The bill, recently passed by Student Congress, sets up an eli-gibility board to interpret the law and make decisions in disputed ases. Other members will re-resent AWS and Men's Council The congress itself will have to reverse decisions the board Also, violators of the ordinance have the right to appear to the All-College Judiciary.

Guest Editorial

Well Said . . .

In a mass round-up last Saturday, 58 University stu-

dents were caught in the Arboretum for violations of drinking regulations.

These were the unlucky students—the ones that got caught, Countless numbers of other University students were also drinking on Saturday night, in apartments, at the island, at Beer Mountain they were luckier.

The contrast illustrates a familiar yet important theme. At Michigan, the premium is unfortunately placed not on being moral enough to comply with the laws, but on being clever enough to escape detection

when breaking them.

There is something fundamentally wrong with a system of regulation that encourages evasion of the law. The ules and regulations at the University of Michigan make practically mandatory that the normal teen-age student bend four years artfully evading them.

Apartment parties, a common enough diversion, are ast SAC regulations; spontaneous parties (those not revistered with the Office of Student Affairs ten days in advance) violate regulations; parties not chaperoned by at least two couples over the age of 26 are outlawed; and of course, all parties involving alcoholic beverages are against

And so, unless he wishes to deny himself the forms of entertainment most popular with teen agers, indeed with people-including faculty members and administrathe Michigan student learns early that to break the cleverly is acceptable—but he must not blunder, he

must not be foolish enough to get caught.

Obviously the case at hand is one of degree. No one But at the same time, by burdening their lives with a number of rules that attempt to impose a moral code not common to their society, the University is perhaps failing

It is failing them because it is not inculcating in them any sense of moral obligation, much less the proper one. It is not pointing out that obedience to established law is a prerequisite of good citizenship. Rather, it is every day showing them that one can break the law—if one does it with discretion.

The years of prohibition form a shameful chapter in

the reading of American history, but yet they taught the government a valuable lesson-morals imposed from above, not inherent to the society they control, cannot lead to a law-abiding, ordered citizenry

Nother can many of the futile, petty-regulations of SAC and the state of Michigan.

Prohibition taught us another lesson—when stringent dation is imposed against the wishes of the yast majorenforcement becomes necessarily spotty, ineffective, and absect, not to respect, but to scorn and derision.

The number of illegal parties at the University testify to the sanctit, with which the student regards the SAC regulations. Perhaps, in time, those who make the rules that govern our University activities, will also learn the lesson of the mass roundup.


