Sendte Censures McCarthy

#### Action Due Today **On 2** Other Counts

WASHINGTON(P)- The Senate condemned Wednesday night by a vote of 67-20 the conduct of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy on the first of three censure charges against him and cleared the way for final action on two other counts today.

The action amounted to a vote of guilty on the charge McCarthy obstructed the Senate and arted contrary to its traditions in fail-ing to help a subcommittee which investigated him in 1951 and 1952. and in "abusing" the group's

McCarthy did not vote on the censure resolution, but denounc-ed it as "a foul job" and said the American people know " am being cen being censured becau ed to do the 'dishonor: thing of exposing Communists in government."

The Wisconsin Republican also got a wholly new investigation started by charging that forgery and suppression of evidence have been used against him

In an outgrowth of this charge, Sen. Knowland of California, the Republican leader, named a special committee to look into the sileged checking of senators' incoming mail by unauthorized persons.

All the Democrats present and 23 Republicans joined in voting to "condisms" McCarthy's be-havior toward the Hennings-Hayden-Hendrickson subcom-mittee which investigated his financial and other affairs in 1951 and 1957 1951 and 1952.

Knowland and 19 other Republicans backed McCarthy. The vote came after a series of attempts to spare the Wisconsin senator from censure were deteated by similar lopsided margins.



They are the prisoners of the Red Chi-

nese. They are the men who have been sentenced as spies. But apart from the purely humanitarian

aspects of the situation, there are other reasons why Americans should take an interest in the plight of their countrymen.

Since 1946 the United States has been subjected to constant indignities at the hands of both the Russians and the Red Chinese. During this period the paper used in the exchange of notes has grown to proportions rivaling a Broadway tickertape parade.

For all the good they have done the otes might as well have floated from the fifteenth floor of some office building into the hands of the Department of Sanitation.

By now the United States should be agonizingly aware of the fact that when it comes to diplomatic notes the Commies can't read.

Senate majority leader William Knowland, twice in the past week, has called for immediate release of the Americans or a complete naval and aerial blockade of the Chinese coast.

Knowland says such a blockade would. "be so expensive to the Chinese that they would release the 13 Americans soon enough."

To blockade the coast at this time would be comparable to locking the front door to starve out the tenants when the grocer boy always comes to the back door. The Chinese would still get their supplies.

This action, which both Secretary of State Dulles and the President have termed warlike, is not the answer.

Dulles has stated that our first duty is

"to exhaust peaceful means of sustaining our international rights and those of our The action of the Chinese leaders in the

past month has grown progressively more agressive. The tension they are creating will not be solved by blockades, notes or more talk of peaceful coexistence.

But it is not too late to avoid war. A solution can be found to the increasing embarassimint that has caused us to loose face in the eyes of many of our friends. We have in Washington men who are sup-We have in Washington men who are sup-posed to be able to find that solution.

The present actions, the diplomatic notes, are not going to result in the release of these men.

Now our only point of contact with the Peiping regime is through the legation at Geneva. This contact has already rejected a strongly-worded protest note demanding the release of the 11 airmen and two ci-



Sen. Knowland is to be congratulated for offering his solution even though it is not the answer. It is a suggestion of posi-tive action on a problem that seems to have received /little positive action from the needs that are being paid to act. the people that are being paid to act.

Diplomatic notes are not the answer. A blockade is not the answer. Yet, an answer must be found.

And the administration should be qualified to find it and find it now.
