Surrey Shows Wives Yen for 'Work Savers'

A new kitchen range is wanted more than anything else by 33 per cent of the housewives in the Lansing and East Lansing area according to a survey of 900 homes by the MSC Bureau of Business Research.

Clothes driers are the next most desired items, wanted by 20 per cent; refrigerators are a close third, while water heaters and garbage disposal units are wished for in the homes studied is five per cent by 12 per cent.

The average age of water heaters have been in service for about six years. Clothes driers are comparatively new but are being used at the average rate of nine to 20 loads a week.

A further aspect of the survey was to determine the quality of the city's utilities services. Electric, water, and gas service were rated "good" by more than 90 per cent. Only two per cent rated the services as "poor."

More than 60 per cent of the home owners call upon the gas company for service because of the larger number of gas appliances which need servicing.

A link between MSC and its newly adopted school, Ryukus University, is Hiraoka Nashiro, a North Williams coed from Okinawa.

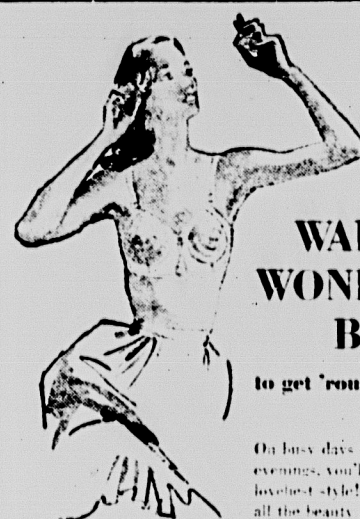

EMMETT SMITH, E.E., '50, never heard of telephone traffic work, but what he saw of the job intrigued him. He explains how it worked out.

(Reading time: 40 seconds)

"Communications have always been one of my main interests—in the Navy and at the University of Michigan. So I was very happy when the Michigan Bell Telephone Company invited me to visit their headquarters to talk about a job.

"In Detroit I had a chance to look at a number of departments, including one I'd never heard of before, the Traffic Department. I found that, in addition to the engineering of switchboards, its work involved the supervision and the actual handling of customer calls. It struck me like a wonderful opportunity to combine staff engineering and field management.

"My first impression was right, too, because my work covered both. First, I had on-the-job training assignments in several different kinds of offices—local, Long Distance, dial and manual. Then

I worked in engineering, translating estimates of future growth into the actual number of circuits and switchboard positions required.

"Now I'm supervising the operation of one of the boards I helped engineer. Briefly, my job is to see that my district gets the kind of equipment it needs and that what we have is functioning properly. Working with people is another major part of my job, too, because I serve in an advisory capacity to the supervisors of the Long Distance operators.

"Needless to say, I'm happy with my job. A job I didn't even know existed."

Emmett Smith's job is with a Bell Telephone Company. There are similar opportunities for college people with Bell Telephone Laboratories, Western Electric and Sandia Corporation.

Swimmers Third in Big 10 After 6-2 Season Record

With John Dudek leading the team, the Spartan swimmers finished third in the Big 10 meet and compiled a season's record of six wins and two defeats.

The Spartans returned home to beat Purdue, 58-32. The highlight of the meet was Dudek's pool and varsity record in the 100-yard breaststroke of 50.1, only a second shy of the world's mark.

Probably the two strongest teams in the country—Michigan and Ohio State—were State's next opponents. The Spartans were simply outclassed in both meets, losing 69-24 to Michigan at Ann Arbor and 55-38 to Ohio State at home.

Indiana was the final dual meet and State triumphed, the Hoosiers 57-36. Dudek finished the season undefeated by winning his specialty again. However, sophomore Jack Beattie was the star of the meet with victories in the 220 and 440.

The Big 10 Championships proved to be a battle between the Wolverines and Ohio State. The Bucks finally won it with 125 points to Michigan's 103. State was third with 35. Dudek provided the top performance of any Spartan with a Big 10 record of 59.7 in the 100-yard breaststroke.

