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Cets Get Own Basic Classes

Success of Reserved Sections Calls for More

Additional Basic College sections will be reserved for the spring term, according to Dean John N. Winburne of the Basic College. Courses in communication skills, natural science and science have been "so successful that they had to be expanded," Dean Winburne said Wednesday.

Bob Voller, assistant to the director of students, men's division, said two sections for veterans were reserved after the spring schedule book was compiled. The reserved sections are communication skills, section 12, and natural science, section 2.

Members of the MSC Veterans Association will be present at registration to aid veterans in registering for special sections and to help with problems they might encounter, he said.

Ervin R. Van Der Jagt said he is pleased with student response in the natural science section he is teaching this semester. "The establishment of a fighter-interceptor unit in this area is considered essential by the Department of Defense in order to provide protection in the event of an attack from the air aimed at the heavily populated and vital industrial areas of the North and Northeast," Maj. Gen. Nelson said.

"Geographical location is important for, if we are to fill the gap in the air defense system, the installation must be located not only to fill a gap but to achieve maximum co-ordination with Ground Control systems and established radar systems. "A primary consideration and final determination must be a location which provides for a minimum expenditure of Federal funds. For example, it may be possible to utilize existing military facilities or commercial airports," the general said.

Van Der Jagt said he had found the veterans at a slower rate but found they caught up in some cases. Voller added that no veterans enrolled in reserved classes dropped out because of class work.

Registration term classes will be held in the first term of all college courses except humanities. Voller said if these are successful as the others, the program will be further extended next fall term.

A salary increase of \$550 per teacher was also passed by the Board. There will be no increase in taxes since extra money is expected in the formula change for receiving state aid payments. C. E. McDonald, superintendent of schools, said.

Pearson told a luncheon audience at the Detroit Boat Club that he had been informed by friends of the Chief Executive that Eisenhower has said he would have to make his mark as President in the next two and a half years.

The columnist said he interpreted these remarks to mean that Eisenhower would not run again.

Pearson also said that the President's age and health were other factors against his seeking a second term. Although the President's health was reasonably good, Pearson said, he was suffering from high-blood pressure.

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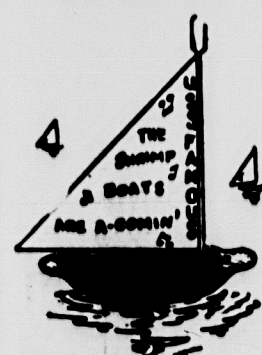

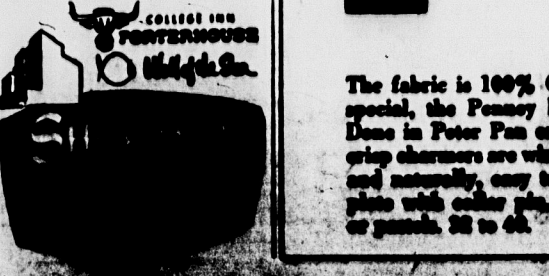

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One of Country's Best

Olson Sets Records for Icemen

The Spartans may not have the best hockey team in the country, but most observers think they possess one of the finest centers in college hockey.

Any one who has followed the Michigan State pucksters during the season will realize that this could only be Weldon Olson.

Olson has consistently been up among the leaders in scoring for the Spartans since he began playing for them during the 1962 season. In both freshman and sophomore years he finished second among the point-getters and in the season just ended he led them all.

Olson's 21 goals and 19 assists for a total of 40 points, topped all the existing school records for scoring and put him 15 points ahead of Gordie King, his nearest rival.

When he entered the final series against Michigan Tech, the slim, 150 pounder needed five

points to reach the even 40 mark. He became the first man in State history to reach this figure by getting an assist Monday night and Tuesday night coupled with three goals, the "Hat Trick," in the latter game.

The 21-year-old junior was voted the "Most Valuable Player" award after the 52-53 season, and coach Amo Resman says, "I think he's as good as any man in the league."

Olson, one of the best conditioned men on the squad, is a constant target of the hardest checkers in the league. They know that when Olson is out of the lineup the entire team play suffers a noticeable lag.

However, his love for hockey is too great to let a few minor injuries stop him. In the series against Tech, at Houghton, Olson was thrown severely into the boards on an attempted pass, and hurt his leg so badly that he was not expected to play the following week against North Dakota.

In the game, Monday night, against Tech, Olson was forced to leave the ice three separate times when his leg was re-injured.

Olson, a mechanical engineering major, comes from Marquette, and his family alone made up a sizeable cheering section at Houghton. Even the two referees were relatives, brothers Marc and Ted.

Michigan State's improved track team has a 10-event spring schedule coming up, starting with the Ohio State Relays on April 17 and concluding with the Big 10-Pacific Coast meet at Evanston, Ill., on June 15.
