For Probation Violation

College Suspends Quinlan

BILL Quinlan, Michigan State football end, told the State News Thursday he has been suspended from school for the term.

He said the official reason given by the college for his suspension was "violation of probation," and defined the violation as involvement in a fracas in front of the Sigma Kappa sorority house Monday night.

The scuffle occurred while members of Delta Chi fraternity were serenading the Sigma Kappas. Witnesses previously told the State News that a car with a noisy muffler pulled up in front of the house and interrupted the singing. Quinlan said he was in the car.

Charles McCabe, East Lansing senior, also was involved in the incident. He said he was placed on disciplinary probation by the college until his graduation in June.

Dean of Students Tom King, following a policy of the college, withheld comment on the case.

Hugh (Duffy) Daugherty, head football coach, also declined to comment.

Quinlan, North Andover, Mass., sophomore, said he planned to apply for re-enrollment for summer term. If admitted, he would be eligible to play football next fall by maintaining a 2-point scholastic average this summer.

As a member of the Big 10, MSC stipulates that athletes must maintain 3 points "the term previous" to participating in a sport.

East Lansing police repeated Thursday that no charges have been made in the case. Sgt. Charles Wibert said that no further investigation is planned and that as far as the department is concerned the case is now a "dead issue."

William Frank, Grand Haven junior who was injured in the grenade scuffle, was re-admitted for observation Thursday to Olin Memorial Health Center.

Dr. Clifford G. Menzies, director of the center, said Frank was readmitted because he complained of headaches. His condition was reported as "good."

Winning the Sing trophy for the third straight year, Psi Upsilon became the only MSC fraternity to win two consecutive permanent awards. Psi Upsilon groups have taken top Sing honors for the past six years.

Second place in the annual Alpha Phi Omega-sponsored Sing was won by Sigma Chi. The funers sang their sweetheart song and "The Halls of Ivy." Bob Rasmussen, Portland, Ore., junior, directed the Sigma Chis.

Lambda Chi Alpha, singing "Johnny Peel" and "Lambda Chi medley," was awarded third place. Walter Crowsen, Pleasant Ridge junior, directed the group.

Honorable mention went to Delta Sigma Phi for its singing of "Happy Wanderer" and a Delta Sig medley. Leader of the group was Verlyn Wheat, Walled Lake junior.

Awards were made by Ruth Gardner, assistant to the dean of students.

The Spartan tennis squad will play three home matches in four days starting this afternoon at 2:30 when State entertains the University of Detroit. Saturday, at 1:00, Wisconsin moves in and on Monday the Spartans face Wayne University.

Saturday's match with Wisconsin will be televised over WKAR-TV.

The Wolverines, defending Big 10 and NCAA champs, are a few percentage points below the Spartans, and possess a 7-2 record in conference play.

In order to retain their share of the state quiet take two of the three games.

They will get their first chance today at Old College Field, then the two teams will travel to Ann Arbor to conclude the series with double headers.

Sometime during the three games, the Spartans will undoubtedly face a right-handed pitcher named Jack Corbett.

Coach Ray Fisher probably will call his ace hurler against State today in an attempt to get off to a winning start. Corbett holds a 10-2 record with three coming in conference play.

St. Louis' No. 1 singles is Earl Clark, Jr., son of Dutch Clark, former pro and great and recently retired athletic director and coach at U of D.

The other two singles players are Sanford Kaplan and either Tom Stater or Tom Geiger.

In view of Detroit's apparent weakness, Coach Beaman plans to figure up his lineup in order to give some more of his squad a chance to play. Diana Squire and possibly Jim Breshears are likely to see action.

Right who may replace Jim Pore, captain, who gave it all, remains certain yet.

A bright note about the Spartan team is the improved play of Capt. Jim Pore. After losing his first four matches, Pore came on to beat Al Mann of Michigan in two sets.

The Titans just recently returned from Houston, Texas, where they finished fourth in a team field.

As for Wisconsin, the Spartans will have a slightly tougher time. The Badgers finished seventh last year in the Big 10 Championships held at Bloomington.

This year, Wisconsin is little improved. Their one standout is Capt. Jack Vincent. Last year, Vincent was runner-up to State's Stan Driscoll for the No. 1 singles championship. To date, he is undefeated in five matches.

Although Penn State hasn't managed a victory over Michigan State in the last five years, Spartan Coach Karl Schlademan conceded that the Nittany Lions will probably win this time.

Although hesitating to sound pessimistic, the Spartan mentor admitted that the loss of his top quarter-milers, Kevin Gosper and Lou Varga, may cost the Spartans a victory.

Bill Brendel and Ron Sauer will replace Gosper and Varga in the 400.

The Lions are strong in the sprints and field events, as indicated in the results of their last meet.

Their top dashman turned 21 times of 9.7 in the 100 and 21.1 in the 220.

Schlademan indicated that the dashes should be interesting, with State's Ed Braham and Julius McFay matched against the Lions' best.

Penn State has two fine shot putters who both have bettered 50 feet, with the best effort being 55 feet.

According to Schlademan, the discus and javelin will probably go to the Nittany Lions.

For 13 Councilmen Petitioning to Begin At Spartan Village

Petitioning for councilmen positions for the newly formed Spartan Village will begin Monday.

Patrick Callahan, married housing representative to Student Congress, announced Thursday that the districts have been laid out and that petitions for the representative posts may be picked up in the Married Housing Office on Shaw Lane Monday.

One representative and one alternate will be elected for each of the four districts. The results will be given after publication, after then a petition will be filed for May 26.

Twenty-five signatures of persons living in the district are necessary to put a name on the ballot. Petitioning will close at noon May 22. All petitions must be turned into the Married Housing Office by that time, Callahan said.

Election committee members will meet with the election board May 23 to explain the procedure.

The person obtaining the most votes from each district will be named the councilman and the person with the next highest number, alternate.

Unregistered voters show the area indicated in each district and listing the election places will be circulated to each of the living units in the married housing area today according to Callahan.

The State News also will run a map of the districts Monday morning.

The organizing of Spartan Village, a body to aid the expansion and administration of government assisted housing areas, was approved by a vote of the students living in the married houses five days earlier this term. It is based on the Spartan City organization that existed in the area during the war years.
