Molotov Demands United Red Germany

Russian Stand Threatens To End Geneva Talks

GENEVA (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov stunned the Big Four conference Thursday night with a thunderous demand for Communist dominance in a United Germany.

The Western Allies immediately obtained a recess until Wednesday. A French delegation officer said tomorrow's meeting could be the last.

"If Molotov maintains his position, including his statement that Russia does not intend to submit any other proposals on German unification, it is difficult to see how the West could make any agreement or compromise on any other front in the agenda," the French official said.

But American officials later indicated that despite the conference's apparent failure, the Big Four would meet at least three or four more meetings to complete their agenda.

Molotov's sweeping rejection of any plan to unite Germany by free elections in the foreseeable future and his demand that all Germany follow the Communist course of the East German regime demolished Western hopes of a coalition, built up by his Moscow remarks Monday night that he was bringing back "better baggage" to Geneva.

U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson told the conference.

What Mr. Molotov has said seems to mean in terms of the directive of our heads of government and the hope which we have been that I go to study the matter overnight before speaking.

This is a better show than any other school has, he said. "Some other school has this camp."

Commenting on the attendance representative of Marshall Field and Co. said he had expected to see a trickle of students but was amazed at the number and high quality of the students he talked to.

IFC Offers Chest Donations

Spartacade today is headed back from threatened extinction following a pair of important meetings Tuesday night.

At 7 p.m. Tuesday the MSHI Veterans Assn. voted unanimously to back Spartacade. The veterans group was considered a much needed source of manpower for the pre-carnival work.

Although they didn't restrict their participation to helping Panfil, the vets did indicate they would back the sororities in the annual carnival upon formation of definite plans.

An hour later 15 organizations met with Spartacade Director Fred Raymond and heard a general discussion of the purposes and problems of the charity carnival.

Tentative plans for the cooperation between male and female living units were outlined by the assembled representatives.

Another meeting was scheduled for 8:30 p.m. Nov. 16, after each of the representatives had taken the problem back to his group.

Finally, the largest present booster of Spartacade will meet tonight at 7 p.m. to discuss the carnival.

Campus Chest, sponsor of Spartacade, also received a financial boost from IFC.

Following a meeting of the IFC Presidents' Assembly, the fraternities pledged to Campus Chest a sum equal to \$1 per IFC active—an estimated \$1,000.

The pledge to be paid in the immediate future will constitute IFC funds for the year.

George W. Lee, IFC president, said that the IFC did not in any way prohibit any fraternities from contributing to Campus Chest over and above his quota.

The IFC guiding group also made clear that no fraternities were barred from working on Spartacade as a member of another group and that attendance at the carnival is left entirely up to the individual.

The mass-mailing was designed by IFC as its alternate solution for Spartacade for this year.

After withdrawing from Spartacade two weeks ago, the fraternities group set up a committee to find an adequate for the carnival.

The question of participation of individual fraternities men in Spartacade work was brought up at the Tuesday night organizational meeting.

Also prominent at both the organizational meeting and the Tuesday night meeting was the problem of fraternities.

Bob O'Hara, director of Campus Chest, outlined a tentative plan for fraternities to work groups.

In the plan, male organizations would be considered for monetary contributions made in the process of booth construction.

In discussing the future of the carnival, Spartacade Director Raymond told the organizational meeting that Campus Chest officials realized last year's total of 32 booths could not be equaled this year.

He said Campus Chest was willing to drop to a total of 15.

November 14-17 Land-Grant Leaders To Meet on Campus

Michigan State officials expect 900 educational leaders for the 66th annual meeting of the Association of Land-Grant Colleges and Universities scheduled here.

The event, set for Nov. 14-17, will help Michigan State celebrate its centennial year. Michigan State set the pattern for all land-grant institutions.

Leaders of the 69 land grant colleges and universities come from schools having an aggregate enrollment of 450,000 students.

In addition to the presidents, deans and other administrators of the land grant schools, the Association has invited heads of member institutions of the National Association of State Universities.

The conference activities will be held at Kellogg Center, Continuing Education and of the Brody residence building.

