger, who had just been named head coach of Penn.

After a year at Harvard, Sebo joined Michigan State's staff. Munger, who will become head coach Feb. 1, had a record of 35 wins, 45 losses and 10 ties in his 18 years. Last season Penn had a record of seven victories, five losses and a tie.

Sebo's coaching record at Penn is not yet known. He is expected to lead the Quakers to a winning record in his first season.

Even the leading role is flexible, since Joyce Buss and Eleanor Jackie Latchford alternate playing the part of Nancy Willard, the heroine. Miss Buss starred in the MSC performance and, although a little lacking in verve, she showed enough originality to make the part interesting.

Charles Swenson was convincing as the abusive reporter who steals Miss Willard from her fiancé. Further, David Barnett was effectively played by David Winters who is new to the MSC stage.

Also appearing for the first time in an MSC production were Alice Sherwood, Nancy Ryan, Paul Dades and Ted Corcoran. Marie Barlett, Tanya Tykanski and Ronald Gabor, who made quite creditable color, completed the cast.

## Four Power Talks Start In Berlin

### Big Three Ready To Reject China

BERLIN (AP) — The three Western Allies were reported Sunday night to have agreed to tell Russia they would join in binding reunited and democratic Germany to renounce aggressive force.

Diplomatic officials reported this development on the eve of the four-power foreign ministers conference.

Other qualified informants said Secretary of State Dulles, British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault—who meet Soviet Minister V. M. Molotov tomorrow—have a joint strategy which calls for a flat rejection of Russia's bid in behalf of Red China, prompt conclusion of an Austrian independence treaty and a showdown on Germany.

The Western offer to join in binding Germany to renounce force would in effect amount to a security guarantee to the Russians who claim to fear that a reunited, reunited Germany would mean a rebirth of German militarism.

But such a guarantee would be given only on condition that the Soviets in turn help bring about an acceptable German peace settlement.

Informants said the Allies were prepared to call for and underwrite a formal declaration by an all-German assembly that it would keep the peace.

If Germany were to break the peace the United States, Britain and France would be committed to act against her.

Qualified informants said American officials are extremely pleased with the united front perfected in a series of meetings among the U. S. secretary of state, British foreign secretary and French foreign minister.

Today the historic four-power negotiations will get under way at 9 a. m. in the massive, dull-gray Allied Control Authority building in the American sector.

Dulles and Molotov will get together a few minutes early to decide opening procedure and the question of chairmanship. Next week the party will move to the Soviet Embassy in East Berlin.

This is the ninth meeting of the Council of Foreign Ministers and none of them has been able to get anything done about the problems of Germany and Austria.

While the Western Big Three finally tightened up their arrangements, Molotov's movements and precise intentions remained something of a mystery. He has been pressing for a vote for Spaulding in the Union Ticket Office.



China, and he may bring that up at the outset of the session. One expected element of his strategy developed Sunday when Communist East Germany announced it is sending letters to all the Big Four asking for German representatives from East and West "participate in the liberation of all questions concerning Germany."

The Western ministers have already let it be known they will turn down any such proposal. They have made their own arrangements to consult with West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

A major difference in Western and Soviet terms is that Russia wants to merge the Gronewohl and Adenauer governments to unify Germany, the West wants free elections, being confident the Reds in East Germany would lose out.

While Molotov's major purpose presumably will be to block Western rearmament of Germany as much as he can within the price he is willing to pay—a price as yet unknown to the West—the major purpose of Dulles, Eden and Bidault is the opposite.