Thinclads End Slim Year in Fifth Place

In the windup of a slim winter schedule, the Spartan thinclads finished fifth in the Big 10 race at Illinois.

The Illini won their fourth consecutive title as the strength of 55 points, to outclass their nearest competitor, Indiana, with 42. Michigan was a surprising third after many experts had picked them to take Illinois' crown.

The Spartans picked up only one first place—Lyle Garber's win in the 880, and only after the Illinois entry—Gene Maynard had been disqualified.

State's sprinters, Ed Brabham and Travis Buzg, showed up well with a second and third respectively.

Other scorers for MSC were Ray Eggleston, Dave Goodell, Joe Savoldi and John Corbelli.

State started off the season with some respectable times in the Michigan A.A.U. Spartan relay

MSC's wrestlers topped a successful 7-2 season by taking third in the Big 10 title race.

The season started on a sour note with a 21-9 loss to Pittsburgh. The record was quickly squared by a close 15-14 win over Iowa.

The grapplers then took first place in a quadrangular meet with Northwestern, Purdue and Minnesota.

An easy win over the Ohio State Buckeyes, 20-6, followed. Then came the big weekend. The MSC wrestlers defeated strong teams from Iowa State (24-4) and Purdue (18-10).

Another conference win, over

Illinois 20-10, preceded the second mat loss of the year. The wrestlers ran headlong into Michigan's defending Big 10 champs and lost, 15-9.

They bounced back with a 25-5 win over Indiana to close the season.

After a short rest, the wrestlers played host to the Big 10 championships at Jenison Fieldhouse. After a strong start in the preliminaries, the team faltered in the semi-finals and finished third, behind Purdue and Michigan.

Heading the list of individual stars is senior Bob Hoke, 157-pound ace who won his straight title at that weight in the finals after going undefeated.

Sportopics Looking Back

Looking back over the term. . . . It seems like just a few days ago that we were out in Pasadena watching the Spartans come from behind to win the Rose Bowl. And with these memories still fresh in our minds we had settled down for the coming term.

The winter months seemed to have flashed by before we realized it, but they were packed with many newsworthy events as far as the sports picture at MSC is concerned.

The first big news of the term was the announcement that Stan Turner, Spartan shortstop, unexpectedly signed a contract with the Cleveland Indians.

The next big event was the switch in the Athletic Department. Biggie Munn, fresh from leading his football team to a co-championship in the Big 10 and the Rose Bowl victory, moved into the Athletic Director's Office—replacing Ralph Young. At the same time Duffy Daugherty was promoted from line coach to head coach.

Following on the heels of this move, Backfield Coach Dave Sebo left to take over the head coaching job at Penn and End Coach Earl Edwards moved to North Carolina State.

Basketball forward Julius McCoy tied the school scoring record with a 34-point spree against Ohio State as the Bucks fell, 83-76.

The MSC Relays moved into the spotlight and with the performances of Wes Santee, proved to be one of the track highlights of the year.

The long-legged Kansas miler unofficially broke the world's indoor record with a 4:26.6 effort in the mile leg of the winning distance medley relay team. The team, sparked by Santee's mile, set a new American record of 9:51.4.

Two days later in the Kansas-Illinois-MSU meet, Santee officially broke the record with a time of 4:04.9.

Football moved back into the picture with Daugherty's appointment of his staff. Selected were: Bob Devaney, end coach; Dan Devine, backfield coach; Everett Grandelius, freshman coach; Bert Smith, assistant coach; Don Mason, line coach and Bill Yeoman, assistant coach.

WKAR-TV got into the news-making category with the announcement of its plans to televise Spartan sports.

Although no team won a title in the various championship meets, several individual winners emerged for the Spartans.