Residents of Butterfield Hall will begin the move to Brody and Rather Halls, Thursday evening. Deadline for the move is noon Friday.

Men in the Brody group voted to discontinue their registration during the conference, when there will be their men in mind of the room.

9 Players Traded

Bosox Acquire Nats' Vernon

WASHINGTON (AP) — Moving swiftly to rebuild the Washington Senators, the club's new president, Calvin Griffith, Tuesday acquired five young players from the Boston Red Sox but had to surrender two of Washington's old pros, Mickey Vernon and Bob Porterfield.

It was a 5-for-4 deal as the Senators also gave up left-handed pitcher Johnny Schmitz and right-handed pitcher Tommie Umphlett, both obviously, the Red Sox are looking for the pennant in 1956, since the Boston club can't expect to win many years' service from its old players.

Vernon will be 38 in April; Schmitz will be 35 later this month. Porterfield, who has been having difficulty winning for the last two seasons after a 22-game year in 1953, is 31. Umphlett came here from the Red Sox two years ago and never hit over .220.

In return for these players, the Senators acquired three pitchers and two outfielders, all 25 or younger. The biggest name among

The following excerpt is reprinted from the sports editor's column of last Friday's Michigan Daily, the student news paper at the U of M.

Champaign's Illinois Memorial Stadium is a mighty uncomfortable place to play a football game, especially for Michigan. It is a big, cavernous pigskin palace—a forbidding red brick monument consecrated in the wreckage of past Maize and Blue hopes.

From out of its open ends, the brisk winds of the Great Plains whistles continually—playing tricks with the football and sounding perpetual taps for the myriad of Michigan teams that have failed there.

Beyond the stadium—there is nothing—nothing except the great wide Illinois prairie. It was here that Tom Harmon met his most bitter defeat. Penn Speedster Named Top Back of the Week

Frank Riepl is a sophomore halfback on the Pennsylvania team that hasn't won a game. It lost its 16th straight to Notre Dame last Saturday, 16-14. But Riepl showed enough in a losing cause to get Associated Press recognition as back of the week.

Riepl won his honors over the toughest type of competition, for last weekend was studied with brilliant performance by back field men. It was the same week end when Bob Mitchell, an Illinois sophomore, came out of nowhere to lead his team to a surprising 25-6 victory over mighty Michigan.

It didn't take long for the 5-11 Riepl to start throwing his 168 pounds around Franklin Field.

He caught the opening kickoff back of his own goal line and raced through the entire Notre Dame team in a shocking 108-yard run for a touchdown. Later in the first half he threw a 12-yard touchdown pass and kicked the two extra points that gave Penn a 14-7 lead at 5:10 of the second period and a 14-14 tie at halftime.

Mitchell was an unknown until Illinois took off the wraps and let him loose against Michigan in the second half. In 10 carries, Mitchell gained 173 yards, including a 64-yard touchdown run. His individual performance broke a tight game wide apart.

The government's statement, issued by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, said the U.S. had been "forced to turn to the Communist bloc for weapons because of an American policy of 'strategic containment' and 'containment'."

Booths this year, if necessary. Sharon Beyer, president of Spartacade, led a brief discussion at the organizational meeting about the possibility of replacing Spartacade with a variety show.

Under the variety show plan, a nationally famous emcee would be hired to lead a show of top campus talent.

Raymond pointed out that past variety shows have failed profitably, citing the "Biggest Show" series as an example.

Miss Beyer also told the group that only 10 of Spartacade's sororities had voted for Spartacade, leaving the possibility that they would be the only sororities in the carnival because Spartacade members are not bound to act as a group.

Chief among the problems aired at the veterans' meeting was the question of division of forces.

The veterans' motion to support Spartacade made the stip-

ulation that they would use their own discretion to allocate individual help when representatives from Spartacade present them with definite explanation as to how much help is required from the vet group.

Included in the suggestion of allocation of workers was a plan to split the veterans up by service. Army, Navy, Marine and Air Force, with each service co-operating on a booth.

At the organizational meeting Claude Watson, president of APO, said that the future of UMCW hinged on the future of Spartacade.

He said plans still call for the admission ticket plan of voting if there is a Spartacade.
