

18-Year-Olds Deserve Vote

Three years ago there was a great amount of discussion in the state about the possibility of lowering the voting age to 18.

After all the shouting was over nothing had been done, however. Even though a lot of politicians on both sides had favored the idea, everyone seemed content to let the matter drop.

Now the idea has slipped quietly back into the national picture.

With little fuss and fanfare Kentucky voters last week decided that 18-year-olds in their state should have the franchise.

The amendment to the state constitution lowering the voting age passed by a rather substantial 64,916 votes.

Georgia is the only other state to have the 18-year-old law, and it has been in operation there for several years.

With Michigan's present school system which requires a course in civics at the high school level, the old argument that the 18-year-olds didn't know enough about politics to exercise judgment in voting seems to have been tossed out the window.

In many cases the 18-25 age groups are the best informed of any age groups on politics.

The idea that if Joe is old enough for the draft he should be old enough to vote has been ridiculed by many, but its validity remains unshaken.

It is probably a little late to get an amendment on the next ballot but the politicians who are always looking for "issues" now have a big one all lined out for them.

The complete absence of political discussion about the age 18 voting law indicates that it may be considered a "hot potato" in party circles.

A word to the present legislators and those aspiring to office: if something isn't done to put the issue on a ballot for the people to decide it may become an issue whether you like it or not.

To paraphrase a popular slogan, "Never underestimate the power of youth."

Lions Win 2nd in Row, Nip Steelers

Hold Off Late Rally For 31-28 Victory

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Detroit's rejuvenated Lions dealt Pittsburgh its third straight National Football League loss, 31-28 Sunday but not before the Steelers threw a scare with three touchdowns in the final quarter. A possible winning TD was nipped by the pun.

Behind 31-14 and needing a victory to remain in the Eastern conference race, the Steelers scored three times within eight minutes and kept the sellout crowd of 34,441 yelling until the final gun.

And with only five seconds to go, quarterback Jimmy Finks hit Ed Whitely with a 19-yard pass for the winning TD. The official signaled the end of the game before another play could be attempted.

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He said, "I was glad for our early lead so some of our sophomores could play all that they did—and they all played very well."

Duffy also had praise for junior halfback Dennis Mendyk. "He played his best game to date and really displayed some fine running."

Mendyk ran back a Minnesota kickoff 85 yards for a touchdown in the final period only to have it called back due to a holding penalty.

Minnesota Coach Murray Warmath also had high praise for the play of the Spartans.

They were by far the best ball club I've seen in my two years at Minnesota. They did everything well."

As for his own ball club, Warmath commented: "We just didn't have it today. Our tackling and blocking was off and we just couldn't get going."

Actually, Minnesota has one of the greenest teams in the nation. Of the 38-player traveling squad, there are only four seniors and five juniors, the other 29 being sophomores.

Prior to the game, a tribute was paid to Jack Heppinstall, Spartan trainer for 42 years, and trainer of the 1948 United States Olympic Team.

The band spelled out the words T-H-A-N-K-S and J-A-C-K, and played "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." Heppinstall trotted on to the field, carrying the same satchel he bought in 1914, and received a rousing ovation.

A halftime treat was provided by the crack drill team from the U.S. Naval Air Station, Pensacola, Fla. The cadets went through a series of marching maneuvers with their rifles to the delight of the 31,605 fans.

Guard Arch Matsos streamed in from the left to block the kick. The ball bounced back toward the end zone with Spartans Jim Hinesly and Leo Haidys in pursuit.

Hinesly blocked a Minnesota man away from the ball to give Haidys a chance to fall on it for a touchdown but Gopher quarterback Dick Larson went down with Haidys and covered the ball first for a safety.

Morrill became the third of six Spartans to score when he went one yard on a quarterback sneak early in the second quarter.

Key plays of the drive that started on State's 23 was a 55-yard pass play from Morrill to Kasper, which went to the Gopher 20.

State gained a total of 417 yards, 201 on rushing and 136 by passing. The Gophers were held to 161 on the ground and 86 via passing.

NEW YORK (AP) — Brooklyn is the only club with more than one representative on the 1955 Associated Press major league all-star baseball team.

None of the 16 big league clubs are represented in the AP's tenth annual all-star squad, selected by 39 members of the Baseball Writers' Assn. of America. Seven National League players are honored along with three from the American.

Duke Snider in the outfield and Roy Campanella behind the plate are the representatives from the world champion Dodgers.

Seek Ninth Crown Today

Harriers Race for IC4A Title

Three for three. That's what the Michigan State cross country squad will attempt to do when they start in the IC4A championships at New York's Van Cortlandt Park this afternoon.

The IC4A meet is the first of three title meets that face the harriers in a two week period. The Big 10 championships are Friday while the National Collegiate will be held on the campus Nov. 28.

Michigan State will enter the meet as one of the favorites for the team crown while Henry Kennedy and Capt. Selwyn Jones are prospects for the individual title.

The harriers last won the team title in 1953 while the Spartans haven't had an individual winner since Tom Cottey in 1935.

Head coach Karl Schlademan will enter seven men in the meet. Kennedy and Jones are the leading entrants followed by Gay Denslow, 12th last year, Terry Block, Bill Miller, Ed Townsend and Leon Mesler.

The meet over the five-mile Van Cortlandt course will pit some of the top teams in the East against the Spartans, the Midwest's only entry.

Last year Manhattan won the team title while Michigan State finished 10th.

The Jaspers have all their men returning but have not looked

very impressive this year. The top teams that battle the Spartans will be Cornell, Villanova, New York University and Navy.

The race for individual honors may turn into a battle among British Empire runners. Kennedy, a Scotsman, and Jones, a Canadian, will meet Villanova's two top runners, Alex Breckenridge, a Scotsman and Ron Delaney, a 1:50 Irish half-miler.

All four runners can be expected to challenge Charlie Capozzoli's course and meet of 24:30.1 set in the 1952 meet.

Other top runners are last year's winner George Terry of Boston University. After becoming last the BU junior won in 24:36.6, the second fastest clocking on the course.

Not to be ignored is Pitt's brilliant runner Arnie Sowell. Fifth last year Sowell has developed into the United States top middle distance runner.

The meet will be the first time this year the harriers have run five miles.

Kennedy, a two-time Canadian cross country champion, is undefeated so far this season and is capable of breaking the course and meet record.

Jones, who would be the number one man on any other team except Michigan State, has run 20 minutes flat and is even more dangerous over a longer five-mile course.

Denslow and Block ran in last year's race with Denslow getting the 12th place while Block took a creditable 24th.

The fifth place will be a battle between Townsend and Miller. Mesler has been showing rapid improvement and could finish in the Spartans' number five place.

At stake in today's race is the IC4A travelling cup. Michigan State has three legs on the present award while Manhattan has four. Five legs are necessary for permanent possession.

Michigan State retired the last cup in 1935.

Cornell has won the most team championships with nine while the Spartans are second with eight.