Bob Hoke successfully defended his Big 10 157-pound wrestling title. Gymnast Carl Rintz compiled 54 points in the finals to take individual honors for the second year—Ken Cook tied with him for first place in the flying rings. Lyle Garbe won the 880 in the conference track meet. John Dudeck set a new Big 10 record in the 100-yard breaststroke of :59.7 as he stroked to victory at Ann Arbor.

McCoy collected 24 points in the cagers' final game—76-61 win over Michigan to run his total to 409 which made him the first player in State's history to score more than 400 points.

One of the biggest surprises of the year was the resignation of Basketball Coach Pete Newell, who accepted a job at California. As yet, no successor has been appointed. However, there are many who believe that Newell's assistant, John Bennington will get the nod.

Hockey Team Compiles Best School Mark

Michigan State's hockey team started with a rush and finished strong, as they compiled the best record in Spartan history during the past season. The pucksters drafted the first game of the season, to St. Lawrence and then came back to win four straight before beginning competition in the Western Collegiate Hockey League.

In league play the Spartans won only four while losing 12 and tying one, a 0-0 overtime game with the University of Michigan.

All their league wins and their tie were compiled in the last nine games. They lost only four games in this final stretch, three of them by one goal.

In all, the team dropped seven one-goal decisions and played four overtime games, testing to the never-say-die time of hockey they placed this year.

The Spartans will take to the ice next year with the entire team that finished out this season, with the exception of captain John Thomas, who graduated at the end of this term.

State will be aided by the injured half-way through the turn of John Polonsky, who was injured last season, and the return to eligibility of Henry Campanini and John Mayes, both of whom had to sit out a term of scholastic ineligibility.

MSC Team Undefeated In Six Meets

By winning four of their dual meets and tying two, the Michigan State boxing team gained the best record of any Spartan sports squad. The Spartans started the season off in winning style by defeating the Quincey Marines, 4-2, and made it two straight when they topped Penn State, 2-1.

The team traveled next to Pocatello, Idaho, where they traded punches with the Idaho State squad. This meet came out as a deadlock, 4-4.

Returning to the friendly confines of Jenison, the Spartans dropped Maryland by a 4-1 count and then came out on top of Idaho State in a rematch, sweeping the Bengals, 6-2.

Their next dual meet was a return meeting with the Marines. This match ended in a draw, 4-4, giving the Spartans an undefeated record as they prepare for the Badgers from the University of Wisconsin, March 26.

Leading the Spartan boxers in the second straight year was Tom Hickey.

Cagers Dissappoint

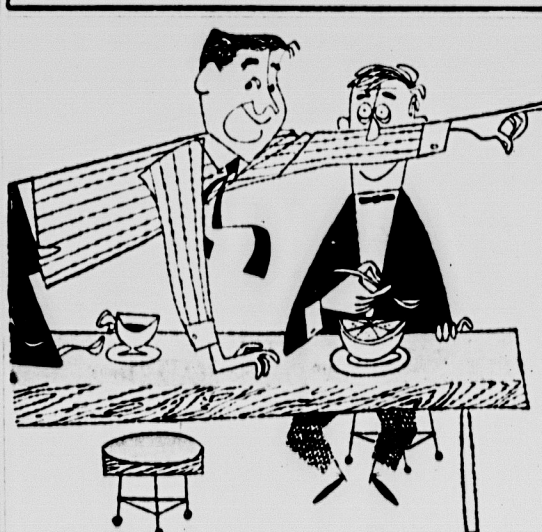
After a record breaking start, the cagers hit a snag and ended the season with the worst record that coach Pete Newell has had—and his last.

Then came a heart-breaking loss to Michigan by the same token, a last minute 64-63 setback.

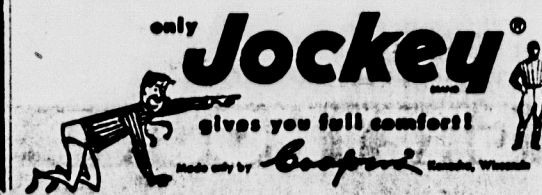
