Kennedy Wins First In IC4A


Team Title to Pitt: Spartans Second

Henry Kennedy won the IC4A individual championship bu his efforts weren't enough as the Michigan State harriers finished second in the 47th running of the meet at New York City's Van Cortlandt Park Monday afternoon.

The 23-year-old sophomore won the race by 415 yards over Villanova's Ron Delaney. Kennedy's time for the five and course was 24.30.3, only two-tenths of a second off the course and meet record set in 1952 by Georgetown's Charles Canograph.

Move Aimed At Stopping **Union Strike**

Tension Increases In Latin Country

BUENOS AIRES (A) -Faced with the threat of a nation-wide strike by the General Confederation of Labor (CGT), Argentina's new provisional government Monday seized the newspaper La Prensa from that powerful organization. And it threatened to jail anybody who incites a walkout.

Maj. Gen. Pedro Aramburu's day-old regime-ramed an administrator to take over La Prensa, once one of Latin America's most noted dailies. The CGT newspaper El Lader was seized Sunday night.

Informed sources said the labor organization secretly ordered a nationwide strike starting at midnight. The order was issued after the army began a crackdown on labor troublemakers,

Aramburu had scarcely assumed office when he was faced with a demand by labor leaders for a clear cut ruling by the government on an in-ternal conflict among the six million CGT members.

The same problem had harried Aramburu's predecessor, Gen. Eduardo Lonardi threughout his 31 days in power. Aramburu re-placed Lonardi in a bloodless colin Sunday.


