On the other hand, don't wait until the ballot is handed to you at spring registration to make up your mind.

And vote. That's the big thing. Failure of a majority of sindents to vote kills the tax just as dead as 13,000 "no" votes.

Frankly, the State News hopes you'll vote "yes," to re-

Early in February, we discussed possible consequences of the "yes" vote which can give the tax a long life (limited only by constitutional amendment).

We wrote about possible bids for power on the part of student government, about the use student government has made and will make of the money, and about controls available to the student body to curb abuse of the tax privilege. Feb. 22, we devoted the entire editorial page to an

appeal for passage of the student tax,-but we didn't say the student government was bound for the land of milk

In fact, we suggested five moves we felt—and still feel—the student government should make to do a better job for those of us it represents.

Two of the recommendations—cutting the size of the Student Congress, and establishing a better system of communication between representatives and their constituents—have been followed.

The other three-closer cooperation between executive and legislative branches, no allocation of funds without receipt of a constructive plan for their use from the asking group, and the release of Student Judiciary recommendations to the State News at the same time the dean of students gets them-well, we've got our fingers crossed.

Especially on the last recommendation. A Student Judiciary acting for the student body, and in the name of the entire student government, should have its actions reported at the time they are taken. We hope the Judiciary and the dean of student's office will eventually agree to this.

We have explained the services made available by the tax, and the setbacks student government and other campus organizations will suffer if tax funds are no longer avail-

Student government officials are ready and anxious to answer your questions about the tax. They have prepared a booklet which probably will answer some. You can get free copies at the Union desk.







"Communications have always been one of my main interests - in the Navy and at the University of Michigan. So 1 was very happy when the Michigan Bell Telephone Company invited me to visit their headquarters to talk about a job.

"In Detroit I had a chance to look at a number of departments, including one I'd never heard of before, the Traffic Department. I found that, in addition to the engineering of switchboards, its work involved the supervision and the actual handling of customer calls. It struck me like a wonderful opportunity to combine staff engineering and field management.

"My first impression was right, too, because my work covered both. First, I had on-the-job training assignments in several different kinds of offices - local, Long Distance, dial and manual. Then I worked in engineering, translating estimates of future growth into the actual number of circuits and switchboard positions required.

"Now I'm supervising the operation of one of the boards I helped engineer. Briefly, my job is to see that my district gets the kind of equipment it needs and that what we have is functioning properly. Working with people is another major part of my job, too, because I serve in an advisory capacity to the supervisors of the Long Distance operators.

"Needless to say, I'm happy with my job. A job I didn't even know existed.

Emmett Smith's job is with a Bell Telephone Company. There are similar op-portunities for college people with Bell Telephone Laboratories, Western Electric and Sandia Corporation.


