

Gov. Williams Asks Law Change Permitting 18-Year-Olds to Vote

Teachers' Pay Boost Requested

Veterans Bonus Extension Sought

LANSING (AP)—In his third message to the Legislature Monday, Gov. Williams asked for the 18-year-old vote, higher teacher salaries and the extension of veterans bonuses to those who served in the Korean war.

The newest message contained 25 more recommendations for legislative action in a session (that) leaders are trying to keep short.

Williams, noting the rising enrollments in state colleges, recommended a statutory commission to develop a long-range program for developing the state's higher educational system, including community colleges.

He asked the Legislature to put on the November ballot the issue of allowing 18-year-olds to vote.

He recommended a minimum teacher salary schedule of at least \$2,000 a year and proposed that teachers' pensions be raised to a maximum of \$2,000.

He called for extending the state's World War II veterans bonus to those men who served in the Korean War. The cost is estimated at \$50 million.

He recommended that the Legislature permit citizens to form authorities to buy or build telephone companies in areas where small independent companies now

are unable to finance needed expansion or provide adequate service.

The governor asked also for legislation to encourage financial institutions to invest in independent telephone companies or telephone authorities.

Revolving much of his 12-page message to public education, the governor advocated:

Granting school boards the right to appeal from equalized valuations set by county boards of supervisors. Other local units now have this appeal right.

Requiring county valuations fixed by the state tax commission to remain in effect for several years. He said counties now often drop back to their old, inequitable valuations a year after the state has boosted them.

The governor asked for legislation to simplify and speed the reorganization of local school districts.

In addition, to increased teacher pay, the governor recommended granting retroactively between the three educational retirement systems now operating and asked for a study of the possibility of giving teachers federal social security, too.


He called for changes in the state school aid allocation formula to encourage a reduction in teacher-pupil ratio.

He asked for changing law to form one general world-wide bipartisan fund which would be the other world-wide fund and state legislation based in the of the present state teacher-conferences.

The governor asked that minimum old age pension be fixed at \$50 a month, less of what the pensioner has in other pension plans.

He asked that the state pension be increased to \$100 a month for those who have served in the military.

Hemingway Not Injured Novelist Continues Trip

ENTERBE, Uganda (AP)—Novelist Ernest Hemingway returned to civilization Monday night with only slight cuts and burns to show for two plane crash-ups in the wild East African brush.

But Mrs. Hemingway, his fourth wife, had two rib fractures and needed a rest.

The Hemingway party arrived from a 100-mile motor trip over jungle and mountain roads after spending the night near the Albert Nile, tributary of the Victoria Nile River.

After the second crash-up, they had to worry about the horns of elephants and other unidentified wild beasts which hovered around them and the swarms of mosquitoes from the river. A camp fire kept the beasts and insects at bay.

"I feel wonderful," Hemingway said as he arrived clutching a bottle of gin, "but my wife has to rest as she has two cracked ribs."

"There has been no heroism, no hardship, no lack of direction at any time."

Coming from a man who has described death on Italy's World War I battlefields, in the mountains of civil war Spain, and in the Chicago gang wars, that appeared to be a conservative account of his latest real-life adventure.

The first crash-up occurred Saturday when the Hemingways were flying in a chartered airplane near Murchison Falls, near Uganda beauty spot. Hemingway said the plane was full of crocodiles and that when the plane got into trouble it was a choice between

crashing in the river or the bush.

A tourist launch took the Hemingways and their pilot to Butiaba.

The second crash-up came there when another plane failed to negotiate a take-off. Hemingway said all aboard had braced themselves for the shock. One wing broke into flames.

Hemingway opened the door with his head and shoulder and suffered cuts on the head and

slight burns. His wife and the other occupants left through the front of the plane and were not burned.

Mrs. Hemingway's ribs apparently were cracked when the plane swerved off the runway and into a plantation before catching fire.

Hemingway and his wife, the former Mary Welsh, well-known magazine correspondent, are making a five-month safari through East Africa.

Countries Dislike Release of POWs India, Poland, Czechoslovakia Give Official Disapproval

PANMUNJOM, Tuesday (AP)—India, Poland and Czechoslovakia made it a matter of official record Monday that they disapproved of the Allied release of nearly 22,000 anti-Red war prisoners Jan. 23.

Their votes at a meeting of the Neutral Nations Repatriation Commission put into the file views they already had voiced. The votes of Sweden and Switzerland approving the Allied action were as expected.

The commission, which will cease functioning Feb. 22, had the job of supervising the armistice machinery for prisoners unwilling to return home.

It is the Allied view that this machinery specified release of the prisoners by Jan. 23 and the

PANMUNJOM (AP)—A meeting of Allied and Communist bloc countries to arrange repatriation of prisoners taken for a Korean peace conference was held Tuesday when the Communist secretary stalked out of the building.

Meanwhile, 21 American prisoners of the Korean war who renounced their homeland Tuesday said they were asking the Communists to take them back to their own.

They had no other choice left to make. The Reds have changed the Allies wanted the prisoners to be released.

On the other hand, 27 prisoners in a pre-Red camp including 10 Americans, 10 British, 10 French, 10 Canadian, 10 Australian and 10 New Zealanders were asked to take their flight.

ACSM, SAC Name Switch Adds to String Of Letters

Once it was SAC. Then it became MSC. Now it may become MSU.

But remember when it was ACSM? Or SACT? ACSM stands, or rather, stood, for Agricultural College of the State of Michigan. The title given in the 1905 act establishing the college.

Six years later, the Legislature set up the State Board of Agriculture and called the East Lansing campus the State Agricultural College—SAC.

In 1908, following revision of the state constitution, an enabling act changed the name to Michigan Agricultural College. This in turn was changed to Michigan State College on May 13, 1909.

Now the Legislature is considering a fourth change which, if approved, will go into effect during the 1955 centennial year.



Scholarship Requisites Explained

Scholarship requirements were clarified recently by J. Robert Stewart, director of the Scholarship Office, after the rumored drop from the prevailing 2.6 average to a new requirement of a straight two-point.

"On the contrary," Stewart said, "it has been the constant endeavor on the part of the scholarship committee and myself to raise the standards of MSC scholarships."

One reason for the confusion may have resulted through the misuse of the word scholarship, he added. There are student aids given which do not require a B.A. but these are grants and aids, not scholarships.

These are helps given to MSC students who, although not outstanding scholastically, are contributors to MSC through extra-curricular activities. Included in this type of program is aid given to students who are outstanding in such fields as debate, journalism or athletics.

The only scholarship available at MSC not requiring a 2.6 average is the 4-H Scholarship, given to outstanding 4-H members, which requires a 2.5 average.

Taken into consideration on all scholarship applications are academic standing, financial need, and other variable conditions such as leadership, character, and citizenship.

Included in the range of scholarships are the MSC Entrance, Foreign Student, MSC Merit Award, 4-H and departmental scholarships.

Various donor and graduate scholarships are also offered.
